WHEREAS the Time limited by His Majesty's Order in Council, of the Twenty Eighth of July last, For paying the respective Bounties therein mentioned, to all Able and Ordinary Seamen, and also to all Able-bodied Landmen, who should voluntarily enter themselves in His Majesty's Royal Navy; and likewise for paying the Rewards to Persons discovering Seamen who should conceal themselves, will expire upon the Thirtieth Day of this Instant September; And whereas it is judged expedient for His Majesty's Service, That the Bounties and Rewards thereby given, should be continued to be paid for some Time longer; — His Majesty doth therefore, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, hereby Order, That the Bounties of Three Pounds for every Able Seaman, and of Thirty Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, not above the Age of Fifty, nor under the Age of Twenty Years; and of Thirty Shillings for every Able-bodied Landman, not above the Age of Thirty-five, nor under the Age of Twenty Years, be continued to be paid to such Seamen and Landmen respectively, who shall, on or before the Eighteenth Day of November next, enter themselves in the Royal Navy, in the Manner directed by His Majesty's Proclamation of the Fourth Day of January 1757: And likewise, That the Rewards of Two Pounds for every Able, and Twenty Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, be continued to be paid to any Persons who shall, on or before the said Eighteenth Day of November next, discover any Seaman or Seamen who shall conceal themselves, so as such Seaman or Seamen be taken for His Majesty's Service. Whereof all Persons concerned are to take Notice, and govern themselves accordingly.

Most Gracious Sovereign,

WE your Majesty's dutiful and loyal Subjects, the Mayor, Bayliffs, and Commonalty, of the City of Coventry, in Common Council assembled, most humbly and sincerely congratulate your Majesty upon the Success of your Arms in the important Conquest and Reduction of Cape Breton, and the Check thereby given to the ambitious Views of the French in America.

The Success of your Majesty's Army in Germany, the Captures and Destruction of the Enemy's Ships, the Acquisition made in Africa, and the Damage done to the Enemy upon their own Coasts, are Events so important to the Common Cause in general, and to the Interests and Security of these Kingdoms in particular, by restraining the dangerous Views and growing Power of France, that it cannot but afford your Majesty's faithful Subjects the most solid Satisfaction.

May your Majesty's Reign be long continued over a People truly sensible of, and grateful for the Blessings they enjoy under it; and may those great and eminent Virtues, which are the Glory of your Majesty's Reign, and diffuse Happiness among all your People, be transmitted by your Majesty, and the Descendants of your Royal House, to latest Posterity.

The following Address of the High Sheriff, Justices of the Peace, Grand Jury, and Gentlemen, assembled at the General Quarter Sessions of the Peace holden at Durham in and for the County Palatine of Durham, has been presented to his Majesty by George Bowes, Esq; one of the Representatives for the said County of Durham, and John Tempest, Esq; one of the Representatives for the City of Durham: Which Address His Majesty was pleased to receive very graciously.

To the King's most Excellent Majesty,

The humble Address of the High Sheriff, Justices of the Peace, Grand Jury, and Gentlemen, assembled at the General Quarter Sessions of the Peace holden at Durham, in and for the County Palatine of Durham, the 4th Day of October, 1758.

AMidst the universal Acclamations of your People, we your Majesty's most dutiful Subjects, the High Sheriff, Justices of the Peace, Grand Jury, and Gentlemen, at the said Quarter Sessions assembled, humbly beg Leave to offer our sincerest Congratulations on the late glorious Success of your Majesty's Arms, in the seasonable Conquest of the important Fortrefs of Louisbourg, the Reduction of the Islands of Cape Breton and St. John; most beneficial Acquisitions to the Trade of these Kingdoms, and greatly destructive to the Commercial Interest of our inveterate Enemies the French, whose Naval Force has so severely felt the Weight of your Majesty's just Resentment, for their unprovoked Attack upon your Colonies, that we cannot but hope, from the Continuance of your steady Measures and wise Counsels, your Majesty's Enemies will soon be necessitated to come into an honourable and lasting Peace. And your Majesty may be assured, that from an unfeigned Zeal for your Honour and Service, we shall, on all Occasions, cheerfully contribute, to the utmost of our Power, to support your Majesty in the vigorous Prosecution of your Measures: Nor shall we be wanting in our Prayers, That you may long, very long, enjoy the Hearts of your People, the pleasing Fruits of your mild and auspicious Government; and that the Crown of these Realms may be possessed with equal Glory, by your Illustrious Descendants, to the latest Posterity.

An authentick Relation of what has passed at the King of Prussia's Army since the Battle of Zorn-dorff, till the Action of the 14th of October 1758. Berlin, October 21.

The Body of Troops, under the King, left the Camp of Blumberg the 2d of September, and joined the Army, which was coming under the Command of the Margrave Charles from Silesia, the 9th at Grossenhayn. On the 10th they marched on the Heights between Moritzbourg and Dresden; after which we pitched our Camp at Schonberg; the Enemy had theirs at Stolpen. They had detached General Laudohn to Fischbach, from whence he was dislodged by General Retzow. We made near 300 of the Enemy Prisoners. General Retzow encamped at Fischbach, after which our Army made a Motion to the Left, and marched to Rammenau. This obliged the Prince of Dourlach to march to Bautzen. Two Days after

we dislodged General Laudohn from an Eminence, which we were desirous of occupying, and encamped at Bischofswerda. Marshal Daun thought proper to make a March on his Right, and then encamped in the Mountains of Wilten. The King had previously given Orders to General Retzow to take Post at Bautzen, and in Consequence of the Enemy's Motions, our Army marched thither, while General Retzow pushed as far as Weissenberg. The Prince of Dourlach had posted himself upon the Height of Arensdorff, and Marshal Daun was encamped at Kittlitz. The King's Army marched to Hoch-kirchen, from whence he dislodged the Austrians, and posted himself upon the Eminences, which extend from Hoch-kirchen towards Groditz. In the Night between the 13th and 14th Marshal Daun ordered an Attack to be made on our Right; and as the Night was extremely dark, and the Fog very thick, the Pandours having dislodged our Free Battalions, which were at the very Extremity of our Flank, by that Means slipped into the Village and set it on Fire, and thereby obliged the Battalions, which had covered the Sides of it, to abandon it, and retire farther. The Austrians attempted, several Times, to pass through it, but were repulsed both by our Infantry and Cavalry. General Retzow was at the same Time attacked by the Prince of Dourlach; but after he had repulsed the Enemy, and taken 300 Prisoners, he was coming to join the Army, the Left of which was attacked at the Time they received Orders to reinforce the Right, which was done by the Whole, except the Battalion of Kleist, which, having advanced too far in repelling the Enemy, could not join the Army again, and was obliged to lay down their Arms. The Post on the Right was maintained from Half an Hour after Four till Ten, when the Army received Orders to retire. General Retzow joined it, and it now occupies the Post of Biertitz and Dobreschutz. We have lost Marshal Keith and Prince Francis of Brunswick, whom we cannot sufficiently regret. Prince Maurice of Anhalt is wounded; and as he was going in a Coach to Bautzen, was made Prisoner. General Geist is wounded in the Arm, and Major General Crockow, of the Cuirassiers, in the Shoulder. The King, the Margrave, and all the Generals, who were in the Action, have either received Contusions, or had their Horses wounded. We cannot as yet make an exact Estimate of our Loss, but it may be depended on, that the Whole does not exceed 3000 Men. Night prevented the Regiments on the Right from striking their Tents, by which we were greatly incommoded, and they consequently lost: But these are Misfortunes which are sometimes unavoidable in the Chances of War. We have about 500 of the Enemy Prisoners, among whom is the General Marquis de Vitteleschi. We hope soon to give the Publick better News.

We may add to this Account, that since it was written, our Loss has greatly decreased by the Return of a great Number of Soldiers, who were separated from their Corps during the Engagement. The Loss of the Enemy greatly exceeds ours.

The Russian Army has lately left Stargard, and directs its March precipitately through Reetz and Kalies, two Towns in the New Marche, upon the Frontiers of Poland.

Hague, Oct. 27. Prince Ferdinand's Army made a Motion by its Right, on the 21st Instant, from Soest to Hoffstadt, upon the Lippe, with its Right to that Place, and its Left to Oisnighausen, in which Camp Lieutenant General Oberg arrived the same Day, and was posted so as to cover the Right Flank of the Army. The light Troops had been engaged with the Enemy, and had had good Success, particularly Lieutenant Colonel Boist, of the Prussian Hussars, who drew the French into an Ambuscade at Soest, in which he killed and wounded a good Number, and took several Prisoners. Marshal Contades was about Werle. By Letters from Prince Ferdinand's Army, we are informed, that His Grace the Duke of Marlborough, Commander in Chief of the British Forces in Germany, died, greatly regretted, on the 20th Instant, at Munster.

MY Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, having received authentick Information, that a Dutch Ship named the City of Rotterdam, whereof Warner Pieterfon was Master, laden with different Kinds of Merchandize; and also with the Baggage, consisting of very valuable Effects, of the Marquis de Pignatellij, Minister from the Court of Spain to the Court of Denmark, and having likewise on Board his Household Steward, Confectioner, and Cook, and also the Coachman of the Danish Ambassador residing at Paris; and being bound from Rouen to Rotterdam, was, in the Course of her said Voyage, on the 30th Day of June last, boarded three several Times, by the Crews, or Parts of the Crews, of three different English Ships or Vessels, pretending to be Privateers; and that some of the Crew of one of the said English Vessels, (which had two Masts) went on Board the said Dutch Ship, about Six o'Clock in the Morning of the said Day, and after searching her, took and unlawfully carried away with them two Oars, one Boat Hook, and a Dutch Cheefe: And that about Nine o'Clock the same Morning, Ten of the Crew of another of the said English Vessels, (being a Cutter, or one Mast Sloop) went armed with Cutlasses, Pistols and Hatchets; on Board the said Dutch Ship, and after examining the Papers, they by Violence forced open the Hatches, and went into the said Ship's Hold, and there broke open two Trunks belonging to the said Marquis de Pignatellij, wherein were rich Cloths, and laced Liveries, which they took and carried away, to their own Ship: And that about Two o'Clock in the Afternoon of the same Day, the Commander, who was a young Man, and wore a Gold laced Hat, together with some of the Crew of another of the said English Vessels, (being a Cutter, or single Mast Sloop, mounted with four Guns) came armed as aforesaid, on Board the said Dutch Ship, and after examining the Ship's Papers, and those of the Passengers, pretended the same were False and Counterfeit, and then went into the said Ship's Hold, and began to plunder the Effects there; and that whilst they were so doing, the Crew of the aforesaid English Vessel, which Boarded the said Dutch Ship about Nine o'Clock that Morning, returned again, and joined those who were then in the said Ship's Hold, and that then both the said Crews in Conjunction, committed very great Outrages, by breaking open all the said Marquis de Pignatellij's Cases, and Trunks, and taking and carrying away all the valuable Effects, which were in six of the said Cases and Trunks, and destroying or damaging the Rest of those Effects; and then falling upon his the said Minister's Officers, and beating them in a very cruel and shameful Manner, and stripping them of their Cloths, and carrying the same off, together with their Letters of Credit, and a Bill of Exchange.

Their Lordships therefore, in order to discover and bring to Justice, the Persons guilty of the Piratical

Offences above-mentioned, are pleased to promise a Reward of FIVE HUNDRED POUNDS, without any Deduction, unto, or amongst such Person or Persons as shall, within three Months from this Time, discover any two or more of the Offenders concerned in committing the Piracies above-mentioned, so as such Offenders shall be apprehended and duly convicted thereof: Which Reward shall be paid by Samuel Seddon, Esq; Solicitor of the Admiralty, immediately after the Conviction of such Offenders.

And as a further Encouragement, any of the said Offenders, (other than, and except, the respective Commander or Commanders of any of the above-mentioned English Ships or Vessels) who shall discover and prosecute to Conviction, any two or more of the said Offenders, shall be likewise entitled to His Majesty's most Gracious Pardon.
