The humble Address of the Mayor, Aldermen, and Common Council, of the City of Exeter, in Chamber affembled.

May it please your Royal Highness,

X/E His Majesty's most dutiful and loval Subjects, crave Leave to approach your Prefence with our humble and most fincere Gratulations on this Anniversary of your Royal Highness's Birth, and on the joyful Occasion of your having attained that Age, which our Laws have fixed as the Term of full Maturity; an Event that fills every British Heart with Exultation, and opens the most pleasing Prospect of future Happiness to these Kingdoms.

The great and happy Advantages your Royal Highness has enjoyed from the Instruction and Example of your Royal Grandfather, (whofe Life and Health may Almighty God long preferve) and of your Princely Father, whole Memory will be ever dear to Great Britain; the many amiable Virtues of that Illustrious Princess from whom you draw your Birth, affording the ampleft Scope for your Imitation; and those high Qualities and noble Endowments which are already fo well known to adorn your Royal Highness's Person and Character, are so many Pledges, which promife us the Continuance of that abundant Felicity we have fo long enjoyed under the aufpicious Government of His prefent Majesty.

Yefterday being the Anniversary of the Birth of his Royal Highness the Prince of Wales, (who then compleated the 21st Year of his Age) the Great Guns were fired in His Majesty's Park the Phœnix, three Rounds, and answered by Vollies from the Regiments in Garrifon, (which were drawn out in the Royal Square at the Barracks) and by the Regiments encamped in the Park : At Noon there was a very fplendid Appearance of the Nobility, and other Perfons of Diffinction, at the Caffle, to compliment their Excellencies the Lords Juffices upon the Occasion : And at Night the Battalion Guns in the Park were fired, and answered by a Feu de Joie from the Regiments there, and followed in the fame Manner by the Battalion Guns and the Regiments in the Barracks; and the Night concluded with Bonfires, Illuminations, and all other Demonstrations of Joy.

Whitehall, June 11, 1759. Whereas it has been bumbly represented to the King, that, a Stable, belonging to the late dwelling House of Henry Bates, Efq; deceased, and which now belongs to Edward Richardjon, Gent. at Dachet, near Windfor, in the County of Bucks, was, on Sunday the 11th of February laft, in the Night, broke open; and that a Black cropt Mare, with a bald Face, about Fourteen Hands high, and alfo a Saddle, and double rein'd Curb-Bridle, were feloniously taken thereout, and have not fince been heard of, or discover'd, by the said Edward Richardson, the Owner of them, though a Reward has been offered, and published, in the News Papers, by him, for that Purpose; and, that, it is supposed there were several Confederates in the said Robbery, as, in the Evening of the faid Sunday, on which it was commit-ted, as aforefaid, feveral Perfons were feen, near the faid Stable, armed with Fire Arms, Cutlaffes, and other offensive Weapons, some of whom threatened the Lives of the Servants of the faid Edward Richardson: His Majesty, for the better discovering and bringing to Justice the Persons concerned in breaking open the said Stable, and committing the faid Robbery, is, hereby, pleafed to promife His most gracious Pardon, to any One of them, (except the Perfon principally concerned therein,) who shall discover his Accomplice or Accomplices in the faid Facts, so that be, she, or they, may be ap-prebended and convicted thereof. HOLDERNESSE.

And, as a further Encouragement, the faid Edward Richardfon, of Dachet aforefaid, does, herchy, promise a Reward of Twenty Pounds to any Perfon making fuch Difcovery as aforefaid, (except the Perfon princi-pully concerned in the Robbery,) to be paid by bins, upon the Conviction of One or more of the Offenders.
