A PROCLAMATION,

For giving Encouragement to Seamen and Able-bodied Landmen to enter themselves on Board His Majesty's Ships of War; for granting Rewards for discovering such Seamen as shall conceal themselves; for pardoning such Seamen as have deserted, and shall return into the Service; and also for taking up all straggling Seamen.

WHEREAS for the speedy Manning of Our Fleet, We did, by Our Order in Council of the Fourteenth of April last, amongst other Things, direct, that the Bounties of Three Pounds for every Able Seaman, and of Thirty Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, not above the Age of Fifty, nor under the Age of Twenty Years, and of Thirty Shillings for every Able-Bodied Landman, not above the Age of Thirty-five, nor under the Age of Twenty Years, should be continued to be paid, immediately after the first Muster, to such Seamen and Landmen respectively, who should, on or before the Second Day of June next, enter themselves in the Royal Navy; and that the Rewards of Two Pounds for every Able, and Twenty Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, should likewise be continued to be paid to such Person or Persons, who should, on or before the said Second Day of June next, discover any concealed Seamen, so that such Seamen should be taken for Our Service. — And whereas Our Service doth at this Time require a more speedy Supply of Seamen, Sea-faring Men, and Able-bodied Landmen, to serve on Board Our Ships of War, and it being Our Royal Intention to give all due Encouragement to all such Seamen, Sea-faring Men, and Able-bodied Landmen, who shall voluntarily enter themselves in Our Service: We have thought fit, by and with the Advice of Our Privy Council, to revoke that Our former Order, and in lieu thereof to publish this Our Royal Proclamation; and We do hereby promise and declare, That the Bounties of FIVE POUNDS for every Able Seaman, and of Thirty Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, be paid to every such Able and Ordinary Seaman, not above the Age of Fifty, nor under the Age of Twenty Years, who shall, on or before the Third Day of July next, voluntarily enter themselves to serve in Our Royal Navy, either with the Captains or Lieutenants of Our Ships, or the Chief Officers on Board such Tenders as shall be employed for raising Men for the Service of Our Royal Navy: And also that a Bounty of Thirty Shillings be paid to every Able-bodied Landman, not above the

Age of Thirty-five, nor under the Age of Twenty Years, who shall, on or before the said Third Day of July next, voluntarily enter themselves to serve in Our Royal Navy, either with the Captains or Lieutenants of Our Ships, or the Chief Officers on Board such Tenders as shall be employed for raising Men for the Service of Our Royal Navy: And that the said respective Sums be paid to all such Seamen and Landmen upon their being brought on Board Our Ships at any of Our Dock Yards in England, by the Clerks of the Cheque, or upon their being put on Board any Ship or Vessel appointed to receive Men at Leith or Greenock in Scotland, or at Dublin or Corke in Ireland, by the Captains or Commanders of the Ships or Vessels whereinto such Seamen or Landmen shall be put, or by the Sea Officer employed in raising Men on Shore. And for Prevention of any Abuses by any Persons leaving the Ships or Vessels to which they shall belong, and entering themselves on Board any other Our Ships or Vessels, in order to obtain the said Bounty-Money; We do hereby declare and command, That such Seamen or Landmen, belonging to any of Our Ships or Vessels, as shall absent themselves from any of the said Ships or Vessels, to which they shall belong, and enter themselves on Board any other of Our Ships or Vessels, in order to obtain the said Bounty, shall not only lose the Wages due to them in the Ships or Vessels they shall leave, but also be severely punished according to their Demerits. And We do hereby further promise and declare, That a Reward of Two Pounds for every Able, and Twenty Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, shall be paid any Person who shall discover any Seaman or Seamen who may secret themselves, so that such Seaman or Seamen shall be taken for Our said Service, on or before the said Third Day of July next, by any of Our Sea Officers employed for raising Men: The said Rewards to be paid for any Seaman or Seamen so discovered and taken, in and about London, by the Principal Officers and Commissioners of Our Navy; and, at the Out Ports, by the Naval Officers, or Sea Officers employed in raising Men on Shore; immediately upon a Certificate being produced to the said Principal Officers and Commissioners of Our Navy, Naval Officers, or Sea Officers employed in raising Men on Shore respectively, by the Person who may make Discovery of any Seaman or Seamen as aforesaid, certifying his Name, and the Name or Names and Number of Seamen procured in Consequence of his Discovery; and the said Certificate to be given by such Officer as may take such Seaman or Seamen for Our Service. And as an Encouragement to such Seamen who may

may have deserted from Our Ships to return to the Service, We do promise Our most gracious Pardon to all such as shall repair on Board any of Our Ships or Vessels by or before the Third Day of July next; and also to all such who have deserted, but are now belonging to some one of Our Ships, (in which Ship they are hereby permitted to continue.) And We do hereby further Declare, that such Seamen who have absented themselves from any of Our Ships, and shall render themselves on Board the same, or any other of Our Ships of War, by or before the Time abovementioned, shall not be prosecuted for such their Desertion; but that all such Deserters who shall not, on or before the said Third Day of July next, render themselves on Board some of Our Ships or Vessels of War, or who shall hereafter absent themselves from the Ships to which they belong, without Leave from the Commanding Officer, shall be tried at a Court Martial, and being found guilty of deserting at this Time, when their Country so much wants their Service, they shall be deemed unfit Objects of Our Royal Mercy, and shall suffer Death according to Law. And We do hereby Require and Command, all Our Justices of the Peace, Mayors, Bayliffs and Magistrates of the several Shires, Counties, Cities, Towns Corporate, and all other Places within Our Kingdom of Great Britain, to give the strictest Orders and Directions to the Constables, and other inferior Civil Officers, to take up all straggling Seamen, not above the Age of Fifty, nor under the Age of Twenty Years, who shall be of Health and Ability fit for Our Service, and send them by careful Conductors to a Sea Officer employed in raising Men on Shore, or to the nearest Sea Port Town, in order to their being put on Board Our Ships of War: Which Conductors shall be paid by the said Sea Officer on Shore, or the Captains of such Ships to whom such Seamen shall be delivered, Twenty Shillings for each Seaman, and Six-pence a Mile for each Man, for every Mile they may respectively travel. And We do hereby likewise require and command all Our said Justices of the Peace, Mayors, Bayliffs and Magistrates, to receive all such Seamen and Seafaring Men, who shall appear before them, and offer to enter as Volunteers on or before the said Third Day of July next, in case they are of Health and Ability fit for Our Service, and not above the Age of Fifty, nor under the Age of Twenty Years, and to grant to each Seaman a Certificate of such his Voluntary Offer, and to cause them to be conducted in like Manner and with the same Allowances as above directed with respect to straggling Seamen; and the Sea Officer on Shore, or the Captains of such Ships, to whom such Volunteer Seamen shall be delivered, shall pay to every such Seaman, after his being so put on Board, (upon producing the Certificate abovementioned) the Bounties of FIVE POUNDS to every Able Seaman, and of Thirty Shillings to every Ordinary Seaman.

The following Address of the Lord Mayor, Aldermen, Sheriffs, and Commonalty of the City of York, has been presented to His Majesty by G. F. Lane, Esq; one of their Representatives in Parliament, being introduced by the Earl of Rochfort, Groom of the Stole to His Majesty: Which Address His Majesty was pleased to receive very graciously.

To the King's most Excellent Majesty,

The humble Address of the Lord Mayor, Aldermen, Sheriffs, and Commonalty of the City of York, in Common-Council assembled.

Most Gracious Sovereign,

AMIDST the General Joy of all Your dutiful and loyal Subjects, we beg your Majesty's Acceptance of our hearty Congratulations on so happy and interesting an Occasion, as that of your Royal Grandson the Prince of Wales having attained his Age of One and Twenty Years.

The Duty and Gratitude we owe to your Majesty, and the Blessings we enjoy under your auspicious Reign, are more than sufficient to indear your Royal Off-spring to your People; and our Zeal for those Civil and Religious Rights, of which you are the glorious Patron and Support, fixes our warmest Affections on that amiable Prince, from whose personal Virtues, trained by your Example, we derive the most pleasing Hopes of lasting Prosperity.

WHEREAS by an Act passed the last Session of Parliament it is enacted, That from and after the 5th Day of July 1759, all Persons trading in, vending, or selling any Piece of Plate or Goods, or any Ware in which the Quantity of Gold shall be of the Weight of Two Ounces or upwards, or in which the Quantity of Silver shall be of the Weight of Thirty Ounces or upwards, and all Pawnbrokers trading in, vending, or selling any Gold or Silver Plate, or any Goods or Wares in which any Gold or Silver is or shall be manufactured, and also all Persons practicing the Trade or Business of a Refiner of Gold or Silver, shall take out Licences and pay

the Duty of Five Pounds for every such Licence, and that the said Licences are to be renewed every Year under the Penalty of Twenty Pounds.

And whereas all Persons trading in, vending, or selling any Quantity of Gold, exceeding Two Penny Weight, or any Quantity of Silver exceeding Five Penny Weight, in any one separate and distinct Ware or Piece of Goods, in which the Quantity of Gold shall be under the Weight of Two Ounces, or in which the Quantity of Silver shall be under the Weight of Thirty Ounces, are also by the said Act required to take out and renew their Licences, as by the Act of the 31st Year of his Majesty's Reign, and to pay Forty Shillings for the same under the like Penalty of Twenty Pounds.

And whereas the said several Licences are to be taken out and Duties paid down for the same, at the Chief Office of Excise in London, if such Licence be taken out within the Limits of the Jurisdiction of the said Chief Office; and if it be taken out without the Limits aforesaid, then the Duties are to be paid at the Office of Excise next adjoining to the Place where the Person taking it out shall reside or inhabit.

The Commissioners of Excise do hereby give Notice, that on the 6th Day of July next, and every Day afterwards (Sundays and Holydays excepted) Attendance will be given at the Excise Office in the Old Jewry, from Eight o'Clock in the Morning till Two in the Afternoon, for receiving such Duties and granting such Licences to all Persons within the Bills of Mortality and the Parish of St. Mary Le Bon, being the Limits of the Chief Office in London, as by the said Act are required to take out the same: And also that constant Attendance will be given (Sundays excepted) at the several Offices of Excise in England and Wales, and Town of Berwick upon Tweed, for receiving the like Duties, and granting such Licences to all Persons not residing within the Limits of the said Chief Office.
