AT the Court at *Kensington*, the 7th Day of *November*, 1758,

P R E S E N T,

The KING's most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS the Time limited by His Majesty's Order in Council, of the Fifteenth of September last, For paying the respective Bounties therein mentioned, to all Able and Ordinary Seamen, and also to all Able-bodied Landmen, who should voluntarily enter themselves in His Majesty's Royal Navy; and likewise for paying the Rewards to Persons discovering Seamen who should conceal themselves, will expire upon the Eighteenth Day of this Instant November; And whereas it is judged expedient for His Majesty's Service, That the Bounties and Rewards thereby given, should be continued to be paid for some Time longer; — His Majesty doth therefore, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, hereby Order, That the Bounties of Three Pounds for every Able Seaman, and of Thirty Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, not above the Age of Fifty, nor under the Age of Twenty Years; and of Thirty Shillings for every Able-bodied Landman, not above the Age of Thirty-five, nor under the Age of Twenty Years, be continued to be paid to such Seamen and Landmen respectively, who shall, on or before the Thirtieth Day of December next, enter themselves in the Royal Navy, in the Manner directed by His Majesty's Proclamation of the Fourth Day of January 1757: And likewise, That the Rewards of Two Pounds for every Able, and Twenty Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, be continued to be paid to any Persons who shall, on or before the said Thirtieth Day of December next, discover any Seaman or Seamen who shall conceal themselves, so as such Seaman or Seamen be taken for His Majesty's Service. Whereof all Persons concerned are to take Notice, and govern themselves accordingly.

The King has been pleased to constitute and appoint the Right Honourable John Lord Chedworth, to be His Majesty's Lieutenant of and in the County of Gloucester, the City of Bristol, and County of the same, and the City of Glou-

The King has been pleased to grant unto the Right Honourable John Lord Chedworth, the Offices of Constable of the Castle of Saint-Briavells, in the Forest of Dean in the County of Gloucester, and Keeper of the Deer and Woods in the said Forest.

Admiralty Office, November 14.

Captain Saumarez, of his Majesty's Ship Antelope, having received Intelligence in King Road, on the 31st past, that a French Ship of War was lying in Lundy Road, he immediately weighed and went in Quest of her, and as the Wind was contrary, and blew hard, he beat down Channel, and, on the 1st Instant, saw her at Anchor below Ilfracombe. Upon discovering the Antelope, she weighed and stood towards her, and upon coming pretty near, hoisted her Colours, and seemed prepared to engage, but soon after hauled them down. When the Antelope came within Gun Shot, she fired at the French Ship, which she not returning. Captain Saumarez sent a Boat, with his first Lieutenant, to know if they had surrendered; but finding the Boat did not return, he bore down under her Stern, and asked if she had struck, and was answered they had. She proved to be the *Biliqueux*, pierced for 66 Guns, and had 64 mounted, with 417 Men.

PURSUANT to an Act of Parliament passed in the 26th Year of His Majesty's Reign, this is to give Notice to the Concerned, that Information hath been sent to this Office, That on the 2d Instant, a Vessel in Distress came to Anchor about a Mile East of Beachy Head, and the next Day, the Wind blowing hard, her Cable broke, and she drove ashore, and overfet. She proved to be the *Nuestra Señora de la Guardia*, Don Lorenzo Janones, Commander, bound from Cadiz to Havre de Grace, and laden with Wool, Hides, Boxes of China Ware, Casks of Wine, Coffee, Tea, Sugar, Cocheneal, Indico, a Parcel of Linen, some Rubarb and Borax, a Quantity of Physical Roots, and some other Parcels of Merchandize which are not yet unpack'd; there were Hopes of saving and drying most Part of the valuable Goods: And her Crew, consisting of 23 Men, mostly Spaniards, were all saved.
