AT the Court at Kensington, the 7th Day of November, 1758,

P R E S E N T,

The KING's most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS the Time limited by His Majesty's Order in Council, of the Fifteenth of September last, For paying the respective Bounties therein mentioned, to all Able and Ordinary Seamen, and also to all Able-bodied Landmen, who should voluntarily enter themselves in His Majesty's Royal Navy; and likewise for paying the Rewards to Persons discovering Seamen who should conceal themselves, will expire upon the Eighteenth Day of this Instant November; And whereas it is judged expedient for His Majesty's Service, That the Bounties and Rewards thereby given, should be continued to be paid for some Time longer; — His Majesty doth therefore, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, hereby Order, That the Bounties of Three Pounds for every Able Seaman, and of Thirty Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, not above the Age of Fifty, nor under the Age of Twenty Years; and of Thirty Shillings for every Able-bodied Landman, not above the Age of Thirty-five, nor under the Age of Twenty Years, be continued to be paid to such Seamen and Landmen respectively, who shall, on or before the Thirtieth Day of December next, enter themselves in the Royal Navy, in the Manner directed by His Majesty's Proclamation of the Fourth Day of January 1757: And likewise, That the Rewards of Two Pounds for every Able, and Twenty Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, be continued to be paid to any Persons who shall, on or before the said Thirtieth Day of December next, discover any Seaman or Seamen who shall conceal themselves, so as such Seaman or Seamen be taken for His Majesty's Service. Whereof all Persons concerned are to take Notice, and govern themselves accordingly.

Leghorne, Nov. 12. This Day failed from hence His Britannick Majesty's Fleet under the Command of Rear Admiral Broderick, consisting of the following Ships, viz. the Prince, Swifture, St. Albans, Jersey, Guernsey, Thetis, Ambuscade, and Lyme; and with them the Trade bound to England.

Venice, Nov. 17. On Monday last Monsignor Giovanni Bragadin, a noble Venetian, and Bishop of Verona, was elected by the Senate Patriarch of Venice; upon which Occasion there were publick Festivals, for three Days, at the Palace of the Family of Bragadin, with Balls, Concerts, Illuminations, Bonfires, Firing of Guns, and such like publick Demonstrations of Joy, to which the Foreign Ministers were invited.

Florence, Nov. 18. Besides the two Companies out of the third Battalion of Tuscan Troops in Garrison here, which a few Days ago was sent to Leghorne, Orders have been sent to the Commissaries of the respective Villages to enlist 700 Men to compleat the Garrison of Tuscany.

Dresden, Nov. 26. His Prussian Majesty is in perfect Health at this Place. General Hullen some Days ago took Possession of Freyberg; and last Friday Lieutenant General Itzenplitz marched from thence to occupy Chemnitz. It is said, that the Prussian Hussars, that were sent after Marshal Daun's Army, pushed no farther than Gishubel.

Hague, Dec. 6. No News of any great Importance has been received here lately; the several Armies being retired into their respective Winter Quarters, except the Corps of Prussians, that is opposed to the Swedes. It is reported, that the Hereditary Prince of Brunwick was gone from Dulmen to Paderborn, to take the Command on that Side.

**M**Y Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty having received many repeated Complaints of divers outrageous Acts of Piracy committed on Board great Numbers of Ships, as well English as Neutral, sailing in the English Channel, by the Crews of Ships or Vessels being or pretending to be English Privateers:

Their Lordships therefore, in order to detect and bring to Justice the Persons guilty of such Piracies and Robberies; (in Violation of the Laws of Nations in general, and of this Kingdom in particular, and to the great Dishonour thereof) are pleased to promise a Reward of FIVE HUNDRED POUNDS, unto or amongst such Person or Persons as shall, within Three Months from this Time, discover any one or more of the Offenders guilty of any such Acts of Piracy as aforesaid, so as such Offender or Offenders shall be apprehended and duly convicted thereof.

And in regard the Committing of such Offences as aforesaid are greatly encouraged by divers Persons as Accessaries thereto, who knowingly assist, maintain, counsel, or advise the Committing of such Acts of Piracy, and also by Persons who receive Goods so piratically taken, and entertain and conceal Offenders, knowing them to have committed such Robberies:

Their Lordships therefore, in order to detect or bring to Justice the Persons guilty of such last mentioned Offences, are pleased to promise a Reward of FIVE HUNDRED POUNDS, unto or amongst such Person or Persons as shall, within Three Months from this Time, discover any one or more of the Offenders guilty of any such Offences last mentioned, so as such Offender or Offenders shall be apprehended and duly convicted thereof. Which said respective Rewards before mentioned, shall be paid, clear of all Deductions whatsoever, by Samuel Seddon, Esq; Solicitor of the Admiralty, immediately after the Conviction of such Offenders.

And as a further Encouragement, any of the said Offenders, (other than and except the respective Commander or Commanders of any such Piratical Ships or Vessels) who shall discover any one or more of the said Offenders, shall, on the Conviction of such Offender or Offenders so discovered, be intitled to His Majesty's most Gracious Pardon.

And their Lordships do also promise to grant, upon Request, to every Person, being a Seaman, (who by making any such Discovery or Discoveries as aforesaid, shall be intitled to either to the Whole, or to any Part or Parts of any of the above-mentioned Rewards) an absolute Protection, to prevent his being impressed into His Majesty's Sea Service, during this present War with France.

Encouragers, Accessaries, Aiders, and Abettors thereto, who knowingly assist, or maintain, procure, command, counsel, or advise the committing of such Piracies, or who receive Goods so piratically taken, or entertain and conceal such Pirates and Robbers, knowing them to have committed such Robberies, in Violation of the several Acts of Parliament made for punishing of such Offences; which Practices not only tend greatly to the Dishonour of this Kingdom, but are very prejudicial and injurious to the Trade and Commerce thereof: And the said Merchants and Insurers, at the said General Meeting, having appointed a Committee for the carrying of the said Resolutions into Execution, The said Committee do hereby give Notice, that they are ready to assist and give due Encouragement to all Persons who shall impeach, make Discovery, and Proof against any Person or Persons guilty of any such Offences, either as Principals or as Encouragers or Accessaries, which Assistance and Encouragement the said Committee do hereby promise, over and above all Benefits and Rewards offered by the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty for the Discovery of Persons guilty of such Acts of Piracy as aforesaid, and, if it shall be desired, the Names of the Person or Persons, making such Discovery or Information, shall be concealed; and, for the more ready Assistance of the Person making such Discovery, they are desired to apply to Messrs. Browne and Smith, of Austin Fryars, London.
