**T**HE following Address of the Lord Lieutenant, Deputy Lieutenants, Justices of the Peace, and Officers of the Militia at Huntingdon, has been presented to His Majesty: Which Address His Majesty was pleased to receive very graciously.

To the King's most Excellent Majesty,

The humble Address of the Lord Lieutenant, Deputy Lieutenants, Justices of the Peace, and Officers of the Militia, assembled for the carrying into Execution the Acts of Parliament relating to the Militia at Huntingdon.

**W**E most humbly beg Leave to congratulate your Majesty, and to express the unfeigned Pleasure and Satisfaction we feel, upon his Royal Highness the Prince of Wales happily attaining to Years of Maturity: An Event so favourable to the Happiness and Prosperity of these Kingdoms, that it cannot but give universal Joy to all your Majesty's loyal Subjects. When we consider the invaluable Blessings we enjoy under your Majesty's auspicious Reign; when we reflect on the tender Regard you have had to his Royal Highness's Education; the many Incitements you have set before him by your Majesty's own shining Character; the Piety and maternal Care so particularly exemplified in her Royal Highness the Princess Dowager of Wales; the many great and truly amiable Qualities that already appear in his Royal Highness; what hopes may we not conceive of a Prince thus form'd in the Paths of Virtue, who makes it his Study to be thoroughly acquainted with our Constitution, and to emulate in the highest Degree your Majesty's Royal Virtues.

The considerable Armaments which France is now making in her several Ports, we doubt not, through the Zeal and Unanimity of your Majesty's faithful Subjects, will be rendered ineffectual; and the Loyalty of your People prove a sufficient Bulwark against any Attempts that shall be made upon your Majesty's Dominions. We beg Leave to assure your Majesty we are ready, at the Hazard of our Lives and Fortunes, to support the just Rights of your Majesty and your People, and shall with the greatest Readiness, embrace the first Opportunity of manifesting the Sincerity of our Professions. We take the Liberty likewise to congratulate your Majesty on the Success of your Arms in the Reduction of Guadalupe and Grand Terre, a Conquest which reflects the greater Honour on your Majesty's Troops, as they were obliged to contend with the greatest Difficulties both of the Country and Climate. May the same Success attend on all your Enterprizes, till your Enemies are forced to accept a Peace, glorious to Great Britain.

*Hague, June 19.* By Accounts received here this Day, it appears, that Prince Ferdinand of Brunswick's Head Quarters were on the 17th Instant at Erdberenberg, and that the Allied Army occupied the Heights of Buren, as the French did those of Essen and Meerhoff. From the Situation of the two Armies, which are so near each other, it is strongly expected that an Action of great Consequence is not far off.

By the last Account of the 8th Instant, the King of Prussia still kept his former Position, and nothing material had passed in Silesia.

And whereas all Persons trading in, vending, or selling any Quantity of Gold, exceeding Two Penny Weight, or any Quantity of Silver exceeding Five Penny Weight, in any one separate and distinct Ware or Piece of Goods, in which the Quantity of Gold shall be under the Weight of Two Ounces, or in which the Quantity of Silver shall be under the Weight of Thirty Ounces, are also by the said Act required to take out and renew their Licences, as by the Act of the 31st Year of his Majesty's Reign, and to pay Forty Shillings for the same under the like Penalty of Twenty Pounds.

And whereas the said several Licences are to be taken out and Duties paid down for the same, at the Chief Office of Excise in London, if such Licence be taken out within the Limits of the Jurisdiction of the said Chief Office; and if it be taken out without the Limits aforesaid, then the Duties are to be paid at the Office of Excise next adjoining to the Place where the Person taking it out shall reside or inhabit.
