The KING's most Excellent Majesty in Council.

THEREAS the Time limited by His Majesty's Order in Council of the 29th of March last, for Prohibiting the Exporting out of this Kingdom, or carrying Coastwife, Gunpowder, Sait-Petre, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition, will expire upon the 29th Day of October next: And whereas it is judged expedient for His Majesty's Service and the Safety of this Kingdom, that the faid Prohibition should be continued for some longer Time: His Ma jesty doth therefore, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, hereby Order, Require, Prohibit, and Command, that no Person or Perfons whatfoever (except the Mafter-General of the Ordnance for His Majesty's Service) do, at any Time during the Space of Six Months, to commence from the faid 29th Day of October next, presume to transport into any Parts out of this Kingdom, or carry Coastwife, any Gunpowder, Salt Petre, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition, or ship, or lade any Gunpow-der, Salt-Petre, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition, on Board any Ship or Vessel, in order to transporting the same into any Parts bevond the Seas, or carrying the same Coastwise. without Leave or Permission in that Behalf first obtained from His Majesty, or His Privy Council, upon Pain of incurring and fuffering the respective Forfeitures and Penalties inflicted by an Act passed in the 29th Year of His Majesty's Reign, entituled, " An Act to Impower His " Majesty to Prohibit the Exportation of Salt-" Petre, and to enforce the Law for Impower-" ing His Majesty to Prohibit the Exportation " of Gunpowder, or any Sort of Arms and "Ammunition: And also to Impower His " Majesty to restrain the carrying Coastwise of "Salt-Petre, Gunpowder, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition." And the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, Commissioners for Executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, the Lord Warden of the Cinque-Ports, the Master General of the Ordnance, and His Majesty's Secretary at War, are to give the necessary Directions herein, as to them may respectively appertain.

We are firmly united in an hearty Zeal for the Honour of your Majesty's Crown; and beg Leave further to assure your Majesty, that we will, so united, contribute all the Assistance in our Power to support your Majesty and your Royal Progeny on the Throne of these Realms, and to defend your illustrious House against the unjust Attempts of any of its Enemies.

Captain Douglas, of His Majesty's Ship Alcide, gives an Account in his Letter of the 8th Instant, that having received Intelligence of a French Frigate called the Felicite, of 36 Guns, and a Flute called the Robuste, of 24, being failed from Bourdeaux the 10th of September, he (with His Majesty's Ship Acteon) steered a Course to intercept them; and on the 15th, twenty Leagues to the Westward of Cape Finisterre, they came up with, and took the Robuste, the Felicite having left her the Night before: She is laden with fix 24 Pounders, twelve of 18, six Iron Mortars, 3000 Shells of 13 Inches Diameter, Cordage, Canvas, Flour, and several other Stores for the Use of the French Men of War at Hispaniola.

An Account is also received from Captain Hartwell, of His Majesty's Ship Lizard, that on the 2d Instant, cruizing off Brest, he came up with and engaged two French Frigates called L'Heroine and Duc D'Hanover, for more than an Hour, when L'Heroine, the largest, made all the Sail she could for the Rocks near the Opening of the Passage of Fontenoy; and then he wore down, and engaged the Duc d'Hanover, which Ship, in little more than half an Hour, struck: She mounted 14 Carriage and several Swivel Guns.

On the 24th past, Captain Gilchrist, of His Majesty's Ship Southampton, saw a Sail to Windward at Two in the Morning, to which he gave Chace, and came up with her at Noon, when after an obstinate Engagement till Three in the Afternoon, she struck, and proved to be the Caumartin Privateer from Dunkirk, commanded by Jean Baptist De Cock, new from the Stocks, mounted 16 Six Pounders, stuck sull of Swivels and Musquetoons, Burthen 280 Tons, and had on Board 147 Men.

His Majesty's Ship Unicorn, Captain Graves, is arrived at Plymouth, who, on the 21st past, after a Chace of seven Hours, took, off the Isle of Bas, the Duc D'Harcourt Snow Privateer of

Dunkirk, of 8 Guns and 61 Men.

Admiralty-Office, August 8, 1758. Y Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, having received authentick Information, that a Dutch Ship named the City of Rotterdam, whereof Warner Pieterson was Master, laden with different Kinds of Merchandize; and also with the Baggage, confishing of very valuable Effects, of the Marquis de Pignatellij, Minister from the Court of Spain to the Court of Denmark, and having likewife on Board his Household Steward, Confectioner, and Cook, and also the Coachman of the Danish Ambasiador residing at Paris; and being bound from Rouen to Rotterdam, was, in the Course of her faid Voyage, on the 30th Day of June latt, boarded three feveral Times, by the Crews, or Parts of the Crews, of three different English Ships or Vessels, pretending to be Privateers; and that fome of the Crew of one of the faid English Vessels, (which had two Masts) went on Board the faid Dutch Ship, about Six o'Clock in the Morning of the faid Day, and after fearthing her, took and unlawfully carried away with them two Oars, one Boat Hook, and a Dutch Cheese: And that about Nine o'Clock the same Morning, Ten of the Crew of another of the faid English Vessels, (being a Cutter, or one Mast Sloop) went armed with Cutlaffes, Pistols and Hatchets, on Board the said Dutch Ship, and after examining the Papers, they by Violence forced open the Hatchways, and went into the said Ship's Hold, and there broke open two Trunks belonging to the faid Marquis de Pignatellij, wherein were rich Cloths, and laced Liveries, which they took and carried away, to their own Ship: And that about Two o'Clock in the Afternoon of the fame Day, the Commander, who was a young Man, and wore a Gold laced Hat, together with some of the Crew of another of the faid English Vessels, (being a Cutter, or fingle Mast Sloop, mounted with four Guns) came armed as aforesaid, on Board the said Dutch Ship, and after examining the Ship's Papers, and those of the Passengers, pretended the same were Fasse and Counterfest, and then went into the said Ship's Hold, and began to plunder the Effects there; and that whilst they were so doing, the Crew of the aforesaid English Vessel, which Boarded the said Dutch Ship about Nine o'Clock that Morning, returned again, and joined those who were then in the faid Ship's Hold, and that then both the faid Crews in Conjunction, committed very great Outrages, by breaking open ail the said Marquis de Pignatellij's Cafes, and Trunks, and taking and carrying away all the valuable Effects, which were in fix of the faid Cases and Trunks, and destroying or damaging the Rest of those Essects; and then failing upon his the

faid Minister's Officers, and beating them in a very cruel and thameful Manner, and stripping them of their Cle his, and carrying the same off, together with their Lever of Credit, and a Bill of Exchange.

Their Loruships therefore, in order to discover and bring to Justice, the Persons guilty of the Piratical Offences above mentioned, are piezied to promile a Reward of FIYE HUNDRED POUNDS, without any Deduction, unto, or amough such Person or Persons as shall, within three Months from this Time, discover any two or more of the Offenders concerned in committing the Piracies abovementioned, to as tuch Offenders shall be apprehended and duly convicted thereof: Which Reward shall be paid by Samuel Seddon, Efq; Solicitor of the Admiralty, immediately after the Conviction of such Offenders.

And as a further Encouragement, any of the faid Offenders, (other than, and except, the respective Commander or Commanders of any of the abovementioned English Ships or Vessels) who shall discover and profecute to Conviction, any two or more of the faid Offenders, shall be likewise entitled to His Majesty's most Gracious Pardon.
