N Sunday last, was brought into this Harbor, the St. Peter of Hamburgh, a Smack of about 80 Tuns burthen , William Carfon Master, and Francis Mentsen his Mate; the was, about the feventh of March, laden at Amsterdam with a considerable Cargo, and bound for Roan in France; but one Peter Fox, and five others of his Crue, most of them Irish, being taken in as Passengers, did in the way fall upon the Master, whom they barbarously murthered, with three of the Seamen, and flung them overhoard, faving alive onely the Mate, to fleer them for Ireland. They arrived, about the 20th of March, at Glandore, a Port that lies Westward of Kinfale, where they began to fell some Goods; but searing to be there seized, they set Sail for Waterford, where they were overtaken by the Norwich Frigat, Captain London Commander, and brought back to this place. Four of these six Villains are taken in her, and having confest the Murthers, are sent unto the Gaol by our Vice-Admiral of the Province Mr. Southwell, who hath been very vigilant and successful in the pursuit of this whole matter. The Ship and Goods remain in his fafe cultody, expecting when the right Owners will come and claim them,

Milan, April 3. We cannot possibly quit the appre-hensions we have of the Duke of Savoy's being entred into some Engagement with the Most Christian King, in order to the attacking this Countrey, how small soever the appearance thereof as yet is. And we are told that our Neighbors the Grisons, are likewise alarmed, upon an account they have received of the Most Christian Kings having defired passage of the Suiffers, for an Army to march this way; and that they are thereupon about fortifying all the passages within their Territories. This day eight dayes a Religious, who by seditious Libels, had endeavored to raise Tumults and Disorders here, was privately strangled in Prison; and the next day his Body was exposed, as a Malesactor, to the publick Our Letters from Spain promise us, that Don Fuan will speedily begin his journey towards Sicily, but

do not yet fix any time for his departure.

Naples, April 9. The Spanish Armada, consisting in 16 Men of War, continues in this Port, and hitherto we do not perceive that they begin to work on them, in order to the Re-fitting them, though it is reported, that they will be ready to Sail by the latter end of the next We have not any news here from Meffina, the French not having of late made any great progress. The General of our Cavalry, who dyed not long fince at Melazzo, is extremely regretted here, having been a

Neopolitan.

Venice, April 13. A Bark being arrived here from Zara, the Patron reports, that he met with several Veffels returning to Triefte from Pefcara in the Kingdom of Napies, where they had Landed the 4000 Men, raised in the Emperors Hereditary Countries, for the fervice of the Grown of Spain; and from other hands we under-

stand, that these Troops will continue quartered in and about Pescara, in order to their refreshment, till such time as Don Juan of Austria arrives in those parts, and then they will march for Sicily. The spanish Ambaffador, Don Gasparo de Tebes, who went hence some time fince for Trieffe, to fee the faid Troops embark there, is now every day expected here again. The Letters we receive from Constantinople, speak very much of a Peace with the Pales, though on what ground we do not learn. By the way of Vienna we are informed, that the affairs of that Kingdom are in a very ill posture; and, that it is feared, the King, for want of the necessary supplies, will be forced to quit those great advantages he has obtained against the Enemy and all the places he hath taken or recovered in the Ukraine.

Madrid, April 10. The Prince of Vautimont hath accepted the Command of General of the Oftend Squadron, and hath fince offered her Majefly his fervice against the Meffineses. Don Juan of Austria does not yet ffir from Saragoça, the place of his constant residence, the matter of the supplies, and other things he infifted up on, in order to his going Vicar-General into Italy, for the reduction of Messina, being not yet fully perfected to his facish tion; in the mean time we are advised. That four Men of War are fitting out at Seville, with all the halfe possible, for the reinforcing the Armada, and are to be accompanied by two Gallies; at Seville they are likewife fitting out the New-spain Fleet, which may be

ready to Sail by the end of June.

Dantzick, April 17.
