Whereof all Perfons concerned are to take Notice, and govern themfelves accordingly.

That your Majefty's Councils and Arms may prevail to fecure a folid and glorious Peace to Great Britain and to Europe in general : That your Majesty may pass your Days in Tranquility and Happiness, undisturbed by Contentions at Home, or War Abroad ; and that the Sceptre of this Nation may continue in your August Family to the lateft Pofferity, are our most ardent Wifhes.

In Testimony whereof, we, being affembled in Common - Council, have caufed our Common Seal to be hereunto affixed, this Twentieth Day of September, in the Thirty Second Year of your Majefty's Reign.

Madrid, Aug. 30. The Corps of her late Catholick Majetty was brought here Yefterday Morning, and conveyed, with the usual Pomp, to the Royal Convent of the Visitation, in this Capital, where it is deposited in the Choir of the Church, till a proper Vault can be built to receive it, her Majesty having defired to be interred there. The Office for the Dead is rehearfed folemnly and pontifically in that Church for the first three Days, the Grandees attending in Ceremony.

Madrid, Sept. 4. His Excellency the Earl of Briftol, His Britannick Majefty's Ambasfador Extraordinary and Plenipotentiary to the Catholick King, arrived at Alicant on the 30th paft.

Rome, Sept. 5. The Pope, on account of his Election, has fixed a Jubilee, which is to commence in this Capital the 15th Inftant. The Inhabitants of Perugia, Viterbo, and other Places in the Ecclefiaftical State, who, during the Sede Vacante, role up in Arms against the Government, to preferve their Privileges, having petitioned the Pope for a Pardon, have obtained it ; but as the Inhabitants of Todi, and Citta di Caftello, have not made the fame Submiffion, a Process is forming against them, in order to The Pope has ordered 2000 punish them. Crowns to be remitted to his former Epifcopal Church of Padoua, Half of which to be employed in repairing that Cathedral, and the other to be distributed amongst the Poor. On the 31st paft, a Review was made of the Pope's Soldiers, when those who were inlifted in the Sede Vacante were difmiffed, and a Gratification of four Zeckeens was distributed to each of them.

The faid Reward to be paid immediately on the Conviction of every fuch Offender, by the Solicitor of the Treasury, without Deduction, their Lordships having given Directions for the immediate Profecution of fuch Offenders.

Admiralty Office, August 8, 1758. Y Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, having received authentick information, that a Dutch Ship named the City of Rotterdam, whereof Warner Pieterson was Master, laden with different Kinds of Merchandize; and alfo with the Baggage, confifting of very valuable Effects, of the Marquis

de Pignatellij, Minister from the Court of Spain to the Court of Denmark, and having likewife on Board his Household Steward, Confectioner, and Cook, and also the Coachman of the Danish Ambassador refiding at Paris; and being bound from Rouen to Rotterdam, was, in the Course of her faid Voyage, on the 30th Day of June last, boarded three feveral Times, by the Crews, or Parts of the Crews, of three different English Ships or Vessels, pretending to be Privateers; and that fome of the Crew of one of the faid English Veffels, (which had two Mass) went on Board the faid Dutch Ship, about Six o'Clock in the Morning of the faid Day, and after fearching her, took and unlawfully carried away with them two Oars, one Boat Hook, and a Dutch Cheefe: And that about Nine o'Clock the fame Morning, Ten of the Crew of another of the faid English Vestels, (being a Cutter, or one Maft Sloop) went armed with Cutlaffes, Piftols and Hatchets, on Board the faid Dutch Ship, and after examining the Papers, they by Violence forced open the Hatchways, and went into the faid Ship's Hold, and there broke open two Trunks belonging to the faid Marquis de Pignatellij. wherein were rich Cloths, and laced Liveries, which they took and carried away, to their own Ship : And that about Two o'Clock in the Afternoon of the fame Day, the Commander, who was a young Man, and wore a Gold laced Hat, together with fome of the Crew of another of the faid English Veffels, (being a Cutter, or fingle Maft Sloop, mounted with four Guns) came armed as aforefaid, on Board the faid Dutch Ship, and after examining the Ship's Papers, and those of the Passengers, pretended the same were Falfe and Counterfeit, and then went into the faid Ship's Hold, and began to plunder the Effects there ; and that whilft they were fo doing, the Crew of the aforefaid English Veffel, which Boarded the faid Dutch Ship about Nine o'Clock that Morning, returned again, and joined those who were then in the faid Ship's Hold, and that then both the faid Crews in Conjunction, committed very great Outrages, by breaking open all the faid Marquis de Pignatellij's Cafes, and Tronks, and taking and carrying away all the valuable Effects, which were in fix of the faid Cafes and Trunks, and defitoying or damaging the Reft of those Effects; and then falling upon his the faid Minister's Officers, and beating them' in a very cruel and fhameful Manner, and stripping them of their Cloths, and carrying the fame off, together with their Letters of Credit, and a Bill of Exchange.

Their Lordships therefore, in order to discover and bring to Justice, the Perfons guilty of the Piratical Offences above-mentioned, are pleased to promise a Reward of FIVE HUNDRED POUNDS, without any Deduction, unto, or amongst fuch Person or Perfons as shall, within three Months from this Time, discover any two or more of the Offenders concerned in committing the Piracies abovementioned, fo as tuch Offenders shall be apprehended and duly convicted thereof : Which Reward shall be paid by Samuel Seddon, Efq; Solicitor of the Admiralty, immediately after the Conviction of fuch Offenders,

And as a further Encouragement, any of the faid Offenders, (other than, and except, the respective Commander or Commanders of any of the abovementioned English Ships or Vessels) who shall difcover and profecute to Conviction, any two or more of the faid Offenders, shall be likewife entitled to His Majesty's most Gracious Pardon.
