Whitehall, September 2.

HIS Morning a Messenger arrived at the Earl of Holdernesse's Office, with Letters from His Majesty's Minister Plenipotentiary at the Hague, dated last Thursday Morning, giving an Account, That the same Morning early an Express was arrived there from the King of Prussia's Army on the Frontiers of Poland, with Authentick Advice, dated from the Field of Battle, that on the 25th past, at Nine o'Clock in the Morning, his Prussian Ma-jesty had attacked the Russian Army, and, after an Engagement which lasted till the Evening, had entirely deseated them; that Fisteen Thousand Russians had been left on the Field of Battle; and that their Military Cheft, all their Artillery, and three Lieutenant Generals, had been taken. The Pruffians had loft about three Thousand, killed and wounded: And the only General Officer on their Side, who had had any Accident, was Major General Kahlden, who was slightly wounded. The King of Prussia had detached all his Cavalry in Pursuit of the Enemy.

A particular Relation of this important

To the King's most Excellent Majesty.

May it please your Majesty,

X/E Your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects, the Mayor, Aldermen, and Common Council, of the City of Exeter, in Chamber affembled, humbly beg Leave to approach Your Royal Throne, with our warmest and most sincere Congratulations on those signal and repeated Successes, with which it hath pleafed Almighty God to distinguish the Justice of Your Majesty's Arms against the common Disturber of the Peace of Europe.

That most important Fortress and Harbour of Louisbourg, lately the Dread of our Colonies and Fisheries, is now become their Bulwark. No longer alarmed at threatened Invasions, we now spread the Terror of our Arms through those Coasts which had hitherto boasted of being beyond the Reach of Infuls. The Reputation

of the British Navy hath been retrieved and carried to the highest Pitch by the late Action in the Mediterranean; and the Reduction of the French Settlements on the River Senegal hath opened a new and advantageous Branch of

Trade to your Majesty's Subjects.

Events, like these, will distinguish with Glory the Annals of Your Majesty's Reign, and be a lafting Monument of the Wildom and Steadiness of the Counsels by which they were concerted, and of the Conduct and Bravery of the Commanders intrufted with the Execution. From the continued Purfuit of the like prudent and vigorous Measures; from that remarkable Unanimity and uncommon Zeal with which the whole Nation is united in Support of the publick Interefts; from the Ardour and Intrepidity, which animate Your Majesty's Fleets and Armies; and, above all, from an humble Confidence in the Divine Protection and Affistance, we cannot but form the most pleasing Expectations, that our haughty Enemy will, at length, be obliged to submit to the Terms of a fafe and equitable Peace.

With this Prospect before us, may we be permitted to indulge our Hopes, that the most valuable of these Acquisitions will, for the Future, remain a Part of the British Dominions, as a reasonable Security against the Persidy of that Nation, whose restless Ambition no Treaties have been hitherto found sufficient to re-

In the mean Time we beg Leave to affure Your Majesty, that we shall, with the utmost Chearfulness, contribute every Assistance in our Power, in Support of Your Majesty and Your August Family on the Throne of these Kingdoms, and towards carrying on with Vigour that just and necessary War, in which Your Majesty has so generously engaged, in Vindication of the Religion, the Liberties, the Commerce, and the indisputable Rights of the British Nation.

Turin, August 16. The Right Honourable the Earl of Bristol, His Britannick Majesty's Ambassador Extraordinary and Plenipotentiary to the King of Spain, having taken his Audiences of Leave of the King of Sardinia, their Royal Highnesses the Duke and Dutchess of Savoy, and the rest of the Royal Family, set out from hence very early on Tuesday Morning for Genoa, where his Excellency, will embark immediately on Board His Majesty's Ship the Monmouth, and fail with the first fair Wind to Alicant.

Admiralty-Office, August 8, 1758.
Y Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, having received authentick Information, that a Dutch Ship named the City of Rotterdam, whereof Warner Pieterson was Master, laden with different Kinds of Merchandize; and also with the Baggage, conflitting of very valuable Effects, of the Marquis de Pignatellij, Minister from the Court of Spain to the Court of Denmark, and having likewife on Board his Household Steward, Confectioner, and Cook, and also the Coachman of the Danish Ambassador residing at Paris; and being bound from Rouen to Rot-terdam, was, in the Course of her faid Voyage, on the 30th Day of June last, boarded three several Times, by the Crews, or Parts of the Crews, of three different English Ships or Vessels, pretending to be Privateers; and that some of the Crew of one of the faid English Vessels, (which had two Masts) went on Board the faid Dutch Ship, about Six o'Clock in the Morning of the faid Day, and after fearching her, took and unlawfully carried away with them two Oars, one Boat Hook, and a Dutch Cheese: And that about Nine o'Clock the same Morning, Ten of the Crew of another of the faid English Vessels; (being a Cutter, or one Mast Sloop) went armed with Cutlasses, Pistols and Hatchets, on Board the said Dutch Ship, and after examining the Papers, they by Violence forced open the Hatchways, and went into the faid Ship's Hold, and there broke open two Trunks belonging to the faid Marquis de Pignatellij, wherein were rich Cloths, and laced Liveries, which they took and carried away, to their own Ship: And that about Two o'Clock in the Afternoon of the same Day, the Commander, who was a young Man, and wore a Gold laced Hat, together with some of the Crew of another of the faid English Vessels, (being a Cutter, or fingle Mast Sloop, mounted with four Guns) came armed as aforesaid, on Board the said Dutch Ship, and after examining the Ship's Papers, and those of the Passengers, pretended the same were False and Counterfeit, and then went into the said Ship's Hold, and began to plunder the Effects there; and that whilft they were so doing, the Crew of the aforesaid English Vessel, which Boarded the said Dutch Ship about Nine o'Clock that Morning, returned again, and joined those who were then in the faid Ship's Hold, and that then both the faid Crews in Conjunction, committed very great Outrages, by breaking open all the faid Marquis de Pignatellij': Cases, and Trunks, and taking and carrying away all the valuable Effects, which were in fix of the faid Cases and Trunks, and destroying or damaging the

Rest of those Esseds; and then falling upon his thefaid Minister's Officers, and beating them in a very cruel and shameful Manner, and stripping them of their Cloths, and carrying the same off, together with their Letters of Credit; and a Bill of Exchange.

Their Lordships therefore, in order to discover and bring to Justice, the Persons guilty of the Piratical Offences above-mentioned, are pleased to promise a Reward of FIVE HUNDRED POUNDS, without any Deduction, unto, or amongst such Person or Persons as shall, within three Months from this Time, discover any two or more of the Offenders concerned in committing the Piracies abovementioned, to as such Offenders shall be apprehended and duly convicted thereof: Which Reward shall be paid by Samuel Seddon, Efq; Solicitor of the Admiralty, immediately after the Conviction of fuch Offenders.

And as a further Encouragement, any of the faid Offenders, (other than, and except, the respective Commander or Commanders of any of the abovementioned English Ships or Vessels) who shall discover and profecute to Conviction, any two or more of the faid Offenders, shall be likewise entitled to His

Majesty's most Gracious Pardon.
