PRESENT,

The KING's most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS the Time limited by His Majesty's Order in Council, of the Seventh of November last, For paying the respective Bounties therein mentioned, to all Able and Ordinary Seamen, and also to all Able-bodied Landmen, who should voluntarily enter themselves in His Majesty's Royal Navy; and likewife for paying the Rewards to Persons discovering Seamen who should conceal themselves, will expire upon the Thirtieth Day of this Instant December; And whereas it is judged expedient for His Majesty's Service, That the Bounties and Rewards thereby given, should be continued to be paid for some Time longer; — His Majesty doth therefore, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, hereby Order, That the Bounties of Three Pounds for every Able Seaman, and of Thirty Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, not above the Age of Fifty, nor under the Age of Twenty Years; and of Thirty Shillings for every Able-bodied Landman, not above the Age of Thirty-five, nor under the Age of Twenty Years, be continued to be paid to such Seamen and Landmen respectively, who shall, on or before the Twenty Eighth Day of February next, enter themselves in the Royal Navy, in the Manner directed by His Majesty's Proclamation of the Fourth Day of January 1757: And likewise, That the Rewards of Two Pounds for every Able, and Twenty Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, be continued to be paid to any Persons who shall, on or before the faid Twenty Eighth Day of February next, discover any Seaman or Seamen who shall conceal themselves, so as such Seaman or Seamen be taken for His Majesty's Service. Whereof all Persons concerned are to take Notice, and govern themselves accordingly.

To the King's most Excellent Majesty.

May it please your Majesty,

WE your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects, the Mayor, Recorder, Aldermen, and Common-Council, of the ancient Borough of Leicester, beg Leave to approach your Sacred Person, with Hearts sull of Gratitude, for the signal Success of your Majesty's Forces by Sea and Land, in the several Parts of the World, over our Enemies, whose ambitious Designs of encroaching upon your Dominions, and to destroy our Trade, made a War unavoidable.

Your Majesty's Schemes, planned with Wisdom, conducted with Steadiness, and executed with true British Courage and Valour, have disappointed their Views by destroying their Ships, and consequently their Trade, and which, we trust, will be a sure Means of compelling them to make a solid and lasting Peace, your Majesty's only View in commencing this War.

We are fensible of the heavy Burdens this War obliges you to lay upon your Subjects; but, heavy as they are, we shall bear them with Pleasure, as it is the only Means of preserving our Religion, Liberties, and Trade.

That your Majesty may long reign over an affectionate and free People, and transmit your Virtues, with the Crown, to your Royal Family, the greatest Bleffing this Nation can hope for, is our constant and fervent Prayer.

Given under our Common Seal this Fifteenth Day of December, in the Year of our Lord, One thousand seven hundred and

fifty eight.

Florence, Dec. 9. On the 1st Instant, by the violent Rains that we had for some Days past, the Arno swelled so much, that it overflowed the lower Part of the Town, by which feveral Houses received confiderable Damage, and great Quantities of Provisions were destroyed; but the Damage has been still greater in the Country, where whole Districts have been laid under Water. The Emperor, as an Encouragement to People to fettle in the Suburbs of Leghorn, has caused an Edict to be published, by which many Privileges and Exemptions are granted to those who should fix there.

Berlin, Dec. 16. This Day arrived here Andrew Mitchell, Efq; His Britannick Ma-jesty's Minister to this Court, on his Way to Breslaw, for which Place he will set out in a Day or two, in order to attend the King our Sovereign, who is supposed to have come to that City Yesterday.

Hambourg, Dec. 22. - Count Dohna arrived at Mirou, a Town in the Dutchy of Mecklembourg Strelitz, on the 17th Instant, with a very confiderable Body of Men. He is to join General Manteuffel's Corps, and pursue further Operations against the Swedes, who are re-treating in Haste towards Stralsund. The greatest Part of the Russian Army is retired back as far as Royal Pruffia; the rest will winter in the Environs of Thorn, Marienwerder, and the Banks of the Vistula.

Their Lordships therefore, in order to detect or bring to Justice the Persons guilty of such last mentioned Offences, are pleased to promise a Reward of FIVE HUNDRED POUNDS, unto or amongst such Person or Persons as shall, within Three. Months from this Time, discover any one or more of the Offenders guilty of any such Offences last mentioned, so as such Offender or Offenders shall be apprehended and duly convicted thereof. Which faid respective Rewards before mentioned, shall be paid, clear of all Deductions whatfoever, by Samuel Seddon, Esq; Solicitor of the Admiralry, immediately after the Conviction of fuch Offenders,

And as a further Encouragement, any of the faid Offenders, (other than and except the respective Commander or Commanders of any fuch Piratical Ships or Vessels) who shall discover any one or more of the faid Offenders, shall, on the Conviction of such Offender or Offenders so discovered, be intitled to His Majesty's most Gracious Pardon.

And their Lordships do also promise to grant, upon Request, to every Person, being a Seaman, who by making any such Discovery or Discoveries as aforefaid, shall be intitled to either to the Whole, or to any Part or Parts of any of the above-mentioned Rewards) an absolute Protestion, to prevent his being impressed into His Majesty's Sea Service, during this present War with France.

fome of the Crews of the faid English Ships boarded the faid Galliot off Dangeness, and opening the Fore Hatchway, went into the Hold, and broke open a great many Cases, and Packs of Merchandize, and unlawfully took, and carried away, great Quantities of Velvets, Silks, Silk-Stockings, Gloves, Confectionary Goods, and one whole Bale of Silk: And that between Three and Four a Clock in the fame Afternoon, being off Dover, the faid Galliot was again boarded by the Crews, or Part of the Crews, of three other English Ships, who being in Company, went together into the Hold, and rum-maged the faid Galliot, and unlawfully took, and carried away, some Silk, and Silk Stockings, Part of which they wrapped about their Bodies, and put the rest into their Pockets, and also took away a Sword: And that soon afterwards, on the same Day, the said Galliot was a third Time boarded by the Crew, or Part of the Crew of another English Ship, who went into the Hold, broke open several Cases, and unlawfully took, and carried away, two Boatloads of Merchandize, confifting of Men and Women's Velvets, Silk, embroidered Cloaths, Silk-Stockings, Leather Gloves, French-Plate Candleflicks, fome Swords, and Hangers, Bottles of Cor-dials, Perfumes, and Confectionary and other Goods; and then beat several of the faid Galliot's Crew, and confined the faid Master in his Cabbin, placing a Centry over him with Pistols:
Their Lordships therefore, in order to discover

and bring to Justice, the Persons guilty of the Piratical Offences above-mentioned, are pleased to promile a Reward of FIVE HUNDRED POUNDS, without any Deduction, unto or amongst such Per-fon or Persons, as shall, within three Months from this Time, discover any one or more of the Offenders concerned in Committing all or any of the Piracies above-mentioned, fo as fuch Offender or Offenders shall be apprehended and duly convicted thereof: Which Rexard shall be paid by Samuel Scidon, Esq. Solicitor of the Admiralty, immediately after the Conviction of fuch Offender or Offenders.
