AT the Court at St. James's, the 14th Day of April, 1759,

P R E S E N T,

The KING's most Excellent Majesty
in Council.

WHEREAS His Majesty was pleased, by His Order in Council of the 20th of February last, to direct, that the Bounties of Three Pounds for every Able Seaman, and of Thirty Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, not above the Age of Fifty, nor under the Age of Twenty Years, and of Thirty Shillings for every Able Bodied Landman, not above the Age of Thirty-five, nor under the Age of Twenty Years, should be continued to be paid, immediately after the first Muster, to such Seamen and Landmen respectively, who should, on or before the 21st Day of this Instant April, enter themselves in the Royal Navy; and that the Rewards of Two Pounds for every Able, and Twenty Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, should likewise be continued to be paid to such Person or Persons, who should, on or before the Day above-mentioned, discover any concealed Seamen; so that such Seamen should be taken for His Majesty's Service; Which Time being now near expiring, His Majesty doth hereby order, with the Advice of His Privy-Council, that the said Bounties and Rewards be continued to be paid from the said 21st of this Instant April, until the 2d Day of June next. And whereas since the Issuing the aforementioned Order of the 20th of February, His Majesty had been given to understand, that there were dispersed in various Parts of the Kingdom, great Numbers of Seamen and Seafaring Men, some of whom were endeavouring to conceal themselves in order to avoid His Majesty's Service, and that others of them might be inclined to enter as Volunteers into the Service, and reap the Benefit of His Majesty's aforementioned Bounties, provided that the Justices of the Peace, or other Magistrates (near to whom the said Seamen reside) were authorized and directed to receive them, and to cause them to be conducted to any of the Ships of War—His Majesty was thereupon pleased, by His Orders in Council of the 9th of March last, to Require and Command all the Justices of the Peace, and Mayors of Cities

and Towns throughout the Kingdom of England and Wales, and likewise the Provosts of Edinburgh, Glasgow, and Aberdeen, in Scotland, to cause strict Search to be made, within their respective Jurisdictions, for all straggling Seamen and Seafaring Men, fit for His Majesty's Service, not above the Age of Fifty, nor under the Age of Twenty Years, and to take them up, and send them by careful Conductors to a Sea Officer employed in raising Men on Shore, or to the nearest Sea Port Town, in order to their being put on Board His Majesty's Ships of War: Which Conductors were to be paid by the said Sea Officer on Shore, or the Captains of such Ships to whom such Seamen should be delivered, Twenty Shillings for each Seaman, and Six-pence a Mile for each Man, for every Mile they might respectively Travel:—And the said Justices, and other Magistrates, were thereby likewise required and commanded, to receive all such Seamen and Seafaring Men, who should appear before them, and offer to enter as Volunteers, in Case they were of Health and Ability fit for His Majesty's Service, and not above the Age of Fifty, nor under the Age of Twenty Years, and to grant to each Seaman a Certificate of such his voluntary Offer, and to cause them to be conducted, in like Manner, and with the same Allowances, as above directed with respect to Straggling Seamen:—And the Sea Officer on Shore, or the Captains of such Ships, to whom such Volunteer Seamen should be delivered, were directed to pay to every such Seaman, after his being so put on Board (upon producing the Certificate aforementioned) the Bounties of Three Pounds to every able Seaman, and of Thirty Shillings to every ordinary Seaman;—And His Majesty judging it necessary for His Service, that all the afore-recited Directions, contained in His Majesty's said Orders in Council, of the 9th of March last, should be continued until the 2d Day of June next, doth hereby Order, with the Advice of His Privy Council, that the same be continued, and remain in full Force, until the said 2d Day of June next accordingly.—Whereof all the afore-said Justices of the Peace, and other Magistrates, as likewise all other Persons, whom it may concern, are to take Notice, and yield due Obedience hereunto.

WHEREAS the Time limited by His Majesty's Order in Council of the 15th of September last, for prohibiting the exporting out of this Kingdom, or carrying Coastwise, Gunpowder, Salt Petre, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition, will expire upon the 29th Day of this Instant April—And whereas it is judged expedient for His Majesty's Service, and the Safety of this Kingdom, that the said Prohibition should be continued for some longer Time,—His Majesty doth therefore, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, hereby Order, Require, Prohibit and Command, that no Person or Persons whatsoever (except the Master General, Lieutenant General, or principal Officers of the Ordnance for His Majesty's Service) do, at any Time during the Space of Six Months, to commence from the said 29th Day of this Instant April, presume to transport into any Parts out of this Kingdom, or carry Coastwise, any Gunpowder, Salt Petre, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition, or ship, or lade, any Gunpowder, Salt Petre, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition, on Board any Ship or Vessel, in order to transporting the same into any Parts beyond the Seas, or carrying the same Coastwise, without Leave or Permission in that Behalf, first obtained from His Majesty, or His Privy Council, upon Pain of incurring and suffering the respective Forfeitures and Penalties inflicted by an Act passed in the Twenty Ninth Year of His Majesty's Reign, entituled, "An Act to empower His Majesty to prohibit the Exportation of Salt Petre, and to enforce the Law for empowering His Majesty to prohibit the Exportation of Gunpowder, or any Sort of Arms and Ammunition; and also to empower His Majesty to restrain the carrying Coastwise of Salt Petre, Gunpowder, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition."—And the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, the Commissioners for executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, the Lieutenant General and principal Officers of the Ordnance, and His Majesty's Secretary at War, are to give the necessary Directions herein, as to them may respectively appertain.

HIS Majesty in Council was this Day pleased to appoint John Gale, of Cleater, Esq; to be Sheriff of the County of Cumberland, in the room of James Spedding, of Whitehaven, Esq; deceased.

Kensington, April 24.

This Day His Majesty, and the Royal Family, came from St. James's to reside here for the Summer.

Castle of Schweinbaus, near the Head Quarters of Bolckenhayn, April 4.

On the 31st past, the King of Prussia, upon the Enemy's having moved towards Landshut, gave Orders to march the next Morning, and fixed the Head Quarters at Bolckenhayn, a small Town in the Mountains near Landshut; and the Cavalry advanced the same Day, and occupied the Quarters His Majesty had left. On the 2d of April, the King of Prussia detached some Battalions to occupy the strong Pass of Wartha in the Duchy of Munsterberg, which they took Possession of the next Day, and every Thing remained quiet upon the Frontier. It was said, that the Austrian Army would assemble at Munchengratz in the Circle of Buntzlau.

Head Quarters of Prince Ferdinand at Windeken, April 14.

The Troops of the Allied Army that were employed against that of the Empire, returned on the 7th Instant into the Neighbourhood of Fulde. On the 10th Instant Prince Ferdinand marched by Freyensteinau and Budingen to Windeken, where he arrived the 12th. On the 13th his Serene Highness marched to Bergen, a Village situated between Francfort and Hanau, where the French occupied a very strong Post, which it was necessary to get Possession of, in order to come at the Enemy's Line. The Army arrived at Nine in the Morning, opposite that of the Enemy, and the Grenadiers of the advanced Guard immediately began the Attack upon Bergen, with great Intrepidity, and received a very brisk Fire, which the Enemy had prepared for them; and that they were supported by a Reinforcement of several Battalions under Prince Isenbourg's Command, they could not however carry their Point so far as to dislodge the Enemy entirely from the Village, but were forced to retreat in some Disorder; yet rallied again upon being supported by the Hessian Horse. The rest of the Day passed in a Cannonade on both Sides, without any Ground being gained on either. His Serene Highness not having been able to succeed in forcing the Enemy in their Post, returned to Windeken, after having given Orders for burying the Dead, and carrying off the Wounded. The Loss on the Side of the Allied Army is not particularly known, but it is supposed, it does not exceed that of 1000 Men. Five Pieces of Cannon were lost, having been left behind in the Village. Prince Isenbourg is among the Slain; and the Generals Gilfoe, and Count Schulembourg among the Wounded.

Berlin, April 14. The Fort of Peenamunde, in Pomerania, surrendered between the 10th and 11th of this Month to General Manteufel, who commanded the Army in the Absence of

Admiralty Office, March 13, 1759.

MY Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty having received many repeated Complaints of divers outrageous Acts of Piracy committed on Board great Numbers of Ships, as well English as Neutral, sailing in the English Channel, by the Crews of Ships or Vessels being or pretending to be English Privateers :

Their Lordships therefore, in order to detect and bring to Justice the Persons guilty of such Piracies and Robberies, (in Violation of the Laws of Nations in general, and of this Kingdom in particular, and to the great Dishonour thereof) are pleased to promise a Reward of FIVE HUNDRED POUNDS, unto or amongst such Person or Persons as shall within Three Months from this Time, discover any one or more of the Offenders guilty of any such Acts of Piracy as aforesaid, so as such Offender or Offenders shall be apprehended and duly convicted thereof.

And in regard the Committing of such Offences as aforesaid are greatly encouraged by divers Persons as Accessaries thereto, who knowingly assist, maintain, counsel, or advise the Committing of such Acts of Piracy, and also by Persons who receive Goods so piratically taken, and entertain and conceal Offenders, knowing them to have committed such Robberies :

Their Lordships therefore, in order to detect or bring to Justice the Persons guilty of such last mentioned Offences, are pleased to promise a Reward of FIVE HUNDRED POUNDS, unto or amongst such Person or Persons as shall, within Three Months from this Time, discover any one or more of the Offenders guilty of any such Offences last mentioned, so as such Offender or Offenders shall be apprehended and duly convicted thereof. Which said respective Rewards before mentioned, shall be paid, clear of all Deductions whatsoever, by Samuel Seddon, Esq; Solicitor of the Admiralty, immediately after the Conviction of such Offenders.

And as a further Encouragement, any of the said Offenders, (other than and except the respective Commander or Commanders of any such Piratical Ships or Vessels) who shall discover any one or more of the said Offenders, shall, on the Conviction of such Offender or Offenders so discovered, be intitled to His Majesty's most Gracious Pardon.

And their Lordships do also promise to grant, upon Request, to every Person, being a Seaman, (who by making any such Discovery or Discoveries, as aforesaid, shall be intitled to either to the Whole or to any Part or Parts of any of the above-mentioned Rewards) an absolute Protection, to prevent his being impressed into His Majesty's Sea Service, during this present War with France.
