AT the Court at *Kensington*, the 29th Day of *June* 1758,

P R E S E N T,

The KING's most Excellent Majesty in Council.

**W**HEREAS the Time limited by His Majesty's Order in Council, of the Eighth of May last, For paying the respective Bounties therein mentioned, to all Able and Ordinary Seamen, and also to all Able-bodied Landmen, who should voluntarily enter themselves in His Majesty's Royal Navy; and likewise for paying the Rewards to Persons discovering Seamen who should conceal themselves, is near expiring; And whereas it is judged expedient for His Majesty's Service, That the Bounties and Rewards thereby given, should be continued to be paid for some Time longer; — His Majesty doth therefore, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, hereby Order, That the Bounties of Three Pounds for every Able Seaman, and of Thirty Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, not above the Age of Fifty, nor under the Age of Twenty Years; and of Thirty Shillings for every Able-bodied Landman, not above the Age of Thirty-five, nor under the Age of Twenty Years, be continued to be paid to such Seamen and Landmen respectively, who shall, on or before the Twelfth Day of August next, enter themselves in the Royal Navy, in the Manner directed by His Majesty's Proclamation of the Fourth Day of January 1757: And likewise, That the Rewards of Two Pounds for every Able, and Twenty Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, be continued to be paid to any Persons who shall, on or before the said Twelfth Day of August next, discover any Seaman or Seamen who shall conceal themselves, so as such Seaman or Seamen be taken for His Majesty's Service. Whereof all Persons concerned are to take Notice, and govern themselves accordingly.

*Turin, June 28.* Monday the 26th, being the Duke of Savoy's Birth-day, his Royal Highness received the Compliments of the Foreign Ministers, and of the Nobility, as usual. The Duke of Noja, with his Son the Duke of Nocera, and his Daughter the Bride of Prince San Severino, after staying at Turin three Days, sat out for Lyons in the Night of the 25th.

*Warsaw, June 28.* There has been a Skit-mish between a small Body of Prussian Dragoons and Hussars, and a much greater Number of Cossacks, but without any considerable Advantage on either Side. General Fermor encamps at present between Tuchal and Conitz, and his Van-guard is advanced as far as the Frontiers of the New Marche.

*Head Quarters at Grewenbroich, July 13.* The Magazine of Forage taken in Duffeldorp, which surrendered on the 7th Instant, is very considerable. Prince Ferdinand has put into that Place a Garrison of three Battalions, and has ordered a Bridge of Boats to be laid over the River, which will be finished this Day.

*Cologne, July 14.* Yesterday Morning the French forced the Arsenal of this Free Imperial City, and took out such Cannon as they wanted, to defend the Bridge they have built over the Rhine.

*Hague, July 18.* We have no direct News from the King of Prussia's Army in Moravia; but from all other Quarters it seems agreed, that the first Accounts of the Advantage gained by the Austrians were greatly exaggerated, and that in Reality, they had gained little or no Advantage over the Prussians. The raising the Siege of Olmutz continues to be believed; and the King of Prussia is said to have assembled his whole Army at Littau, without any Loss. A large Corps of Prussians is advancing out of Silesia towards the Russians on one Side, whilst Count Dohna, with his Army, is marching to them on the other.
