AT the Court at *St. James's*, the 14th Day of *April*, 1759,

P R E S E N T,

The KING's most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS His Majesty was pleased, by His Order in Council of the 20th of February last, to direct, that the Bounties of Three Pounds for every Able Seaman, and of Thirty Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, not above the Age of Fifty, nor under the Age of Twenty Years, and of Thirty Shillings for every Able Bodied Landman, not above the Age of Thirty-five, nor under the Age of Twenty Years, should be continued to be paid, immediately after the first Muster, to such Seamen and Landmen respectively, who should, on or before the 21st Day of this Instant April, enter themselves in the Royal Navy; and that the Rewards of Two Pounds for every Able, and Twenty Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, should likewise be continued to be paid to such Person or Persons, who should, on or before the Day above-mentioned, discover any concealed Seamen, so that such Seamen should be taken for His Majesty's Service; Which Time being now near expiring, His Majesty doth hereby order, with the Advice of His Privy-Council, that the said Bounties and Rewards be continued to be paid from the said 21st of this Instant April, until the 2d Day of June next. And whereas since the Issuing the aforementioned Order of the 20th of February, His Majesty had been given to understand, that there were dispersed in various Parts of the Kingdom, great Numbers of Seamen and Seafaring Men, some of whom were endeavouring to conceal themselves in order to avoid His Majesty's Service, and that others of them might be inclined to enter as Volunteers into the Service, and reap the Benefit of His Majesty's aforementioned Bounties, provided that the Justices of the Peace, or other Magistrates (near to whom the said Seamen reside) were authorized and directed to receive them, and to cause them to be conducted to any of the Ships of War—His Majesty was thereupon pleased, by His Orders in Council of the 9th of March last, to Require and Command all the Justices of the Peace, and Mayors of Cities

and Towns throughout the Kingdom of England and Wales, and likewise the Provosts of Edinburgh, Glasgow, and Aberdeen, in Scotland, to cause strict Search to be made, within their respective Jurisdictions, for all straggling Seamen and Seafaring Men, fit for His Majesty's Service, not above the Age of Fifty, nor under the Age of Twenty Years, and to take them up, and send them by careful Conductors to a Sea Officer employed in raising Men on Shore, or to the nearest Sea Port Town, in order to their being put on Board His Majesty's Ships of War: Which Conductors were to be paid by the said Sea Officer on Shore, or the Captains of such Ships to whom such Seamen should be delivered, Twenty Shillings for each Seaman, and Six-pence a Mile for each Man, for every Mile they might respectively Travel:—And the said Justices, and other Magistrates, were thereby likewise required and commanded, to receive all such Seamen and Seafaring Men, who should appear before them, and offer to enter as Volunteers, in Case they were of Health and Ability fit for His Majesty's Service, and not above the Age of Fifty, nor under the Age of Twenty Years, and to grant to each Seaman a Certificate of such his voluntary Offer, and to cause them to be conducted, in like Manner, and with the same Allowances, as above directed with respect to Straggling Seamen:—And the Sea Officer on Shore, or the Captains of such Ships, to whom such Volunteer Seamen should be delivered, were directed to pay to every such Seaman, after his being so put on Board (upon producing the Certificate aforementioned) the Bounties of Three Pounds to every able Seaman, and of Thirty Shillings to every ordinary Seaman;—And His Majesty judging it necessary for His Service, that all the afore-recited Directions, contained in His Majesty's said Orders in Council, of the 9th of March last, should be continued until the 2d Day of June next, doth hereby Order, with the Advice of His Privy Council, that the same be continued, and remain in full Force, until the said 2d Day of June next accordingly—Whereof all the afore-said Justices of the Peace, and other Magistrates, as likewise all other Persons, whom it may concern, are to take Notice, and yield due Obedience hereunto.

WHEREAS the Time limited by His Majesty's Order in Council of the 15th of September last, for prohibiting the exporting out of this Kingdom, or carrying Coastwise, Gunpowder, Salt Petre, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition, will expire upon the 29th Day of this Instant April—And whereas it is judged expedient for His Majesty's Service, and the Safety of this Kingdom, that the said Prohibition should be continued for some longer Time, —His Majesty doth therefore, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, hereby Order, Require, Prohibit and Command, that no Person or Persons whatsoever (except the Master General, Lieutenant General, or principal Officers of the Ordnance for His Majesty's Service) do, at any Time during the Space of Six Months, to commence from the said 29th Day of this Instant April, presume to transport into any Parts out of this Kingdom, or carry Coastwise, any Gunpowder, Salt Petre, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition, or Ship, or lade, any Gunpowder, Salt Petre, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition, on Board any Ship or Vessel, in order to transporting the same into any Parts beyond the Seas, or carrying the same Coastwise, without Leave or Permission in that Behalf, first obtained from His Majesty, or His Privy Council, upon Pain of incurring and suffering the respective Forfeitures and Penalties inflicted by an Act passed in the Twenty Ninth Year of His Majesty's Reign, entituled, "An Act to impower His Majesty to prohibit the Exportation of Salt Petre, and to enforce the Law for empowering His Majesty to prohibit the Exportation of Gunpowder, or any Sort of Arms and Ammunition; and also to empower His Majesty to restrain the carrying Coastwise of Salt Petre, Gunpowder, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition."—And the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, the Commissioners for executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, the Lieutenant General and principal Officers of the Ordnance, and His Majesty's Secretary at War, are to give the necessary Directions herein, as to them may respectively appertain.

GOD Save the KING.

Copenhagen, April 3. Letters received here from Tranquebar, on the Coast of Coromandel, dated the 23d of June, 1758, say, That a Fleet of 11 French Men of War came on that Coast the 27th of April: That the next Day the English Fleet under Admiral Pocock passed by that Fort, on Sight of which the French Squadron weighed Anchor, and put to Sea: That the English pursued them, and in the Afternoon a very brisk Engagement began; in which, it was said, the French had lost 900 Men, and the English two Ships, and a great many Men, and that after the Action a French Ship of 74 Guns run aground: That the French and all their Militia, under the Command of Lieutenant General Lally, marched to Fort St. David's and Goudelour: That the latter was taken by Capitulation, and Fort St. David's was likewise obliged to surrender after a severe Bombardment; and that thereupon the French were making all necessary Preparations for attacking Madras, after they had made themselves Masters of Tanjour, or that their Demands there should have been complied with. Subsequent Letters, dated likewise from Tranquebar, of August 27, farther say, that the French marched the 25th of June to Tanjour, where they arrived the beginning of August, and made an Attempt upon that Place, in which, to their great Surprize, they were not able to succeed, those in Tanjour having carried on a Negotiation with them for some Time, and taken their Measures so well, that the French found themselves in great Distress for want of Subsistence, and were attacked furiously on all Sides; and though they had made a Breach sufficient for 15 Men to enter a Breast, yet they were obliged, for want of Provisions and Ammunition, to decamp, and abandon Tanjour the 18th of August, leaving behind them five large Pieces of Cannon. Their Loss in Men however was not very considerable. That during the Siege of Tanjour both the French and English Fleets were cruising off the Coast of Coromandel, and were alternately in the Road of Carical, till the 3d of August, when they came to an Engagement, which lasted two Hours, and was very brisk. That the Loss of the French therein was very great, and they found themselves obliged to retire to Pondicherry, where they remained. That the English were come to Carical, where they

they had taken two or three French Barks, which were going by. And that, on the 20th of August, General Lally returned with his Army to Carical, and on the 23d marched by Tranquebar, in his Way to Pondicherry.

Admiralty Office, April 16.

On the 3d Instant, His Majesty's Ships the Deptford and Brilliant fell in with a Privateer Snow belonging to Dunkirk, which the Brilliant took; she is called the Marquis de Barail, commanded by Godefroy Bachelier, mounted 14 Guns, with 104 Men, and is carried into Kinfales.

Captain Duff, of His Majesty's Ship Rochester, gives an Account, that on the 8th Instant in the Morning, he gave Chase to a Cutter, and in the Afternoon she got within some Sands where the Rochester could not follow her, but the Grace Cutter, assisted by the Rochester's Boats, took her; she is called the Carillonneur, belonging to Dunkirk, carried 8 Guns and 60 Men. Captain Duff has sent her to the Downes.

MY Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty having received many repeated Complaints of divers outrageous Acts of Piracy committed on Board great Numbers of Ships, as well English as Neutral, sailing in the English Channel, by the Crews of Ships or Vessels being or pretending to be English Privateers:

Their Lordships therefore, in order to detect and bring to Justice the Persons guilty of such Piracies and Robberies, (in Violation of the Laws of Nations in general, and of this Kingdom in particular, and to the great Dishonour thereof) are pleased to promise a Reward of FIVE HUNDRED POUNDS, unto or amongst such Person or Persons as shall, within Three Months from this Time, discover any one or more of the Offenders guilty of any such Acts of Piracy as aforesaid, so as such Offender or Offenders shall be apprehended and duly convicted thereof.

And in regard the Committing of such Offences as aforesaid are greatly encouraged by divers Persons as Accessories thereto, who knowingly assist, maintain, counsel, or advise the Committing of such Acts of Piracy, and also by Persons who receive Goods so piratically taken, and entertain and conceal Offenders, knowing them to have committed such Robberies:

Their Lordships therefore, in order to detect or bring to Justice the Persons guilty of such last mentioned Offences, are pleased to promise a Reward of FIVE HUNDRED POUNDS, unto or amongst such Person or Persons as shall, within Three Months from this Time, discover any one or more of the Offenders guilty of any such Offences last mentioned, so as such Offender or Offenders shall be apprehended and duly convicted thereof. Which said respective Rewards before mentioned, shall be paid, clear of all Deductions whatsoever, by Samuel Seddon, Esq; Solicitor of the Admiralty, immediately after the Conviction of such Offenders.

And as a further Encouragement, any of the said Offenders, (other than and except the respective Com-

mander or Commanders of any such Piratical Ships or Vessels; who shall discover any one or more of the said Offenders, shall, on the Conviction of such Offender or Offenders so discovered, be intitled to His Majesty's most Gracious Pardon.

And their Lordships do also promise to grant, upon Request, to every Person, being a Seaman, (who by making any such Discovery or Discoveries, as aforesaid, shall be intitled to either to the Whole, or to any Part or Parts of any of the above-mentioned Rewards) an absolute Protection, to prevent his being impressed into His Majesty's Sea Service, during this present War with France.
