P R E S E N T,

The KING's most Excellent Majesty
in Council.

WHEREAS His Majesty was pleased, by His Order in Council of the 20th of February last, to signify His Royal Pleasure, that the Bounties of Three Pounds for every Able Seaman, and of Thirty Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman and Able Bodied Landman, fit for His Majesty's Service, should be continued to be paid to all such who should voluntarily enter themselves on Board any of His Ships of War, on or before the 21st Day of April next; and that the said Bounties should be paid to them respectively, immediately after their first Muster on Board the Ships into which they should so enter—And whereas since the Issuing the aforementioned Order, His Majesty hath been given to understand, that there are at this Time dispersed in various Parts of the Kingdom, great Numbers of Seamen and Seafaring Men, many of whom may be inclined to enter into the Service, and reap the Benefit of His Majesty's said Bounties, provided that the Justices of the Peace, or other Magistrates (near to whom the said Seamen may reside) were authorized and directed to receive them, and to cause them to be conducted to any of the Ships of War;—His Majesty hath therefore been pleased, with the Advice of His Privy-Council, to Require and Command all the Justices of the Peace, and Mayors of Cities and Towns throughout the Kingdom of England and Wales, and likewise the Provosts of Edinburgh, Glasgow, and Aberdeen in Scotland, to receive all such Seamen and Seafaring Men, who shall appear before them, and offer to enter as Volunteers, in Case they are of Health and Ability fit for His Majesty's Service, and not above the Age of Fifty, nor under the Age of Twenty Years, and to grant to each Seaman a Certificate of such his voluntary Offer, and to cause them to be conducted, by proper Persons, to some Sea Officer employed in raising Men on Shore, or to the nearest Sea Port Town, in order to be put on Board any of His Majesty's Ships of War, which Sea Officer on Shore, or the Captains of

such Ships, are directed to pay to every such Seaman, after his being so put on Board (upon producing the Certificate aforementioned) the said Bounties of Three Pounds to every able Seaman, and of Thirty Shillings for every ordinary Seaman;—And to the End that His Majesty's Directions given herein may be made known to all Persons concerned, His Majesty has therefore ordered, that the same should be published in the London Gazette.

Fulde, April 5. On the 1st Instant, the Hereditary Prince of Brunswick marched to Meiningen with two Battalions of Grenadiers, and some Light Troops; and took Possession of that Place, where he found a considerable Magazine; two Battalions of the Elector of Cologne's Troops were, upon that Occasion, made Prisoners of War. His Serene Highness reached Wafungen the same Day, where the Battalion of Nagel, that garrisoned the Place, was likewise made Prisoners. Count d'Arberg, who had assembled some Austrian Grenadiers, with the Regiment of Hildburghausen, was coming to the Relief of Wafungen; but though that Affair was decided, there passed however a brisk Fire between the two Parties, which lasted some Time. After which M. d'Arberg's Troops were obliged to retire with so much Precipitation, that his Highness's Cavalry, who were detached in Pursuit of them, had not been able to come up with them.

His Highness lost only 35 Men; but it is imagined, the Loss on the Enemy's Side must be very considerable. M. d'Arberg thought proper, by the Advantage of the Night, to march to Schmalcalden, from whence he is retiring by Sula.

By Advices received here Yesterday we learn, that the Austrians had been driven back, and pursued beyond Sula and Schleusingen, and are retiring in great Disorder to Bamberg. The Prince is expected in this Neighbourhood by the 7th.

On the 2d Instant the Duke of Holstein dislodged the French from Freyensteinau, and made, upon that Occasion, one Captain, one Lieutenant, and Fifty-six Men Prisoners of War.

By Letters received on the 30th past from Dresden, it appears, That on the 26th General Knoblock had taken Possession of Saalfeldt, after a very brisk Cannonade; and that the Austrians were retiring towards Culmbach: And that on the 28th General Lindstadt had driven a Body of Austrians from Hoff, and had pursued them as far as Birck in their Retreat to Culmbach.

Breslaw, March 30. The Quarters of Cantonment of the Army, commanded by his Prussian Majesty, occupied a Space of some Miles, between Lignitz and Schweidnitz. The Austrian General Beck, who commands a Corps of Troops in the Higher Lusatia, a few Days ago, attacked the Post of Greiffenberg, upon the Frontier of Silesia, in which there was one Prussian Battalion, but Colonel Durlingheven, who commanded, having some Hours Notice before the Attack, had Time to send off his Baggage, &c. and expecting to have been succoured from Lowenberg, occupied a rising Ground which he thought he could maintain 'till he should be relieved, but the great Superiority of Beck's Corps (said to be upwards of four Thousand Men) made it impossible for the Succours to join him; so, after a very brave Defence, was obliged to surrender. There are no Particulars of the killed and wounded on either Side.

MY Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty having received many repeated Complaints of divers outrageous Acts of Piracy committed on Board great Numbers of Ships, as well English as Neutral, sailing in the English Channel, by the Crews of Ships or Vessels being or pretending to be English Privateers:

Their Lordships therefore, in order to detect and bring to Justice the Persons guilty of such Piracies and Robberies, (in Violation of the Laws of Nations in general, and of this Kingdom in particular, and to the great Dishonour thereof) are pleased to promise a Reward of FIVE HUNDRED POUNDS, unto or amongst such Person or Persons as shall, within Three Months from this Time, discover any one or more of the Offenders guilty of any such Acts of Piracy as aforesaid, so as such Offender or Offenders shall be apprehended and duly convicted thereof.

And in regard the Committing of such Offences as aforesaid are greatly encouraged by divers Persons as Accessaries thereto, who knowingly assist, maintain, counsel, or advise the Committing of such Acts of Piracy, and also by Persons who receive Goods so piratically taken, and entertain and conceal Offenders, knowing them to have committed such Robberies:

Their Lordships therefore, in order to detect or bring to Justice the Persons guilty of such last mentioned Offences, are pleased to promise a Reward of FIVE HUNDRED POUNDS, unto or amongst such Person or Persons as shall, within Three Months from this Time, discover any one or more of the Offenders guilty of any such Offences last

mentioned, so as such Offender or Offenders shall be apprehended and duly convicted thereof. Which said respective Rewards before mentioned, shall be paid, clear of all Deductions whatsoever, by Samuel Seddon, Esq; Solicitor of the Admiralty, immediately after the Conviction of such Offenders.

And as a further Encouragement, any of the said Offenders, (other than and except the respective Commander or Commanders of any such Piratical Ships or Vessels) who shall discover any one or more of the said Offenders, shall, on the Conviction of such Offender or Offenders so discovered, be intitled to His Majesty's most Gracious Pardon.

And their Lordships do also promise to grant, upon Request, to every Person, being a Seaman, (who by making any such Discovery or Discoveries, as aforesaid, shall be intitled to either to the Whole, or to any Part or Parts of any of the above-mentioned Rewards) an absolute Protection, to prevent his being impressed into His Majesty's Sea Service, during this present War with France.
