The KING's most Excellent Majesty in Council.

IS Majefty in Council was this Day pleafed to order, that the Parliament, which stands prorogued to Thursday the Third of August next, should be further prorogued to Thursday the Twenty Eighth Day of September following.

HEREAS the Time limited by His Majefty's Order in Council, of the Twenty Ninth of June laft, For paying the respective Bounties therein mentioned, to all Able and Ordinary Seamen, and also to all Able-bodied Landmen, who fhould voluntarily enter themfelves in His Majefty's Royal Navy; and likewife for paying the Rewards to Perfons difcovering Seamen who should conceal themselves, will expire upon the Twelfth Day of August next; And whereas it is judged expedient for His Majefty's Service, That the Bounties and Rewards thereby given, fhould be continued to be paid for fome Time longer; - His Majefty doth therefore, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, hereby Order, That the Bounties of Three Pounds for every Able Seaman, and of Thirty Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, not above the Age of Fifty, nor under the Age of Twenty Years; and of Thirty Shillings for every Able bodied Land-man, not above the Age of Thirty-five, nor under the Age of Twenty Years, be continued to be paid to fuch Seamen and Landmen refpectively, who shail, on or before the Thirtieth Day of September next, enter themfelves in the Royal Navy, in the Manner directed by His Majefty's Proclamation of the Fourth Day of January 1757 : And likewife, That the Rewards of Two Pounds for every Able, and Twenty Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, be continued to be paid to any Perfons who shall, on or before the faid Thirtieth Day of September next, discover any Seaman or Seamen who shall conceal themfelves, fo as fuch Seaman or Seamen be taken for His Majesty's Service. Whereof all Perfons concerned are to take Notice, and govern themfelves accordingly.

GOD Save the KING.

Constantinople, June 15. There is little ws ftirring here. The Grand Seignor has News ftirring here. lately prohibited the Smoaking of Tobacco in the Streets, and diminished the Number of his Attendants in the Serraglio.

Hague, July 23. Letters arrived here Yef. terday from Berlin, and from Upper Saxony, which bring Accounts of a Battle between the King of Pruffia and the Auftrians hear Pardubitz in Bohemia, on the 12th Instant, in which his Prussian Majesty had been victorious. As thefe Advices do not come directly from the Pruffian Army, we are impatiently waiting for a Confirmation of them.

The laft Accounts from his Pruffian Majefty's Army are dated from Leitomifchel in Bohemias of the 7th Instant, by which it appears, That the Attack that had been made upon the Pruffian Convoy near Domstal, at a very bad Pafs in the Mountains of Moravia; that the Head of the Convoy had arrived fafe in his Camp; that the Center had been put in Confusion ; that the Rear had retired to Troppau ; and that the Pruffians had loft between 7 and 800 Men, killed, wounded and Prifoners; that the Want of Ammunition had obliged the King of Pruffia to raife the Siege of Olmutz, which he had effected with the Lofs of three Mortars and one Piece of Cannon; and that he had marched into Bohemia, with his whole Army, without the Lofs of a Man; that he had taken the Auftrian Magazine at Leitomischel, and was marching to take that of Koningingratz, which was very confiderable, and would enable him to purfue his Operations with Advantage. The Auftrians had made two forced Marches to gain Pardubitz before the Pruffians; and our laft Letters from that Army were of the 10th Instant, which renders the Probability of an Action on the 12th much greater.

The Ruffians, who had made a Motion to-wards Frankfort upon the Oder, are retired towards Poland; fo that at prefent the Apprehensions

hensions of an Invalion into Brandenburg seems to be fuspended ; and Prince Henry of Pruffia has taken his Measures to as to be able to march to the Relief of that Part of the Pruffian Dominions in Cafe of Neceffity.

Prince Ferdinand of Brunfwick was still in his Camp of Bedburdyck on the 23d Inftant, and was Mafter of all the Bridges upon the Ri-The French were at their old Camp ver Erfft. of Frauweiler, where it was uncertain whether they could maintain themfelves for Want of Subliftence.
