hope it will for ever be annexed to the British Empire.

Europe, Afia, and Africa, have alfo equally feen the English Flag triumphant on their respective Coasts; whils the victorious Arms of your good and faithful Ally the King of Prussia support the Protestant Cause, and defeat the oppressive Views of his numerous Enemies: And as, under your auspicious Reign, Wildom and Resolution are not wanting to direct, or Activity and Courage to execute the Measures calculated for the Service of our Country, we form to ourfelves the most fanguine Expectations, that, by a timely Improvement of the prefent Advantages, there may be procured a lasting Foundation of a folid and honourable Peace.

We further hope, continued Triumphs will be the Effect of your Majefty's Arms, and that we may long enjoy the Influence of your Council, whilft your unweared Application to Government, and the Refolution with which you purfue the Good of your People, excite your Subjects to the chearful Difcharge of their feveral Duties. And we moft humbly affure your Majefty, that we will affiduoufly exert ourfelves in whatever may tend to the Honour of your Majefty's Crown, and the Support of it in your Illuftrious Houfe, to the lateft Pofterity.

Given under our Common Seal, at the Guildhall of the City of Lincoln aforefaid, the Fourteenth Day of September, in the Thirty fecond Year of your Majefty's Reign.

The following Addrefs of the Mayor, Recorder, Aldermen, Sheriffs, and the reft of the Body-Corporate of the ancient and loyal City of Chefter, has been prefented to His Majefty by Sir Richard Grofvenor, Knt. one of their Reprefentatives in Parliament, being introduced by the Lord of His Majefty's Bed Chamber in Waiting : Which Addrefs his Majefty was pleafed to receive very gracioufly.

To the King's most Excellent Majesty,

The humble Addrefs of the Mayor, Recorder, Aldermen, Sheriffs, and the reft of the Body-Corporate of the ancient and loyal City of Chefter, in Common-Council affembled.

Most Gracious Sovereign,

WE your Majefty's most dutiful Subjects, defirous to embrace every Opportunity of expressing our Fidelity and Attachment to your Royal Person, beg Leave to present our warm and hearty Congratulations on the late glorious Successes, which have attended your Fleets and Armies, and particularly on that important Event, the Regaining of Cape Breton; a Place of sect Consequence to our Trade here, as also to the Security of your Territories in America, whose Guard and Bulwark may it long remain.

With joyful Hearts we likewife reflect on the Ardour and Exploits of your Majefty's Forces, fpreading Terror and Annoyance along the hoffile Coafts, which now fatally experience the vindictive Intrepidity of those irrefiftable Squadrons.

And further, permit us most gratefully to acknowledge your Majesty's great Prudence and paternal Care, in your Choice of Ministers, diflinguisted by fignal Testimonies of National Approbation : Their falutary Measures have already retrieved the Credit and Reputation of Britain : And what have we not yet to expect from such Disinterestedness, Vigilance, and Refolution ? May the Divine Providence ftill fpare to us that most invaluable Bleffing, your Sacred Life: May Heaven continue to crown your Majesty's Arms with Victory, that this just and necessfary War may happily terminate in an honourable, fafe, and lasting Peace.

Algier, May 22. We have, fince the Beginning of this Month, had no lefs than ten different Shocks of Earthquakes.

Petersbourg, August 22. The Turkish Envoy had his Audience of Leave on Sunday last, at Petershoff, and was at the Apartment there in the Evening, where the Empress appeared with the Crown on her Head.

Genoa, August 22. Letters from Bastia of the 12th Instant say, that the Chief of the Male Contents, De Paoli, with about 2000 Men, was entered into the Province of Cape Corfo, and had laid Siege to the Caftle of Rogliano, having intercepted an Officer with about Forty Men of the Republick's Troops, who were going to reinforce the Garrifon. He has left a Corps of about 1500 Men to blockade the City of Bastia, and to prevent any Succours being fent from thence to the Besseged. On the 16th Instant, the Earl of Bristol, His Britannick Majesty's Ambassador Extraordinary and Plenipotentiary to the Catholick King, arrived here from Turin, and on the 19th his Excellency embarked on Board His Britannick Majefty's Ship Monmouth, who failed the next Morning for Alicant. This Day the Grand Council met to fill up the Vacancy of Doge, when M. Matthew Franzone was elected.

Turin, August 23, Count Fermian has been named to replace Count Christiani at Milan, in all the Employments which his Excellency enjoyed, except that of Chancellor of Lombardy, which the First President holds for the Interim.

Turin, August 30. M. Gabrieli, who is appointed to fucceed M. Gobbi, the Venetian Refident at this Court, arrived here the 22d of this Month. On the Friday following he had a private Audience of the King of Sardinia; after which he was prefented to their Royal Highneffes the Duke and Dutchels of Savoy. M. Gobbi took Leave, on the fame Day, of all the Royal Family.

Madrid, August 28. Her Catholick Majefty departed this Life Yefterday Morning about Four o'Clock at Aranjuez. And in the Evening his Catholick Majefty fet out for Villaviciofa, where he will remain the ufual nine Days of Retirement, observed in this Country on such mournful Occasions.

Mublroffe, Sept. 3. The Pruffian Army marched Yefterday, and paffed by Cuftrin, croffed the Oder, and encamped about half a Mile farther on: The Head Quarters were at Manchow. They marched again this Morning very early to this Place, which is a little Town on the Frontier of Saxony, diftant from Frankfort two Miles; and, it is thought, they will continue marching at leaft two or three Days more without halting, till the Junction is made with the Army commanded by Margrave Charles.
