Westminster, June 2. HIS Day, the Lords being met, a Meffage was fent to the Honourable Houfe of Commons by Mr. Quarme, Deputy Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod, acquainting them, that The Lords, authorized by Virtue of His Majesty's Commission, for declaring His Royal Affent to feveral Acts agreed upon by both Houfes, do defire the immediate Attendance of this Honourable Houfe in the Houfe of Peers, to hear the Commiffion read; and the Commons being come thither, the faid Commission, impowering his Royal Highness the Duke of Cumberland, the Lord Archbifhop of Canterbury, the Lord Keeper of the Great Seal, the Lord Prefident of the Council, and feveral other Lords, to declare and notify the Royal

Affent to the faid Bills was read accordingly, and the Royal Affent given to, An Act for granting to His Majefty certain Sums of Money out of the Sinking Fund, and for applying cer-

tain Monies remaining in the Exchequer for the Service of the Year One Thousand Seven Hundred and Fiftynine ; and for Relief of Samuel Taylor, with respect to a Bond entered into by him for fecuring the Duties on Tubacco imported.

An AEI for enabling His Majesty to raise the Sum of One Million for the Uses and Purposes therein mentioned; and for further appropriating the Supplies granted in this Selfion of Parliament.

An AEt to amend an Act made in the last Session of Parliament for repealing the Duty granted by an AE mide in the fixth Year of the Reign of His late Ma-ingly on Silver Plate; and for granting a Duty on Li-conces to be taken out by all Perfons dealing in Gold or Silver Plate, by permitting the Sale of Gold or Silver Plate in fmall Quantities without Licence; and by granting a Duty, inflead of the Duty now payable upon licences, to be taken out by certain Dealers in Gold or Silver Plate; and alfo a Duty upon Licences to be taken out by Pawnbrokers dealing in Gold or Silver Plate, and Refiners of Gold or Silver.

An ASI for adding certain Annuities granted in the Year One Thrufand Seven Hundred and Fifty-feven to the first Stock of Three per Contum Annuities confoli-dated by the Acis of the Taventy fifth, Taventy-eighth, and Taventy-ninth Years of His prefent Majefly's Reign, and for carrying the foveral Duties therein mentioned to the Sinking Fund; and for charging the Annuilies on Single Lives, granted in the Year One Thousand Seven Hundred and Fifty Seven, on the Produce of the faid Fund.

An Act for improving the Navigation of the River Clyde to the City of Glafgow, and for building a Bridge crofs the faid River from the faid City to the Village of Gorbells

An AEt for making and completing the Navigation of the River Wear from and including South Biddick or Biddick Ford in the County of Durham, to the City of Durham; and for repealing fo much of an AA made in the Twentieth Year of His prefent Majefty's Reign, intituled, An Act for the better Prefervation and Improvement of the River Wear and Port and Haven of Sunderland in the County of Durham, as relates to making the faid River navigable between the faid two Piaces called South Biddick or Biddick Ford and New Bridge in the County of Durham.

An AEt for continuing, amending and rendering more effectual fo much of an Act made in the Twenticib Year of His present Majesty's Reign, intituled, An Act for the better Prefervation and Improvement of the River Wear and Port and Haven of Sunderland in the County of Durham, as relates to the Port and Haven of Sunder-land, and the River Wear between South Biddick or Biddick Ford and the faid Port and Haven.

An Act to explain, amend, and render more effectual, an Act paffed in the Sixth Year of the Reign of her late Majesty Queen Anne, intituled, An Act for erecting a Workbouje in the Town and Borough of Plymouth in the County of Devon, and for fetting the Poor on Work, and maintaining them there, and for obliging the Mayor and Commonalty of Plymouth to contribute towards the County Rates of Devon, and for applying for the Re-lief of the Poor in the faid Workhouje certain Surplus-Monies which have formerly arifen by the Affeffments

for raifing the Land Tax in the faid Town. An Act for difcharging the Inhabitants of the Town of Manchester in the County Palatine of Lancaster, from the Cuftom of grinding their Corn and Grain, except

An Act for establishing, regulating and maintaining a nightly Watch, and for enlightening the open Places and Streets within the Town of Guilford in the County of Surry

An Act for repairing and widening the Roads from a Place called Littlegate, at the Top of Leadenbam Hill in the County of Lincoln, to the West End of Barnby Gate in Newark upon Trent; and from the Guide Poft at the Division of Kelham and Muskham Lanes to Mansfield; and from Southavell to Oxion in the County of Nottingham. An Act for repairing and avidening the High Road

from Wetherby to Graffington in the County of York. An AA for repairing the Road from the South End of the South Street in the Parish of South Malling near the Town of Lewes to Glyndbridge, and from thenes through Firle Street under the Hill to Longbridge in the Parific of Alfriston in the County of Suffex.

En Alt for repairing and widning the Read from Modbury through the Town of Plympton to the North End of Lincotta Lane in the County of Deven.

An AEt for amending and widening the Roads leading from Stretford's Bridge in the County of Hersford, to the Now Inn in the Parifle of Winfley flow in the Count, Salop: And also the Road from Blue Manthe Mail war Mortimer's Crofs to Ayanftrey in the fuid County of Hereford; and for repealing to much of on rist made in the Twenty-fecond Year of the Reign of his prefert Ma-jefty, as relates to the Road from Mortiner's Crofs to Aymftrey Bridge.

An Act for repairing and widening the Road from the Town of Derly to the Town of Neuvenstile under Lyne in the County of Stafford.

An Act for repairing, amending, and widdling the Roads from the South Weft End of Nother Bridge in the County of Weftmorland, by Size and the to Lowed's to Dixes, and from the Town of Milithrop abrefaid to Hangbridge, and from thence to join the Haron Syke Turnpike Road at the Guide Post near Classifier Hall in the County aforefaid.

An Act to continue and amend two Acts, one made in the thirteenth Year of the Reign of his lats Majesty King George the First; and the other in the Seventeenth Year of His prefent Majefly, for repairing certain Roads leading from Chippenham; and for repairing feveral Roads leading from Chippenham Bridge; and to repeal fo much of an Ast made in the Tauchty-ninth Year of His prefent Majefty, as relates to the Road between the faid Bridge and Lower Stanton in the County of Wilts.

The Speech of the Lords Commissioners to both Houses of Parliament, on Saturday the 2d of June, 1759.

My Lord and Gentlemen,

HE King has commanded Us to put an End to this Sellion of Parliament; and, at the fame Time, to affure you, that as your Conduct, during the Course of it, has highly deferved His Royal Approbation. bation, fo His Majefly now returns you His hearty Thanks for it.

At the Opening of the Seffion, His Majefty exhorted you to bear up againft all Difficulties; effectually to ftand by, and defend, His Majefty; and vigoroully to fupport the King of Pruffia, and the reft of his Allies. The King has commanded Us to acquaint you, that His Hopes of furmounting thole Difficulties were founded on the Wifdom, Zeal, and Affection of fo good a Parliament; and that you have fully anfwered His Expectations. You have confidered the War in all its Parts; and, notwithftanding the long Continuance of it, thro' the Obftinacy of our Enemies, have made fuch Provision for the many different Operations, as ought to convince the Powers engaged againft Us, that it will be for their Intereft, as well as for the Eafe and Relief of all Europe, to come to equitable and honourable Terms of Accommodation.

By your Affifance, the Combined Army in Germany has been compleated: Powerful Squadrons, as well as great Numbers of Land Forces, are employed in America, in order to maintain the juft Rights and Poffeffions of His Majefty and His People; and to annoy the Enemy in the moft fenfible Manner in those Parts; and, as France is now making confiderable Preparations in her Ports, His Majetty has taken Care to put His Fleet at Home in the beft Condition, both of Strength, and Situation, to guard againft, and repel any Attempts, that may be meditated againft His Kingdoms.

The King's Measures have all been directed to affert the Honour of His Crown; to preferve the effential Interests of His faithful Subjects; and to support the Cause of the Protestant Religion, and public Liberty. His Majesty, therefore, trusts, that the Uprightness of His Intentions will draw down the Blessing of Heaven upon His Endeavours.

We have it, alfo, in Command from His Majefty, to let you know, that He hopes, the Provifions you have made, to prevent, and correct, the Exceffes of the Privateers, will be effectual to that defirable End. The King has had it much at Heart: For tho' His Majefty is fenfible of the Utility of that Service, when under proper Regulations, He is determined to do His utmoft, to prevent any Injurics, or Hardfhips, being done to the Subjects of Neutral Powers, as far as may be practicable, and confiltent with His Majefty's juft Right to hinder the Trade of His Enemics from being collufively and traudulently covered.

Gentlemen of the House of Commons,

We are commanded to affure you, that, when His Majefty confiders the large Supplies which you have fo unanimoufly given, He fields Himfelf under the frongelt Obligations, not only to thank you for them, but alfo to applaud the Firmnefs and Vigour, with which you have acted; as well as your Prudence in judging, that, notwithlanding the prefent Burdens, the making ample Provision for carrying on the War is the most probable Means to bring it to an honourable and happy Conclusion. No Attention will be wanting on His Majesty's Part for the faithful Application of what you have granted.

My Lords and Gentlemen,

His Majefly has been gracioufly pleafed to order us to add, that he has Nothing more to defire of you, but that you would carry down the fame good Difpofitions, and propagate them in your feveral Countries, which you have fhewn in your Proceedings during your fetting here.

After which the Lord Keeper faid;

My Lords and Gentlemen,

It is His Majefly's Royal Will and Pleafure, That this Parliament be prorogued to Thurfiley the Twentyfixth Day of July next, to be then here held; and this Parliament is accordingly prorogued to Thurfday the Twenty-fixth Day of July next.

Landflut, May 20. Nothing Material has happened here lately; the Weather being extremely Cold and Rainy, the Troops still continue in their Quarters of Cantonment.

Upon Notice being received fome Days ago that a confiderable Body of Auftrians had entered Lufatia, with a Defign, as was fuppofed, to attack Berlin, and were advanced as far as Spremberg in Lower

Lufatia, fome Battalions of Prufilans, supported by a large Body of Cavalry, commanded by General Seidlitz, were ordered with the greatest Secrecy to file off from Landshut; upon which the Austrians thought proper to retire from Spremberg, and posted themselves behind Budissin in the Higher Lufatia, from whence it is supposed they will return into Bohemia.

Hague, May 29. By the last Letters received from the Allied Army in Westphalia, dated the 24th, it appears, That that Army was now affembling, and that the different Corps thereof were preparing to take such a Position, as to be able to join at a very fhort Notice. Prince Ferdinand's Head Quarters were then at Ham, and were to be removed to Reek the next Day. The Hereditary Prince was at Unna, to which Place Lieutenant General Hardenberg marched on the 24th with fome Battalions and Squadrons under his Command. The French Troops that marched from the Lower Rhine under Marshal Contades, were, by the last Accounts, at Siegbourg, and it was fuppofed would not reach Gieffen till the 1st of June. M. D'Armentieres was expected at Burick to take the Command of the French Forces there.

Whitehall, June 2.

The King has been pleafed to confitute and appoint his Grace Thomas Holles Duke of Newcaftle, Knight of the most Noble Order of the Garter, Henry Bilfon Legge, Robert Nugent, and James Grenville, Efgrs. and Frederick North, Efg; commonly called Lord North, to be Commissioners for executing the Office of Treasurer of His Majesty's Exchequer.

The King has been rleafed to grant unto the Right Honourable William Earl of Befsborough, and the Honourable Robert Hampden, Efq; the Office of Poft Mafter General, in the room of Thomas Earl of Leicefter, and Sir Everard Fawkenet, Knt. both deceafed.

Extract of a Letter from Commodore Boys, in the Dozons, to Mr. Clevland, dated the 1st of June, 1759.

Captain Angel in the Stag returned to the Downes this Morning with the French Privateer Cutter I fent him alter, which he took Yefferday. She is called La Dunkerquoife, Capt. Stephen Francis Pottier of Dunkirk, of Eight Carriage Guns, and Fifty-two Men; had been out 48 Hours, and taken nothing.

Admiralty Office, March 13, 1759.

MY Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty having received many repeated Complaints of divers outragious Acts of Piracy committed on Board great Numbers of Ships, as well English as Neutral, failing in the English Channel, by the Crews of Ships or Vessels being or pretending to be English Privateers :

Their Lordships therefore, in order to detect and bring to Justice the Perfons guilty of fuch Piracies and Robberies, (in Violation of the Laws of Nations in general, and of this Kingdom in particular, and to the great Dishonour thereof) are pleafed to promise a Reward of FIVE HUNDRED FOUNDS, unto or amongst such Perfon or Perfons as shall, within Three Months from this Time, discover any one or mote of the Offenders guilty of any such Acts of Piracy as aforefaid, so as such Offender or Offenders shall be apprehended and duly convicted thereof.

And in regard the Committing of fuch Offences as aforefaid are greatly encouraged by divers Perfons as Accefiaries thereto, who knowingly affift, maintain, councel, or advife the Committing of fuch Acts of Piracy, and also by Perfons who receive Goods fo piratically taken, and entertain and conceal Offenders, knowing them to have committed fuch Robberies :

Their Lordships therefore, in order to detect or bring to Justice the Perfons guilty of fuch last mentioned Offences, are pleased to promise a Reward of FIVE HUNDRED POUNDS, unto or amongst fuch Perfon or Perfons as shall, within Three Months from this Time, discover any one or more of the Offenders guilty of any fuch Offences last mentioned,

And as a further Encouragement, any of the faid Offenders, (other than and except the respective Commander or Commanders of any fuch Piratical Ships or Veffels) who shall discover any one or more of the faid Ottenders, shall, on the Conviction of fuch Offender or Offenders so discovered, be intitled to His Majesty's most Gracious Pardon.

And their Lordships do also promife to grant, upon Request, to every Person, being a Seaman, (who by making any fuch Difcovery or Difcoveries, as aforefaid, shall be intitled to either to the Whole, or to any Part or Parts of any of the above-mentioned Rewards) an absolute Protection, to prevent his being impressed into His Majesty's Sea Service, during this prefent War with France
