The KING's most Excellent Majesty in Council.

HEREAS His Majefty was pleafed, by His Order in Council of the 20th of February last, to direct, that the Bounties of Three Pounds for every Able Seaman, and of Thirty Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, not above the Age of Fifty, nor under the Age of Twenty Years, and of Thirty Shillings for every Able Bodied Landman, not above the Age of Thirty-five, nor under the Age of Twenty Years, should be continued to be paid, immediately after the first Muster, to fuch Seamen and Landmen respectively, who should, on or before the 21st Day of this Inftant April, enter themselves in the Royal Navy; and that the Rewards o: Two Pounds for every Able, and Twenty Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, should likewife be continued to be paid to fuch Perfon or Perfons, who should, on or before the Day above-mentioned, difcover any concealed Seamen, fo that fuch Seamen should be taken for His Majefty's Service; Which Time being now near expiring, His Majesty doth hereby order, with the Advice of His Privy-Council, that the faid Bounties and Rewards be continued to be paid from the faid 21ft of this Inftant April, until the 2d Day of June next. And whereas fince the Ifluing the aforementioned Order of the 20th of February, His Majesty had been given to understand, that there were dispersed in various Parts of the Kingdom, great Numbers of Seamen and Seafaring Men, fome of whom were endeavouring to conceal themfelves in order to avoid His Majefty's Service, and that others of them might be inclined to enter as Voluntiers into the Service, and reap the Benefit of His Majesty's aforementioned Bounties, provided that the Juffices of the Peace, or other Magiftrates (near to whom the faid Seamen refide) were authorized and directed to receive them, and to caufe them to be conducted to any of the Ships of War-His Majefty was thereupon pleafed, by His Orders in Council of the 9th of March last, to Require and Command all the Justices of the Peace, and Mayors of Cities

A T the Court at St. James's, the 14th and Towns throughout the Kingdom of Eng-land and Wales, and likewife the Provofts of land and Wales, and likewife the Provofts of Edinburgh, Glafgow, and Aberdeen, in Scot-land, to caufe strict Search to be made, within their respective Jurisdictions, for all straggling Seamen and Seafaring Men, fit for His Majefty's Service, not above the Age of Fifty, nor under the Age of Twenty Years, and to take them up, and fend them by careful Conductors to a Sea Officer employed in raifing Men on Shore, or to the nearest Sea Port Town, in order to their being put on Board His Majefty's Ships of War: Which Conductors were to be paid by the foid Sea Officer on Shore, or the Captains of fuch Ships to whom fuch Seamen should be delivered, Twenty Shillings for each Seaman, and Six-pence a Mile for each Man, for every Mile they might respectively Travel : - And the faid Juffices, and other Magistrates, were thereby likewife required and commanded, to receive all fuch Seamen and Seafaring Men, who fhould appear before them, and offer to enter as Voluntiers, in Cafe they were of Health and Ability fit for His Majefty's Service, and not above the Age of Fifty, nor under the Age of Twenty Years, and to grant to each Seaman a Certificate of fuch his voluntary Offer, and to caufe them to be conducted, in like Manner, and with the fame Allowances, as above directed with refpect to Straggling Seamen :- And the Sea Officer on Shore, or the Captains of fuch Ships, to whom fuch Voluntier Seamen fhould be delivered, were directed to pay to every fuch Seaman, after his being fo put on Board (upon producing the Certificate aforementioned) the Bounties of Three Pounds to every able Sea-man, and of Thirty Shillings to every ordinary Seaman; — And His Majefty judging it neceffary for His Service, that all the afore-recited Directions, contained in His Majesty's faid Orders in Council, of the 9th of March last, fhould be continued until the 2d Day of June next, doth hereby Order, with the Advice of His Privy Council, that the fame be continued, and remain in full Force, until the faid 2d Day –Whereof all the of June next accordinglyaforefaid Juffices of the Peace, and other Magiffrates, as likewife all other Perfons, whom it may concern, are to take Notice, and yield due Obedience hereunto.

THEREAS the Time limited by His Majefty's Order in Council of the 15th of September laft, for prohibiting the exporting out of this Kingdom, or carrying Coaftwife, Gunpowder, Salt Petre, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition, will expire upon the 29th Day of this Inflant April-And whereas it is judged expedient for His Majefty's Service, and the Safety of this Kingdom, that the faid Prohibition should be continued for some longer Time, -His Majesty doth theretore, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, hereby Orcer, Require, Prohibit and Command, that no Perfon or Perfons whatfoever (except the Mafter General, Lieutenant General, or principal Officers of the Ordnance for His Majefte's Service) -do, at any Ti ne during the Space of Six Months, to commence from the faid 29th Day of this Instant April, prefume to transport into any Parts out of this Kingdom, or carry Coaflwife, any Gunpowder, Salt Petre, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition, or ship, or lade, any Gunpowder, Salt Petre, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition, on Board any Ship or Vefiel, in order to transporting the same into any Parts beyond the Seas, or carrying the fame Coaftwife, without Leave or Permission in that Behalf, first obtained from His Majefty, or His Privy Council, upon Pain of incurring and fuffering the refpective Forfeitures and Penalties inflicted by an Act paffed in the Twenty Ninth Year of His Majefty's Reign, entituled, "An Act to impower "His Majefty to prohibit the Exportation of "Salt Petre, and to enforce the Law for em-55 powering His Majefry to prohibit the Expor-" tation of Gunpowder, or any Sort of Arms " and Ammunition; and alfo to empower His " Majefty to reftrain the carrying Coaftwife of " Salt Petre, Gunpowder, or any Sort of A ms " or Ammunition."-And the Lords Commilfioners of His Majefty's Treafury, the Commilfioners for executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, the Lieutenant General and principal Officers of the Ordnance, and His Majefty's Secretary at War, are to give the neceflary Directions herein, as to them may refpectively appertain. IS Majefty in Council was this Day pleafed to appoint John Gale, of Cleater, Efq; to be Sheriff of the County of Cumberland, in the room of James Spedding, of Whitehaven, Efq; deceafed. Kenfington, April 24.

This Day His Majefty, and the Royal Family, came from St. James's to relide here for the Summer.

Caftle of Schweinhaus, near the Head Quarters of Bolckenhayn, April 4.

On the 31ft paft, the King of Pruffia, upon the Enemy's having moved towards Landfhut, gave Orders to march the next Morning, and fixed the Head Quarters at Bolckenhayn, a finall Town in the Mountains near Landfhut; and the Cavalry advanced the fame Day, and occupied the Quarters His Majefty had left. On the 2d of April, the King of Pruffia detached fome Batallions to occupy the ftrong Pafs of Wartha in the Dutchy of Munfterberg, which they took Poffeffion of the next Day, and every Thing remained quiet upon the Frontier. It was faid, that the Auftrian Army would affemble at Munchengratz in the Circle of Buntzlau.

Head Quarters of Prince Ferdinand at Windcken, April 14.

The Troops of the Allied Army that were employed against that of the Empire, returned on the 7th Inftant into the Neighbourhood of Fulde. On the 10th Inftant Prince Ferdinand marched by Freyensteinau and Budingen to Windeken, where he arrived the 12th. On the 13th his Serene Highness marched to Bergen, a Village fituated between Francfort and Hanau, where the French occupied a very ftrong Poft, which it was neceffary to get Pof-fethon of, in order to come at the Enemy's The Army arrived at Nine in the Line. Morning, opposite that of the Enemy, and the Grenadiers of the advanced Guard immediately began the Attack upon Bergen with great Intrepidity, and received a very brifk Fire, which the Enemy had prepared for them; and thos they were supported by a Reinforcement of feveral Battalions under Prince Ifenbourg's Command, they could not however carry their Point fo far as to diflodge the Enemy entirely from the Village, but were forced to retreat in fome Diforder; yet rallied again upon being fup-ported by the Heffian Horfe. The rest of the Day paffed in a Cannonade on both Sides, without any Ground being gained on either.* His Serene Highness not having been able to fucceed in forcing the Enemy in their Poft, returned to Windeken, after having given Orders for burying the Dead, and carrying off the Wounded. The Lofs on the Side of the Allied Army is not particularly known, but it is fuppoled, it does not exceed that of 1000 Men. Five Pieces of Cannon were loft, having been left behind in the Village. Prince Ifenbourg is among the Slain; and the Generals Gilfoe, and Count Schulembourg among the Wounded.

Berlin, April 14. The Fort of Peenamunde, in Pomerania, furrendered between the 10th and 11th of this Month to General Manteufel, who commanded the Army in the Ablence of Count

Their Lordships therefore, in order to detect and bring to Justice the Perfons guilty of fuch t'ir cies and Robberies, (in Violation of the Laws of Na tions in general, and of this Kingdom in particular, and to the great Discourt thereof) are pleased to promife a Reward of FIVE HUNDRED POUNDE, unto or amongst fuch Perfon or Perfons as shall within Three Months from this Time, discover any one or more of the Offenders guilty of any fuch Asts of Piracy as aforefaid, fo as fuch Osfender or Offenders shall be apprehended and duly convicted thereof.

And in regard the Committing of fuch Offences as aforefaid are greatly encouraged by divers Per fons as Accefiaries thereto, who knowingly affift, maintain, councel, or advife the Committing of fuch Acts of Piracy, and alfo by Perfons who receive Goods fo piratically taken, and entertain and conceal Offenders, knowing them to have committed fuch Robberies :

Their Lordfhips therefore, in order to detect or bring to Juffice the Perions guilty of fuch last mentioned Offences, are pleased to promife a Reward of FIVE HUNDRED POUNDS, unto or amongs such Person or Persons as shall, within Three Months from this Time, discover any one or more of the Offenders guilty of any such Offences last mentioned, so as such Offender or Offenders shall be apprehended and duly convicted thereof. Which laid respective Rewards before men.ioned, shall be paid, clear of all Deductions whatsoever, by Samuel Seddon, Efg; Solicitor of the Admiralty, immediately after the Conviction of such Offenders.

• And as a further Encouragement, any of the faid Offenders, (other than and except the respective Commander or Commanders of any such Piratical Ships or Vessels) who shall discover any one or more of the faid Offenders, shall, on the Conviction of such Ofrespectively fenders for discovered, be intitled to His Majesty's most Gracious Pardon.

And their Lordships do also promise to grant, upon Request, to every Person, being a Seaman, (who by making any such Discovery or Discoveries, as aforefaid, shall be intitled to either to the Whole, or to any Part or Parts of any of the above-mentioned Rewards) an absolute Protection, to prevent his being imprested into His Majesty's Sea Service, during this present War with France.
