HIS Day, the Lords being met, a Message was sent to the Honourable House of Commons by Mr. Quarme, Deputy Gentleman-Usher of the Black Rod, acquainting them, that The Lords, authorized by Virtue of His Majesty's Commission, for declaring His Royal Affent to several Acts agreed upon by both Houses, do desire the immediate Attendance of this Honourable House in the House of Peers, to hear the Commission read; and the Commons being come thither, the faid Commission, impowering his Royal Highness the Duke of Cumberland, the Lord Keeper of the Great Seal, the Lord President of the Council, and feveral other Lords, to declare and notify the Royal Affent to the faid Bills was read accordingly, and the Royal Affent given to,

An Act for taking off the Prohibition of the Expor-tation of Corn, Malt, Meal, Flour, Bread, Biscuit,

An Act for punishing Mutiny and Desertion; and for the better Payment of the crmy and their Quarters. An Act for the Regulation of His Majesty's Marine Forces while on Shore

An Act to indemnify Persons who have omitted to qualify themselves for Offices and Employments within the Time limited by Law, and for allowing further

Time for that Purpofe.

An Ast to explain and amend an Ast passed in the Tauenty Second Year of His present Majesiy's Reign, intituled, An Ast for the more easy and speedy Recovery of finall De'ts within the Town and Berough of Southwark, and the several Parishes of Saint Saviour, Saint Mury at Newington, Saint Mary Magdalen Bermond-fey, Christ Church, Saint Mary Lambeth, and Saint Mary at Rotherhith, in the County of Surrey, and the several Precines and Liberties of the same, and the extending the Powers and Provisions of the said AA to such Part of the Eastern Half of the Hundred of Brixton, in the said County, as is not included in the said

An Act for repairing and widening the High Road leading from the Town of Mansfield in the County of Nottingham, through the Towns of Pieosley, Glapwell, Heath, and Normenton, and the Liberty of Hasland, to the Turnpike Road, leading from the Town of Derby, to the Turnpike Road, leading from the Town of Derby, to the Town of Chesterfield, in the County of Derby

An Act to continue, amend, and make effectual, an Act passed in the twelfth Year of the Reign of His pre-

fent Majesty, intituled, An Ast for repairing the Roads from the North West Parts of the County of Lincoln, through Nettlam Fields, Wragby Lane, and Baumber Fields, to the Wolds or North East Part of the fail County; and also for repairing and widening the Roads from the Well in East Gate, in the City of Lincoln, and from the North West End of Horncastle, and from the Guide Post, at the East End of Hainton, through Barkwith, to the Roads directed to be repaired by the faid

An Act for repairing several Roads leading to the Town of Bridgewater, in the County of Somerset, and for amending and rendering more effectual several Roads from the Cities of Gloucester and Bristol, and several other Roads in the Said Acts mentioned, in the Counties of Somerset and Gloucester.

An Ast for repairing and widening the Road from the Cross at Broken Cross in Macclesfield in the County of Chester, through Macclessield Forest, to the present Turnpike Road, at the South End of the Township of

Buxton, in the County of Derby.

An Act for repairing and widening the Road from Chesterfield, to the Turnithe Road at Hernstone-Lane-Head, and also the Road branching from the said Road upon the East Moor, through Baslow and Wardlow, to the joining of the said Roads again near Wardlow Mires; and also the Road leading between the said Road and Branch from Calver Bridge, to Bassow Bridge; and also the Road from the Turnpike Road near Newhaven House, to the Turnpike Road near Grindleford Bridge, in the County of Derby.
