other, where they intend to refile till the Diffolution of the Parliament. The Soldiers continue their infolencies, of which great complaints are fill breught, and that they have a fecond time plunderd the Royal Town of Samber. We very much fear a new confederation; and that the next Parliament will have no better illusthen the former.

Hamburgh, Oftob. 19. The Swedes at their Leaguer before Bromen, begin now to apprehend a cloud rifing in Germany, which appears every day bigger to them, and are much confirm by their last Letters from Regensburg of the Emperors refolution to give affiliance to the City, and that some Siletiff Regiments are already moving towards them. A Trampetter is likewise arrived at Stoads in eight dayes from Regensburg, his business, its said, is to advice the Field Here to draw off his Forces from Bromen, otherwise his Imperial Majesty would be obliged with the test of the Members of the Empire to assist that City.

Several greet pe fons at e mer at Stoads, in order to an amicable composure, but with what success time will shew.

The Dake of Lunenburg purs himself into a posture of War, building Forts upon the Elbe, and planting Gues to hinder the pessing of the Swedes F rest that way; and distail, hath it easy seized fixteen ships uping up to fetch provisions, which has extremely incerted the Field Here Wrangle, who has ordered his Guliots to goe up with forty Vessels, by some to convey the Frees expected that way from Pomeren; though our last Letters inform us, that the Forces expected are to march by land to Blankenness, where they are appointed to pass the Elbe.

The Bremers on the lifetenth inflant made a flout fally upon the Sweder, but found them to well prepared to receive them, that nothing confiderable could be done upon them. They have a strong Gartion within the Town, confissing of 2000 Horie, and 2000 Foot, befiles the Citizens, and are well furnishe with proportionable provisions to hold out a long

The furth instant the Doke of Saxony received homage from his Surjects at Ratzenberg, which was done with all imaginable solemnity, and the twelfth, the Queen Christine assisted at the marriage of the Land grave of Hesse, with the Widow of the late Frederick Aicfelt, Governor of Holssein.

Amsterdam, Octob. 27. A Vessel arriving in the Flbe from Martenice, informs us of a great Hurricano, which in that place, but especially in St. Christophers and Guardeloup, has done very much but tupon the Lana, and much total and scattered the shipping about the Islands.

Here is arrived a G lliot from Bergen in Norway, who was on the feventeenth inftent in company of five Caribby traders, with whom he kept two days, leaving them about the Dozger-fands; at which place they met with contrary winds. The Hart from the coast of Angolais arrived at Bergen, and the Geod-Hepe, that went out of the Texel in September, is striid upon the North coast.

Paris, Odob. 30. The Krights of the O'der of St. Michael, met according to their Order in Cordeliers Chutch, to celebrate the yearly ceremony according to custom, though for some time this year deserted by his Miresty, by reason of the indisposition of the Marqueis de Sourdis.

On the eighteenth instantishey held their Chapter where the Count d' Auteut!, Dean of the Order with his Coller, sate President in the room of the Ma quest, who not being yet recovered, could not attend the ceremony; where the Bishop of Neo Cesuria efficiating eithe solemnity, made an excellent Sermon upon the occasion.

Order is given to all the Ports for grinding of a confiderable quantity of Corn, to make Meal to furnish and stock the Magazines, and to halton the Levics of some new Companies of Foot.

Letters from Marne tell us, that a Subterranean Fire is broken out in the Forest of Perfigue, which burns with that violence, that 'cis no easie work to quench it again.

The King has ordered in his Council, that for the surure no Provices shall be admitted by any of the Religious Orders to make their Profession, till they arrive at twenty five years of age, if Men; and if Women, at twenty.

The Archbishop of this City has taken away fixteen of the usual observed Holidays of the year, that persons may have so much more time allowed them to sollow their trades. But the Feast of St. Genevieve being one, the Religious of that Order seem much concerned, and endeavor what they can to defend the honor of their Saint.

A G infleman of Savoy having had his head cut offfor some crime at Geneva, the Duke of Savoy exceedingly elents their proceedings; which are affirmed to be both opposite to the Treaty of Peace with Savoy, and against the Law of Nations, and is accordingly arming against them, having sent some Deputies to the Swiffe Cantons to differate them from affifting the City.

Upon acvice given us of the Fortifications upon the borders of Flanders, especially at Cambray and Oftend, where they are enlarging their Port to contain 3 or 400 Veilels; and that the Fort Charles Roy is so much forwarded, that already they have built it to the height of a man, with strong Bistions about it, which they are surnishing with Cannon, having in it a Garrison of 3000 men, and the like number of Masons and Pioneers laboring there, which will in a short time compleat the Work.

The King has ordered several Companies to march towards the Figures about Picardy, and his Magazines to be well guarded and stored; and has likewise commanded other forces to march towards Rossilon, to reinforce his Frontier Garrisons about Catalonia.

The Abbot de la Ferte Soneterre, Natural Brother to Mareschal of that name, is by an Order of the Chamber des Grands Jours establishe at Puy, arreited for some misbehavior in Provence. And 'tis said', the Marquess de Chasseau Neuf, is also arrested by the Chamber establishe at Languedos, upon the same accesume.

Tis Seid that Don Estevan de Gamarre, Ambessador from his Catholick-Mejethy to the States of Holland, has offered the Mediation of Spain for the composure of the differences between England and them, proffering to enter into a Defensive League with the two Nations, upon their reconciliation.

The Duke of Lorrain is faln ill of a Feaver. The Sweder Ambassador went two days since from hence for German, very well satisfied with his Negotiation and Entertainment in this Cont; having been presented with a Bex of Diamonds from his Mijesty, to the value of 9 or 10000 Crowns, and is to return to his command of the Horse-Guards to the King of Swedes now before Bremen.

Hague, Offiber 30. Out people are generally much rejyced at some hopes they have, that a Treaty of Peace may be this Winter set on soot; yet the great preparations daily made for carrying on the War, gives us cause rather to suspect the contrary.

The States having offered their Mediation to his Majesty of Swedeland, for the composing of the differences between that Crown, and the City of Bremen, are daily expeding what answer will be returned them.

The Prince's Downer of Orange, is suddenly expected here with Madam the Electre's of Brandenburgh, who intends to spend the Winter here. And dis said, at a the States have resolved to admit the Envoyes Extraordinary from his Electroal Highness of Brandenburgh, to the same rank and place in their conferences, with the Extraordinary Envoyes from any Crowned Princes that are sent to them.

Ipswich, October 27. On the 23 instant a Durch Hoy set on shoare at Yarmouth 200 Seamen that have been prisoners at Amsterdam, and released upon exchange. They came thence about Michaelmas, but by ill weather were forced to Hamboriugh, where they lest 50 of their company to be brought over in another Veilel, having been so crouded cogether in the Hoy, alat about twenty of them died in their pailage.
