A Success highly tending to the Honour of your Majesty, and of your Government, and to the Disgrace of your Enemies, who had in vain used their greatest Efforts to prevent such an Event; which cannot fail to produce the most happy Consequences, as thereby their naval Power is sensibly affected, and a Prospect open'd for putting a speedy Stop to their Encroachments in America.

The Terror spread along the French Coast, by destroying the Shipping at St. Malo's, from which the Navigation of your Subjects of England was greatly annoyed, and this Island continually threatned; the demolishing the rising and favourite Harbour of Cherbourgh, with the Ships and Fortifications about it; are striking Proofs of the Superiority of your Majesty's Arms.

We se, with peculiar Satisfacton, the Preparations of an Invasion against this Island render'd for the present abortive, by the wise Measures of your Majesty's Government, carried into Execution by Persons of distinguished Zeal, with a prudent and steady Resolution, who had taken uncommon Pains to make themselves acquainted with the neighbouring Coast.

The Works of Fortification, which your Majesty hath lately been most graciously pleased to order to be carried on for the better Security and Desence of this your Island, are fresh and speaking Marks of your Majesty's great Goodness towards us, of your paternal Care for our Preservation, and claim our highest Thankfulness, and the strongest Returns of Zeal and Loyalty.

May the Insolence and unwarrantable Devastations of your Majesty's Enemies against your Electoral Dominions soon be effectually check'd! May Success continue to attend your Majesty's Arms in all Parts, for the establishing the Happiness and Tranquillity of your Reign, by the procuring to your People a safe, lasting, and honourable Peace!

Permit us to deelare, that as cur Attachment to the Illustrious House of Hanover will ever remain unalterable, so our most hearty and sincere Wishes for it's Prosperity will never cease.

Most Gracious Sovereign,

E your Majesty's most dutiful and faithful Subjects, the Mayor, Bailiss, and Burgests of the Town of Southampton, in Common Council assembled, beg Leave, with our Fellow Subjects, to congratulate your Majesty on the late signal Advantages gained by your victorious Arms over the common Enemy and cestless Disturber of the Peace of Europe.

By these Advantages we are convinced that the Wisdom and disinterested Measures of your Councils will always inspire a Considence of Success, and an Ardour for obtaining it in your Majesty's Fleets and Armies.

The Reduction of the Fortress of Louisbourg in particular, with its Dependencies, is an Event of so great Importance to the Honour of our Country, and has given such a fatal Stroke to the French in the two Resources of their Power, Trade and Navigation, as afford a reasonable Ground to hope that they will soon be reduced to the Necessity of supplicating for a Peace, which, when it shall be granted to them, we assure ourselves, will be such a one as shall be glorious for your Majesty, and satisfactory to all your People.

Our Prayers in the mean Time, to the only giver of all Victory, shall be fervent and constant for an Increase of Years to your Majesty's Life and Reign, and of Prosperity to your Kingdoms, and that it may please him to add a Perpetuity to the many Blessings we enjoy under your mild and gracious Government.

By a Letter from Admiral Boscawen to Mr. Secretary Pitt, dated Louisbourg Harbour, the 13th of September last, the following Account of the Inhabitants on the Island of St. John has been received.

Lieutenant Colonel Lord Rollo writes to the Admiral, that most of the said Inhabitants had brought in their Arms.

The Admiral's Letter further contains, that by the bein Accounts he can get, the faid Island of St. John has been the only Supply for Quebec, of Corn and Beef fince the War, except what has been brought from Europe, having at prefent above 10,000 horned Cattle, and many of the Inhabitants declare they grow each of them 1200 Bushels of Corn annually; they have no other Market for it but Quebec: It has been an Afylum of the French Inhabitants from Nova Scotia; and from this Island has been constantly carried on the inhuman Practice of killing the English Inhabitants of Nova Scotia, for the Sake of carrying their Scalps to the French, who pay them for the same: Several Scalps were found in the Governor's Quarters, when Lord Rollo took Possession.

Petersbourg, Sept. 8. Marshal Apraxin died of an Apoplexy on Tuesday Morning last; and it is said he will be buried with the Honours due to his Rank.

Leghorn, Sept. 25. On Saturday the 23d Instant, Rear Admiral Broderick arrived in this Port with his Britannick Majesty's Ships the Prince, Culloden, and Guernsey. As soon as these Ships have taken in their Water, and other Necessaries, they will directly proceed to Sea again.

Hambourg, Oct. 3. The Russians have evacuated Landsberg, and are retreating towards Prussia. Count Dohna is still in Pursuit of them.

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
