The KING's most Excellent Majesty in Council.

'HEREAS His Majefty was pleafed, by His Order in Council of the 20th of February last, to direct, that the Bounties of Three Pounds for every Able Seaman, and of Thirty Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, not above the Age of Fifty, nor under the Age of Twenty Years, and of Thirty Shillings for every Able Bodied Landman, not above the Age of Thirty-five, nor under the Age of Twenty Years, fhould be continued to be paid, immediately after the first Muster, to fuch Seamen and Landmen respectively, who should, on or before the 21st Day of this Inftant April, enter themfelves in the Royal Navy; and that the Rewards of Two Pounds for every Able, and Twenty Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, fhould likewife be continued to be paid to fuch Perfon or Perfons, who fhould, on or before the Day above-mentioned, discover any concealed Seamen, fo that fuch Seamen should be taken for His Majefty's Service; Which Time being now near expiring, His Majefty doth hereby order, with the Advice of His Privy-Council, that the faid Bounties and Rewards be continued to be paid from the faid 21st of this Instant April, until the 2d Day of June next. And whereas fince the Isluing the aforementioned Order of the 20th of February, His Majesty had been given to understand, that there were dispersed in various Parts of the Kingdom, great Numbers of Seamen and Seafaring Men, fome of whom were endeavouring to conceal themfelves in order to avoid His Majesty's Service, and that others of them might be inclined to enter as Voluntiers into the Service, and reap the Benefit of His Majesty's aforementioned Bounties, provided that the Justices of the Peace, or other Magiftrates (near to whom the faid Seamen refide) were authorized and directed to receive them, and to caufe them to be conducted to any of the Ships of War-His Majefty was thereupon pleafed, by His Orders in Council of the oth of March laft, to Require and Command all the Juffices of the Peace, and Mayors of Cities

A^T the Court at St. James's, the 14th Day of April, 1759, and Towns throughout the Kingdom of Eng-land and Wales, and likewife the Provofts of land and Wales, and likewife the Provofts of Edinburgh, Glasgow, and Aberdeen, in Scot-land, to cause strict Search to be made, within their respective Jurisdictions, for all ftraggling Seamen and Seafaring Men, fit for His Majesty's Service, not above the Age of Fifty, nor under the Age of Twenty Years, and to take them up, and fend them by careful Conductors to a Sea Officer employed in raifing Men on Shore, or to the nearest Sea Port Town, in order to their being put on Board His Majefty's Ships of War: Which Conductors were to be paid by the faid Sea Officer on Shore, or the Captains of fuch Ships to whom fuch Seamen should be delivered, Twenty Shillings for each Seaman, and Six-pence a Mile for each Man, for every Mile they might respectively Travel : - And the faid Juffices, and other Magistrates, were thereby likewise required and commanded, to receive all fuch Seamen and Seafaring Men, who should appear before them, and offer to enter as Voluntiers, in Cafe they were of Health and Ability fit for His Majefty's Service, and not above the Age of Fifty, nor under the Age of Twenty Years, and to grant to each Seaman a Certificate of such his voluntary Offer, and to caufe them to be conducted, in like Manner, and with the fame Allowances, as above directed with refpect to Straggling Seamen :- And the Sea Officer on Shore, or the Captains of fuch Ships, to whom fuch Voluntier Seamen fhould be delivered, were directed to pay to every fuch Seaman, after his being fo put on Board (upon producing the Certificate aforementioned) the Bounties of Three Pounds to every able Sea-man, and of Thirty Shillings to every ordinary Seaman; — And His Majefty judging it ne-ceffary for His Service, that all the afore-recited Directions, contained in His Majefty's faid Orders in Council, of the 9th of March 1aft, fhould be continued until the 2d Day of June next, doth hereby Order, with the Advice of His Privy Council, that the fame be continued. and remain in full Force, until the faid 2d Day of June next accordingly------Whereof all the aforefaid Juffices of the Peace, and other Magiftrates, as likewife all other Perfons, whom it may concern, are to take Notice, and yield due Obedience hereunto.

HEREAS the Time limited by His Majefty's Order in Council of the 15th of September laft, for prohibiting the exporting out of this Kingdom, or carrying Coaftwife, Gunpowder, Salt Petre, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition, will expire upon the 29th Day of this Inftant April-And whereas it is judged expedient for His Majesty's Service, and the Safety of this Kingdom, that the faid Prohibition should be continued for some longer Time, -His Majefty doth therefore, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, hereby Order, Require, Prohibit and Command, that no Per-fon or Perfons whatfoever (except the Mafter General, Lieutenant General, or principal Officers of the Ordnance for His Majefty's Service) do, at any Time during the Space of Six Months, to commence from the faid 20th Day of this Inftant April, prefume to transport into any Parts out of this Kingdom, or carry Coaftwile, any Gunpowder, Salt Petre, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition, or ship, or lade, any Gunpowder, Salt Petre, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition, on Board any Ship or Veffel, in order to transporting the fame into any Parts beyond the Seas, or carrying the fame Coaftwife, without Leave or Permiffion in that Behalf, first obtained from His Majefty, or His Privy Council, upon Pain of incurring and fuffering the refpective Forfeitures and Penalties inflicted by an Act paffed in the Twenty Ninth Year of His Majefty's Reign, entituled, "An Act to impower "His Majefty to prohibit the Exportation of " Salt Petre, and to enforce the Law for em-" powering His Majefty to prohibit the Expor-tation of Gunpowder, or any Sort of Arms " and Ammunition; and allo to empower His " Majefty to reftrain the carrying Coaftwife of " Salt Petre, Gunpowder, or any Sort of Arms " or Ammunition."-And the Lords Commiffioners of His Majefty's Treafury, the Commiffioners for executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, the Lieutenant General and principal Officers of the Ordnance, and His Majefty's Secretary at War, are to give the neceffary Directions herein, as to them may refpectively appertain. GOD Save the KING.

Copenhagen, April 3. Letters received here from Tranquebar, on the Coaft of Coromandel, dated the 23d of June, 1758, fay, That a Fleet of 11 French Men of War came on that Coaft the 27th of April : That the next Day the English Fleet under Admiral Pocock passed by that Fort, on Sight of which the French Squadron weighed Anchor, and put to Sea : That the English purfued them, and in the Afternoon a very brifk Engagement began ; in which, it. was faid, the French had loft 900 Men, and the English two Ships, and a great many Men, and that after the Action a French Ship of 74. Guns run aground : That the French and all their Militia, under the Command of Lieutenant General Lally, marched to Fort St. Da-vid's and Goudelour : That the latter was taken by Capitulation, and Fort St. David's was likewife obliged to furrender after a fevere Bombardment; and that thereupon the French were making all neceffary Preparations for attacking Madrafs, after they had made themfelves Mafters of Tanjour, or that their Demands there fhould have been complied with. Subfequent Letters, dated likewife from Tranquebar, of August 27, farther fay, that the French marched the 25th of June to Tanjour, where they arrived the beginning of August, and made an Attempt upon that Place, in which, to their great Surprize, they were not able to fucceed, those in Tanjour having carried on a Negociation with them for fome Time, and taken their Meafures fo well, that the French found themselves in great Diffress for want of Sublistance, and were attacked furiously on all Sides; and though they had made a Breach fufficient for 15 Men to enter a Breaft, yet they were obliged, for want of Provisions and Ammunition, to decamp, and abandon Tanjour the 18th of August, leaving behind them five large Pieces of Cannon. Their Lofs in Men however was not very confiderable. That during the Siege of Tanjour both the French and English Fleets were cruifing off the Coast of Coromandel, and were alternately in the Road of Carical, till the 3d of August, when they came to an Engagement, which lafted two Hours, and was very brifk. That the Lofs of the French therein was very great, and they found themfelves obliged to retire to Pondicherry, where they remained. That the English were come to Carical, where they

they had taken two or three French Barks, which were going by. And that, on the 20th of August, General Lally returned with his Army to Carical, and on the 23d marched by Tranquebar, in his Way to Pondicherry.

Admiralty Office, April 16. On the 3d Inftant, His Majefty's Ships the Deptford and Brilliant fell in with a Privateer Snow belonging to Dunkirk, which the Brilliant took ; The is called the Marquis de Barail, commanded by Godefroy Bachelier, mounted 14 Guns, with 104 Men, and is carried into Kinfale.

Captain Duff, of His Majefty's Ship Kochefter, gives an Account, that on the 8th Inftant in the Morning, he gave Chafe to a Cutter, and in the Afternoon the got within fome Sands where the Rochefter could not follow her, but the Grace Cutter, affisted by the Rochester's Boats, took her ; the is called the Carilloneur, belonging to Dunkirk, carried 8 Guns and 60 Men. Captain Duff has fent her to the Downes.

MY Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty having received many repeated Complaints of divers outragious Acts of Piracy committed on Board great Numbers of Ships, as well English as Neutral, failing in the English Channel, by the Crews of Ships or Veilels being or pretending to be English Privateers :

Their Lordships therefore, in order to detect and bring to Juffice the Perfons guilty of fuch Piracies and Robberies, (in Violation of the Laws of Na-tions in general, and of this Kingdom in particular, and to the great Dishonour thereof) are pleased to promile a Reward of FIVE HUNDRED FOUNDS, unto or amongft fuch Person or Persons as shall, within Three Months from this Time, difcover any one or more of the Offenders guilty of any fuch Acts of Piracy as aforefaid, fo as fuch Offender or Offenders shall be apprehended and duly convicted thereof.

And in regard the Committing of fuch Offences as aforefaid are greatly encouraged by divers Perfons as Accessaries thereto, who knowingly affift, maintain, councel, or advife the Committing of fuch Acts of Piracy, and also by Persons who receive Goods to piratically taken, and entertain and conceal GF enders, knowing them to have committed fuch Rollberies :

Their Lordships therefore, in order to detect or bring to Justice the Perfons guilty of fuch last mentioned Gliences, are pleafed to promife a Reward of FIVE HUNDRED POUNDS, unto or amongfi fuch Perfon or Perfons as shall, within Three Months from this Time, discover any one or more of the Offenders guilty of any fuch Offences last mentioned, to as fuch Offender or Offenders shall be apprehended and duly convicted thereof. Which faid respective Rewards before mensioned, shall be paid, clear of all Deductions whatfoever, by Samuel Seddon, Eiq; Solicitor of the Admiralty, immediately after the Conviction of fuch Offenders.

And as a further Encouragement, any of the faid Offenders, (other than and encept the respective Commander or Commanders of any fuch Piratical Ships or Veffels) who shall discover any one or more of the faid Ottenders, shall, on the Conviction of fuch Offender or Offenders fo difcovered, be intitled to His Majefty's most Gracious Pardon.

And their Lordships do also promise to grant, upon Request, to every Person, being a Seaman, (who by making any fuch Discovery or Discoveries, as aforefaid, shall be intitled to either to the Whole, or to any Part or Parts of any of the above-mentioned Rewards) an absolute Protection, to prevent his being impressed into His Majesty's Sea Service, during this prefent War with France.
