PRESEN

The KING's most Excellent Majefty in Council.

WHEREAS the Time limited by His Majefty's Order in Council, of the Seventh of November last, For paying the respective Bounties therein mentioned, to all Able and Ordinary Seamen, and also to all Able-bodied Landmen, who should voluntarily enter themfelves in His Majefty's Royal Navy ; and likewife for paying the Rewards to Perfons difcovering Seamen who thould conceal themfelves, will expire upon the Thirtieth Day of this Instant December ; And whereas it is judged expedient for His Majefty's Service, That the Bounties and Rewards thereby given, fhould be continued to be paid for fome Time longer; - His Majesty doth therefore, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, hereby Order, That the Bounties of Three Pounds for every Able Seaman, and of Thirty Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, not above the Age of Fifty, nor under the Age of Twenty Years; and of Thirty Shillings for every Able-bodied Landman, not above the Age of Thirty-five, nor under the Age of Twenty Years, be continued to be paid to fuch Seamen and Landmen refpectively, who shall, on or before the Twenty Eighth Day of February next, enter themselves in the Royal Navy, in the Manner directed by His Majesty's Proclamation of the Fourth Day of January 1757 : And likewise, That the Rewards of Two Pounds for every Able, and Twenty Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, be continued to be paid to any Perfons who shall, on or before the faid Twenty Eighth Day of February next, discover any Seaman or Seamen who shall conceal themfelves, fo as fuch Seaman or Seamen be taken for His Majesty's Service. Whereof all Perfons concerned are to take Notice, and govern themfelves accordingly.

MY Lords Commillioners of the Admiralty having received many repeated Complaints of divers outragious Acts of Piracy committed on Board great Numbers of Ships, as well English as Neutral, failing in the English Channel, by the Crews of Ships or Veffels being or pretending to be English Privateers :

Their Lordships therefore, in order to detect and bring to Juffice the Perfons guilty of fuch Piracies and Robberies, (in Violation of the Laws of Nations in general, and of this Kingdom in particular, and to the great Difhonour thereof) are pleafed to promife a Reward of FIVE HUNDRED POUNDS, unto or amongft furth Perfon or Perfons as shall, within Three Months from this Time, discover any one or more of the Offenders guilty of any fuch Afts of Piracy as aforefaid, fo as such Offender or Offenders shall be apprehended and duly convicted thereof.

And in regard the Committing of fuch Offences as aforefaid are greatly encouraged by divers Per-fons as Acceffaries thereto, who knowingly affift, maintain, councel, or advife the Committing of fuch Acts of Piracy, and also by Persons who receive Goods fo piratically taken, and entertain and conceal Offenders, knowing them to have committed fuch Robberies

Their Lordships therefore, in order to detect or bring to Juffice the Perfons guilty of fuch laft mentioned Offences, are pleased to promise a Reward of FIVE HUNDRED POUNDS, unto or amongst such Person or Persons as shall, within Three Months from this Time, discover any one or more of the Offenders guilty of any fuch Offences last mentioned, fo as such Offender or Offenders shall be apprehended and duly convicted thereof. Which faid respective Rewards before mentioned, shall be paid, clear of all Deductions whatfoever, by Samuel Seddon, Esq; Solicitor of the Admiralty, immediately after the Conviction of fuch Offenders.

And as a further Encouragement, any of the faid Offenders, (other than and except the respective Commander or Commanders of any fuch Piratical Ships or Veffels) who shall discover any one or more of the faid Offenders, shall, on the Conviction of fuch Offender or Offenders fo difcovered, be intitled to His Mejefty's most Gracious Pardon.

And their Lordships do also promise to grant, upon Request, to every Person, being a Seaman, who by making any fuch Difcovery or Difcoveries

as aforefaid, shall be intitled to either to the Whole. or to any Part or Parts of any of the above-mentioned Rewards) an absolute Protection, to prevent his being impressed into His Majesty's Sea Service, during this prefent War with France.

Admiralty Office, December 26, 1758. Y Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, having received authentick Information, that a Galliot or Vessel, called the Juffrow Christina Elizabeth of Lubeck, whereof Calper Muntzenberger was Mafter, laden with different Kinds of Goods and Merchandize, belonging to the Subjects of the Empress of Russia, and bound from Rouen to St. Petersbourg, was, in the Course of her faid Voyage, on the 18th Day of September laft, boarded three feveral Times by the Crews, or Part of the Crews, of fix English Ships or Veffels, being, or pretending to be Pri-vateers; and that at the first of those Times, viz. about One a-Clock in the Afternoon of that Day, fome of the Crews of the faid English Ships boarded the faid Galliot off Dungenefs, and opening the Fore Hatchway, went into the Hold, and broke open a great many Cafes, and Packs of Merchandize, and unlawfully took, and carried away, great Quantities of Velvets, Silks, Silk-Stockings, Gloves, Confectionary Goods, and one whole Bale of Silk: And that between Three and Four a Clock in the fame Afternoon, being off Dover, the faid Galliot was again boarded by the Crews, or Part of the Crews, of three other English Ships, who being in Company, went together into the Hold, and rummaged the faid Galliot, and unlawfully took, and carried away, fome Silk, and Silk Stockings, Part of which they wrapped about their Bodies, and put the reft into their Pockets, and also took away a Sword : And that foon afterwards, on the fame Day, the faid Galliot was a third Time boarded by the Crew, or Part of the Crew of another English Ship, who went into the Hold, broke open several Cases, and unlawfully took, and carried away, two Boatloads of Merchandize, confifting of Men and Women's Velvets, Silk, embroidered Cloaths, Silk-Stockings, Leather Gloves, French-Plate Candleflicks, fome Swords, and Hangers, Bottles of Cordials, Perfumes, and Confectionary and other Goods ; and then beat feveral of the faid Galliot's Crew, and confined the faid Master in his Cabbin, placing a Centry over him with Piftols :

Their Lordships therefore, in order to discover and bring to Justice, the Persons guilty of the Piratical Offences above-mentioned, are pleafed to promile a Reward of FIVE HUNDRED POUNDS, without any Deduction, unto or amongft fuch Per-fon or Perfons, as fhall, within three Months from this Time, difcover any one or more of the Offenders concerned in Committing all or any of the Piracies above-mentioned, fo as fuch Offender or Offenders shall be apprehended and duly convicted thereof : Which Reward shall be paid by Samuel Seddon, Esq; Solicitor of the Admiralty, immediately after the Conviction of such Offender or Offenders.

And as a further Encouragement, any of the faid Offenders, (other than and except the respective Commander or Commanders of any of the abovementioned English Ships or Vessels) who shall discover any one or more, other of the faid Offenders, shall, on the Conviction of the Offender or Offenders so difcovered, be likewife entitled to His Majefty's most gracious Pardon.
