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Westminster, June 2.

THIS Day, the Lords being met, a Message was sent to the Honourable House of Commons by Mr. Quarre, Deputy Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod, acquainting them, that *The Lords, authorized by Virtue of His Majesty's Commission, for declaring His Royal Assent to several Acts agreed upon by both Houses, do desire the immediate Attendance of this Honourable House in the House of Peers, to hear the Commission read; and the Commons being come thither, the said Commission, empowering his Royal Highness the Duke of Cumberland, the Lord Archbishop of Canterbury, the Lord Keeper of the Great Seal, the Lord President of the Council, and several other Lords, to declare and notify the Royal Assent to the said Bills was read accordingly, and the Royal Assent given to,*

An Act for granting to His Majesty certain Sums of Money out of the Sinking Fund, and for applying certain Monies remaining in the Exchequer for the Service of the Year One Thousand Seven Hundred and Fifty-nine; and for Relief of Samuel Taylor, with respect to a Bond entered into by him for securing the Duties on Tobacco imported.

An Act for enabling His Majesty to raise the Sum of One Million for the Uses and Purposes therein mentioned; and for further appropriating the Supplies granted in this Session of Parliament.

An Act to amend an Act made in the last Session of Parliament for repealing the Duty granted by an Act made in the sixth Year of the Reign of His late Majesty, on Silver Plate; and for granting a Duty on Licences to be taken out by all Persons dealing in Gold or Silver Plate, by permitting the Sale of Gold or Silver Plate in small Quantities without Licence; and by granting a Duty, instead of the Duty now payable upon Licences, to be taken out by certain Dealers in Gold or Silver Plate; and also a Duty upon Licences to be taken out by Pawnbrokers dealing in Gold or Silver Plate, and Refiners of Gold or Silver.

An Act for augmenting the Salaries of the Puisne Judges in the Court of King's Bench, the Judges in the Court of Common Pleas, the Barons of the Coif in the Court of Exchequer at Westminster, the Judges in the Courts of Session and Exchequer in Scotland, and Justices of Chester and the Great Sessions for the Counties in Wales.

An Act for adding certain Annuities granted in the Year One Thousand Seven Hundred and Fifty-seven to the Joint Stock of Three per Centum Annuities consolidated by the Acts of the Twenty-fifth, Twenty-eighth, and Twenty-ninth Years of His present Majesty's Reign, and for carrying the several Duties therein mentioned to the Sinking Fund; and for charging the Annuities on Single Lives, granted in the Year One Thousand Seven Hundred and Fifty Seven, on the Produce of the said Fund.

An Act to continue several Laws therein mentioned relating to the allowing a Drawback of the Duties upon the Exportation of Copper Bars imported; to the Encouragement of the Silk Manufactures; and for taking off several Duties on Merchandise exported, and reducing other Duties to the Premium upon Masts, Yards, and Bosworts, Tar, Pitch and Turpentine; to the encouraging the Growth of Coffee in His Majesty's Plan-

tations in America; to the securing the Duties upon Foreign made Sail Cloth, and charging Foreign made Sails with a Duty; and for enlarging the Time for Payment of the Duties omitted to be paid on the Indentures and Contracts of Clerks, Apprentices, or Servants; and also for making Affidavits of the Execution of Articles or Contracts of Clerks to Attornies or Solicitors, and filing thereof.

An Act to explain and amend an Act made in the last Session of Parliament, intituled, An Act for granting to His Majesty several Rates and Duties upon Offices and Pensions, and upon Houses, and upon Windows or Lights, and for raising the Sum of Five Millions by Annuities and a Lottery, to be charged upon the said Rates and Duties so far as the same relates to the Rates and Duties on Offices and Pensions.

An Act to explain and amend an Act passed in the Thirtieth Year of His present Majesty's Reign, for granting to His Majesty several Rates and Duties upon Indentures, Leases, Bonds, and other Deeds, and upon News Papers, Advertisements and Almanacks, and upon Licences for retailing Wine, and other Purposes in the said Act mentioned, so far as the same relates to some Provisions with regard to Licences for retailing Wine; and to preserve the Privileges of the two Universities in that Part of Great Britain called England, with Respect to Licences for retailing Wine.

An Act to explain and amend an Act made in the Twenty-ninth Year of His present Majesty's Reign, intituled, An Act for the Encouragement of Seamen, and the more speedy and effectual Manning His Majesty's Navy, and for the better Prevention of Piracies and Robberies by the Crews of Private Ships of War.

An Act for applying the Money granted in this Session of Parliament towards defraying the Charge of Pay and Cloathing for the Militia from the Thirty-first Day of December One Thousand Seven Hundred and Fifty-eight, to the Twenty-fifth Day of March One Thousand Seven Hundred and Sixty.

An Act for enforcing the Execution of the Laws relating to the Militia, and for removing certain Difficulties, and preventing Inconveniencies attending, or which may attend the same.

An Act for making Compensation to the Proprietors of such Lands and Hereditaments as have been purchased for the better securing His Majesty's Docks, Ships and Stores at Chatham, Portsmouth and Plymouth, and for better fortifying the Town of Portsmouth and Citadel of Plymouth, in pursuance of an Act of the last Session of Parliament, and for other Purposes therein mentioned.

An Act for applying a Sum of Money granted in this Session of Parliament towards carrying on the Works for fortifying and securing the Harbour of Milford in the County of Pembroke, and to amend and render more effectual an Act of last Session of Parliament for applying a Sum of Money towards fortifying the said Harbour.

An Act for the better preventing the Importation of the Woollen Manufactures of France into any of the Ports in the Levant Sea, by or on the Behalf of any of His Majesty's Subjects, and for the more effectual preventing the illegal Importation of Raw Silk and Mahair Yarn into this Kingdom.

An Act for the more effectual preventing the fraudulent Importation of Cambricks and French Lawns.

An Act for further regulating the Power of taking Samples of Foreign Spirituous Liquors by the Officers of Excise, and also for empowering the Traders to take such Samples before the Duties are charged.

An Act for obviating a Doubt with respect to the summoning of Persons for Offences committed against or Forfeitures incurred by the Laws of Excise.

An Act to continue so much of an Act made in the Nineteenth Year of the Reign of His present Majesty as relates to the further Punishment of Persons going armed or disguised in Defiance of the Laws of Customs or Excise; and to the Relief of the Officers of the Customs in Informations upon Seizures; and to appropriate certain Penalties mentioned in an Act made in the last Session of Parliament for the due making of Breads, and to regulate the Price and Assize thereof, and to punish Persons who shall adulterate Meal, Flour, or Bread.

An Act for Relief of Debtors with respect to the Imprisonment of their Persons, and to oblige Debtors who shall continue in Execution in Prison beyond a certain Time, and for Sums not exceeding what are mentioned in the Act, to make Discovery of and deliver upon Oath their Estates for their Creditors Benefit.

An Act to continue, amend, explain and render more effectual an Act made in the Sixth Year of the Reign of His present Majesty for the better Regulation of Luggage and Ballastage in the River Thames, and to prevent putting of Rubbish, Ashes, Dirt or Soil into the said River, and in the Streets, Passages and Kennels in London, and in the Suburbs thereof in Middlesex and in Westminster, and such Part of the Duchy of Lancaster as is in Middlesex, and for allowing a certain Quantity of Dung Compost Earth or Soil to be yearly shipped as Ballast from the Laystalls in London, on Board any Collier or Coasting Vessel.

An Act for the more regular and easy collecting, accounting for and paying of Post Fines which shall be due to the Crown or to Grantees thereof under the Crown, and for the Ease of Sheriffs in respect to the same.

An Act for continuing, amending, explaining and making more effectual an Act made in the Nineteenth Year of His present Majesty's Reign, intituled, An Act more effectually to prevent the Frauds and Abuses committed in the Admeasurement of Coals within the City and Liberty of Westminster, and that Part of the Duchy of Lancaster adjoining thereto, and the several Parishes of Saint Giles in the Fields, Saint Mary Le Bon, and such Part of the Parish of Saint Andrew Holborn as lies in the County of Middlesex.

An Act for the better Preservation of the Turnpike Roads in that Part of Great Britain called Scotland.

An Act for improving the Navigation of the River Clyde to the City of Glasgow, and for building a Bridge cross the said River from the said City to the Village of Gorbells.

An Act for making and completing the Navigation of the River Wear from and including South Biddick or Biddick Ford in the County of Durham, to the City of Durham; and for repealing so much of an Act made in the Twentieth Year of His present Majesty's Reign, intituled, An Act for the better Preservation and Improvement of the River Wear and Port and Haven of Sunderland in the County of Durham, as relates to making the said River navigable between the said two Places called South Biddick or Biddick Ford and New Bridge in the County of Durham.

An Act for continuing, amending and rendering more effectual so much of an Act made in the Twentieth Year of His present Majesty's Reign, intituled, An Act for the better Preservation and Improvement of the River Wear and Port and Haven of Sunderland in the County of Durham, as relates to the Port and Haven of Sunderland, and the River Wear between South Biddick or Biddick Ford and the said Port and Haven.

An Act to explain, amend, and render more effectual, an Act passed in the Sixth Year of the Reign of her late Majesty Queen Anne, intituled, An Act for erecting a Workhouse in the Town and Borough of Plymouth in the County of Devon, and for setting the Poor on Work, and maintaining them there, and for obliging the Mayor and Commonalty of Plymouth to contribute towards the County Rates of Devon, and for applying for the Relief of the Poor in the said Workhouse certain Surplus-Monies which have formerly arisen by the Assessments for raising the Land Tax in the said Town.

An Act for discharging the Inhabitants of the Town of Manchester in the County Palatine of Lancaster, from the Custom of grinding their Corn and Grain, except

Malt, at certain Water Corn Mills in the said Town called the School Mills, and for making a proper Recompence to the Feoffees of such Mills.

An Act for establishing, regulating and maintaining a nightly Watch, and for enlightening the open Places and Streets within the Town of Guilford in the County of Surry.

An Act for laying a Duty of Two Pennies Scots, or one sixth Part of a Penny Sterling, upon every Scots Pint of Ale, Porter and Beer, which shall be brewed for Sale, brought into, tapped or sold within the Town of Kelso, in the Shire of Roxburgh, for smelting a Bridge cross the River Tweed, and for other Purposes therein mentioned.

An Act for repairing and widening the Roads from the Town of Mold to the Town of Denbigh, and from thence to Tal-y-Castn and Conway, and from the Town of Wrexham to the Towns of Ruthin, Denbigh, and the Town and Port of Ruthland, in the Counties of Denbigh, Flint and Carnarvon.

An Act for repairing and widening the Road from a Place called Littlegate, at the Top of Leadnham Hill in the County of Lincoln, to the West End of Barnby Gate in Newark upon Trent; and from the Guide Post at the Division of Kelham and Mustham Lanes to Mansfield; and from Southwell to Oulton in the County of Nottingham.

An Act for repairing and widening the High Road from Wetherby to Grassington in the County of York.

An Act for repairing the Road from the South End of the South Street in the Parish of South Malling near the Town of Lewes to Glyndbridge, and from thence through Firs Street under the Hill to Longbridge in the Parish of Alfriston in the County of Sussex.

An Act for repairing and widening the Road from Medbury through the Town of Plympton to the North End of Lincotta Lane in the County of Devon.

An Act for amending and widening the Roads leading from Streetford's Bridge in the County of Hereford, to the New Inn in the Parish of Winflaton in the County of Salop: And also the Road from Blue Mountains Hill near Mortimer's Cross to Aynsley in the said County of Hereford; and for repealing so much of an Act made in the Twenty-second Year of the Reign of his present Majesty, as relates to the Road from Mortimer's Cross to Aynsley Bridge.

An Act for repairing and widening the Road from the Town of Derby to the Town of Newcastle under Lyne in the County of Stafford.

An Act for repairing, amending, and widening the Roads from the South West End of Nether Bridge in the County of Westmorland, by Sixon Whide to Lower's Bridge, and from thence through the Town of Millthrop to Dixes, and from the Town of Millthrop aforesaid to Hangbridge, and from thence to join the Haron Syke Turnpike Road at the Guide Post near Claverbrop Hall in the County aforesaid.

An Act to continue and amend two Acts, one made in the thirteenth Year of the Reign of his late Majesty King George the First; and the other in the Seventeenth Year of His present Majesty, for repairing certain Roads leading from Chippenham; and for repairing several Roads leading from Chippenham Bridge; and to repeal so much of an Act made in the Twenty-ninth Year of His present Majesty, as relates to the Road between the said Bridge and Lower Stanton in the County of Wilt.

An Act for repairing and widening the Road leading from the East Side of Barnsley Common in the County of York, to the Middle of Grunge Moor, and from thence to White Cross; and also the Road from the Guide-Post in Barugh to a Rivulet called Barugh Brook, and from thence for two hundred Yards over and beyond the same Rivulet or Brook into the Township of Carwitherne in the said County.

And to Forty Private Bills.

The Speech of the Lords Commissioners to both Houses of Parliament, on Saturday the 2d of June, 1759.

My Lord and Gentlemen,
THE King has commanded Us to put an End to this Session of Parliament; and, at the same Time, to assure you, that as your Conduct, during the Course of it, has highly deserved His Royal Approbation,

bation, so His Majesty now returns you His hearty Thanks for it.

At the Opening of the Session, His Majesty exhorted you to bear up against all Difficulties; effectually to stand by, and defend, His Majesty; and vigorously to support the King of Prussia, and the rest of his Allies. The King has commanded Us to acquaint you, that His Hopes of surmounting those Difficulties were founded on the Wisdom, Zeal, and Affection of so good a Parliament; and that you have fully answered His Expectations. You have considered the War in all its Parts; and, notwithstanding the long Continuance of it, thro' the Obstinacy of our Enemies, have made such Provision for the many different Operations, as ought to convince the Powers engaged against Us, that it will be for their Interest, as well as for the Ease and Relief of all Europe, to come to equitable and honourable Terms of Accommodation.

By your Assistance, the Combined Army in Germany has been compleated: Powerful Squadrons, as well as great Numbers of Land Forces, are employed in America, in order to maintain the just Rights and Possessions of His Majesty and His People; and to annoy the Enemy in the most sensible Manner in those Parts; and, as France is now making considerable Preparations in her Ports, His Majesty has taken Care to put His Fleet at Home in the best Condition, both of Strength, and Situation, to guard against, and repel any Attempts, that may be meditated against His Kingdoms.

The King's Measures have all been directed to assert the Honour of His Crown; to preserve the essential Interests of His faithful Subjects; and to support the Cause of the Protestant Religion, and public Liberty. His Majesty, therefore, trusts, that the Uprightness of His Intentions will draw down the Blessing of Heaven upon His Endeavours.

We have it, also, in Command from His Majesty, to let you know, that He hopes, the Provisions you have made, to prevent, and correct, the Excesses of the Privateers, will be effectual to that desirable End. The King has had it much at Heart: For tho' His Majesty is sensible of the Utility of that Service, when under proper Regulations, He is determined to do His utmost, to prevent any Injuries, or Hardships, being done to the Subjects of Neutral Powers, as far as may be practicable, and consistent with His Majesty's just Right to hinder the Trade of His Enemies from being collusively and fraudulently covered.

Gentlemen of the House of Commons,

We are commanded to assure you, that, when His Majesty considers the large Supplies which you have so unanimously given, He feels Himself under the strongest Obligations, not only to thank you for them, but also to applaud the Firmness and Vigour, with which you have acted; as well as your Prudence in judging, that, notwithstanding the present Burdens, the making ample Provision for carrying on the War is the most probable Means to bring it to an honourable and happy Conclusion. No Attention will be wanting on His Majesty's Part for the faithful Application of what you have granted.

My Lords and Gentlemen,

His Majesty has been graciously pleased to order us to add, that he has Nothing more to desire of you, but that you would carry down the same good Dispositions, and propagate them in your several Countries, which you have shewn in your Proceedings during your setting here.

After which the Lord Keeper said;

My Lords and Gentlemen,

IT is His Majesty's Royal Will and Pleasure, That this Parliament be prorogued to Thursday the Twenty-sixth Day of July next, to be then here held; and this Parliament is accordingly prorogued to Thursday the Twenty-sixth Day of July next.

Landshut, May 20. Nothing Material has happened here lately; the Weather being extremely Cold and Rainy, the Troops still continue in their Quarters of Cantonment.

Upon Notice being received some Days ago that a considerable Body of Austrians had entered Lusatia, with a Design, as was supposed, to attack Berlin, and were advanced as far as Spremberg in Lower

Lusatia, some Battalions of Prussians, supported by a large Body of Cavalry, commanded by General Seidlitz, were ordered with the greatest Secrecy to file off from Landshut; upon which the Austrians thought proper to retire from Spremberg, and posted themselves behind Budissin in the Higher Lusatia, from whence it is supposed they will return into Bohemia.

Hague, May 29. By the last Letters received from the Allied Army in Westphalia, dated the 24th, it appears, That that Army was now assembling, and that the different Corps thereof were preparing to take such a Position, as to be able to join at a very short Notice. Prince Ferdinand's Head Quarters were then at Ham, and were to be removed to Reek the next Day. The Hereditary Prince was at Unna, to which Place Lieutenant General Hardenberg marched on the 24th with some Battalions and Squadrons under his Command. The French Troops that marched from the Lower Rhine under Marshal Contades, were, by the last Accounts, at Siegbourg, and it was supposed would not reach Gießen till the 1st of June. M. D'Armentieres was expected at Burick to take the Command of the French Forces there.

Whitehall, June 2.

The King has been pleased to constitute and appoint his Grace Thomas Holles Duke of Newcastle, Knight of the most Noble Order of the Garter, Henry Bilson Legge, Robert Nugent, and James Grenville, Esqrs. and Frederick North, Esq; commonly called Lord North, to be Commissioners for executing the Office of Treasurer of His Majesty's Exchequer.

The King has been pleased to grant unto the Right Honourable William Earl of Bessborough, and the Honourable Robert Hampden, Esq; the Office of Post Master General, in the room of Thomas Earl of Leicester, and Sir Everard Fawkeneh, Knt. both deceased.

Extract of a Letter from Commodore Boyd, in the Downs, to Mr. Cleveland, dated the 1st of June, 1759.

Captain Angel in the Stag returned to the Downes this Morning with the French Privateer Cutter I sent him after, which he took Yesterday. She is called La Dunkerquoise, Capt. Stephen Francis Pottier of Dunkirk, of Eight Carriage Guns, and Fifty-two Men; had been out 48 Hours, and taken nothing.

MY Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty having received many repeated Complaints of divers outrageous Acts of Piracy committed on Board great Numbers of Ships, as well English as Neutral, sailing in the English Channel, by the Crews of Ships or Vessels being or pretending to be English Privateers:

Their Lordships therefore, in order to detect and bring to Justice the Persons guilty of such Piracies and Robberies, (in Violation of the Laws of Nations in general, and of this Kingdom in particular, and to the great Dishonour thereof) are pleased to promise a Reward of FIVE HUNDRED POUNDS, unto or amongst such Person or Persons as shall, within Three Months from this Time, discover any one or more of the Offenders guilty of any such Acts of Piracy as aforesaid, so as such Offender or Offenders shall be apprehended and duly convicted thereof.

And in regard the Committing of such Offences as aforesaid are greatly encouraged by divers Persons as Accessaries thereto, who knowingly assist, maintain, counsel, or advise the Committing of such Acts of Piracy, and also by Persons who receive Goods so piratically taken, and entertain and conceal Offenders, knowing them to have committed such Robberies:

Their Lordships therefore, in order to detect or bring to Justice the Persons guilty of such last mentioned Offences, are pleased to promise a Reward of FIVE HUNDRED POUNDS, unto or amongst such Person or Persons as shall, within Three Months from this Time, discover any one or more of the Offenders guilty of any such Offences last mentioned,

mentioned, so as such Offender or Offenders shall be apprehended and duly convicted thereof. Which said respective Rewards before mentioned, shall be paid, clear of all Deductions whatsoever, by Samuel Seddon, Esq; Solicitor of the Admiralty, immediately after the Conviction of such Offenders.

And as a further Encouragement, any of the said Offenders, (other than and except the respective Commander or Commanders of any such Piratical Ships or Vessels) who shall discover any one or more of the said Offenders, shall, on the Conviction of such Offender or Offenders so discovered, be intitled to His Majesty's most Gracious Pardon.

And their Lordships do also promise to grant, upon Request, to every Person, being a Seaman, (who by making any such Discovery or Discoveries, as aforesaid, shall be intitled to either to the Whole, or to any Part or Parts of any of the above-mentioned Rewards) an absolute Protection, to prevent his being impressed into His Majesty's Sea Service, during this present War with France.
