

Kidbrooke, June 25, 1759.

Whereas in Pursuance of the Statutes now in Force, for the better Ordering of the Militia Forces in the several Counties of that Part of Great Britain called England; His Majesty's Lieutenant of the County of Suffex did summon a Meeting to be held at the White Hart Inn in Lewes in the said County, on the 24th Day of March last past, that every Person, qualified to serve as an Officer in the Militia of the said County, and willing to accept Commission therein, might then deliver his Name in Writing, or cause it to be delivered to His Majesty's said Lieutenant, or to such Person as should be authorized by him to receive the same, specifying also the Rank in which he was willing to serve: And whereas a Number of Persons, sufficient to serve in the Militia of the said County, did not offer themselves at the said Meeting; Therefore His Majesty's Lieutenant of the said County of Suffex, doth hereby summon another Meeting to be held at the White Hart Inn in Lewes aforesaid, on Thursday the 12th Day of July next ensuing, at Eleven of the Clock in the Forenoon, that every Person, qualified and willing to serve as an Officer in the Militia of the said County of Suffex, may at the said Meeting deliver his Name in Writing, or cause it to be delivered, to His Majesty's said Lieutenant, or, in Case of his Absence, to such Person as shall be authorized by him to receive the same, specifying the Rank in which he is willing to serve; and also to the Intent that such Measures may be concerted at the said Meeting, as shall be most conducive to the faithful Execution of the said Statutes.

Excise Office, London, June 21, 1759.

WHEREAS by an Act passed the last Session of Parliament it is enacted, That from and after the 5th Day of July 1759, all Persons trading in, vending, or selling any Piece of Plate or Goods, or any Ware in which the Quantity of Gold shall be of the Weight of Two Ounces or upwards, or in which the Quantity of Silver shall be of the Weight of Thirty Ounces or upwards, and all Pawnbrokers trading in, vending, or selling any Gold or Silver Plate, or any Goods or Wares in which any Gold or Silver is or shall be manufactured, and also all Persons practicing the Trade or Business of a Refiner of Gold or Silver, shall take out Licences and pay

the Duty of Five Pounds for every such Licence, and that the said Licences are to be renewed every Year under the Penalty of Twenty Pounds.

And whereas all Persons trading in, vending, or selling any Quantity of Gold, exceeding Two Penny Weight, or any Quantity of Silver exceeding Five Penny Weight, in any one separate and distinct Ware or Piece of Goods, in which the Quantity of Gold shall be under the Weight of Two Ounces, or in which the Quantity of Silver shall be under the Weight of Thirty Ounces, are also by the said Act required to take out and renew their Licences, as by the Act of the 31st Year of his Majesty's Reign, and to pay Forty Shillings for the same under the like Penalty of Twenty Pounds.

And whereas the said several Licences are to be taken out and Duties paid down for the same, at the Chief Office of Excise in London, if such Licence be taken out within the Limits of the Jurisdiction of the said Chief Office; and if it be taken out without the Limits aforesaid, then the Duties are to be paid at the Office of Excise next adjoining to the Place where the Person taking it out shall reside or inhabit.

The Commissioners of Excise do hereby give Notice, that on the 6th Day of July next, and every Day afterwards (Sundays and Holydays excepted) Attendance will be given at the Excise Office in the Old Jewry, from Eight o'Clock in the Morning till Two in the Afternoon, for receiving such Duties and granting such Licences to all Persons within the Bills of Mortality and the Parish of St. Mary Le Bon, being the Limits of the Chief Office in London, as by the said Act are required to take out the same: And also that constant Attendance will be given (Sundays excepted) at the several Offices of Excise in England and Wales, and Town of Berwick upon Tweed, for receiving the like Duties, and granting such Licences to all Persons not residing within the Limits of the said Chief Office.
