HIS Majesty, with the Advice of His Privy-Council, doth hereby Declare and Order, That all such of His Faithful Subjects, who shall Inlist themselves as Soldiers in His Majesty's Land Service, from this 11th Day of July, shall not be sent out of Great Britain, and shall be entitled to their Discharge in Three Years, or at the End of the War if they choose it—And His Majesty doth hereby further Order, That all Soldiers, who may have Deserted before the First of June last, shall be pardoned for the same, on Condition they join the Corps they last served in by the 20th of August next—And in Case the Regiment they last served in should be out of the Kingdom, that they may then surrender themselves to any other, in which they may serve, and be entitled to His Majesty's most gracious Pardon.

WHEREAS the Time limited by His Majesty's Proclamation of the Fifteenth of May last, "For giving Encouragement to Seamen, and Able bodied Landmen, to enter themselves on Board His Majesty's Ships of War; for granting Rewards for discovering such Seamen as shall conceal themselves; for pardoning such Seamen as have deserted, and shall return into the Service; and also for taking up all straggling Seamen", will expire

on the Third Day of July next.—And whereas it is judged expedient for His Majesty's Service, that the several Encouragements thereby given, should remain and continue in Force for some Time longer; — It is therefore hereby ordered in Council, that the Time limited by His Majesty's aforementioned Proclamation be prolonged and extended from the said Third Day of July next, to the Eighteenth Day of August following inclusive, and that the Bounties and Rewards thereby given and granted, be continued to be paid until the said Eighteenth Day of August.—Whereof all Persons concerned are to take Notice, and govern themselves accordingly.

WHEREAS His Majesty hath received Information from His Envoy Extraordinary at the Court of Turin, that a Polacca, under Imperial Colours, from the Coast of Barbary, is reported to have the Plague on Board, and is in those Seas, and has been seen off the Coast of Provence near *Marseilles*; and that the Master and several Passengers and Seamen have died on Board: And His Majesty having likewise received Information from the Vice Consul at *Genoa*, that a Ragusa Ship is arrived at *Leghorn*, and a Tuscan Ship at *Marseilles*, both with foul Bills of Health from *Alexandretta*, and that the Contagion is got amongst the said Ships Crews.— And whereas it is of the utmost Importance to prevent the Contagion being brought into this Kingdom, — It is therefore hereby ordered in Council, That all Ships which are already arrived, or shall hereafter arrive in any of the Ports of this Kingdom, or of the Isles of *Jersey*, *Guernsey*, *Alderney*, *Sark* or

or Man, from those Seas, be strictly examined, whether they have had Communication with any of the suspected Ships beforementioned, or whether they have touched at the Morea, the Coast of Barbary, or any infected Place; and in Case such Ships shall appear to have had Communication with any of the said suspected Ships, or touched at any of the said Places, that they be then put under the like Rules of Quarantine with those now subsisting upon Ships and Goods coming from Smyrna.—And the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, the Commissioners for Executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great-Britain, the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, and the Governors or Commanders in Chief for the Time being of the said respective Isles of Jersey, Guernsey, Alderney, Sark and Man, are to give the necessary Directions herein, as to them may respectively appertain.

Landshut, June 28. The King of Prussia having Notice, that the Austrians were moving towards Lusatia, ordered some Battalions of Grenadiers, accompanied with the Piquets of Dragoons, Hussars, and two Free Battalions, to march; and putting himself at their Head, led them to Schatzlar in Bohemia, of which Place he took Possession, after a very short Resistance.

On the 30th his Prussian Majesty detached the Generals Wedel and Rebenitzh, to occupy Trautenau, of which it was believed they would be in Possession. And at the same Time Lieutenant General Seidlitz was detached towards Hirschberg, in order to secure the Passes, in Case the Enemy should attempt to enter that Way, or through Lusatia into Silesia.

Copenhagen, July 3. On Friday the 29th past, towards Evening, his Danish Majesty returned hither from Holstein in perfect Health, and without having any Court, set out the next Morning for Friedensbourg, where the Court and Council will be held, as usual, on Friday next.

Prince Ferdinand's Head Quarters at Dissen, July 6. On the 3d Instant the Allied Army marched to this Place, where we are still encamped. The same Day Lieutenant General Wangenheim, with his Corps, arrived at Munster, and incamped under the Walls of that Town, and was to be this Day at Ladberg.

Yesterday the Enemy's principal Army was incamped with their Left to Bielefeld, where the Head Quarters were, and their Right towards Hervorden.

Our Hussars, upon our first coming here, were advanced to Halle, from whence they were dislodged the next Day, and driven in upon Ravensberg Castle, where the Chasseurs and the Prussian Light Infantry were posted. The

French were about a Thousand strong, composed of Hussars, Voivontaires de Clermont, and Grenadiers Royaux. They came up with great Spirit to the Castle, but were soon obliged to retire, with the Loss of about 20 of their Men. That Post was immediately reinforced with five Battalions of our Grenadiers, and four Squadrons of Dragoons; upon which the French abandoned Halle. On Tuesday last the Black Hussars, with some of the Hessians, killed, and made Prisoners, about 100 of Turpin's Regiment. This Morning the Hereditary Prince was detached to Mello, at which Place there were strong Detachments of the Enemy Yesterday; but it is not said, whether any were found there this Morning. His Highness will return this Evening with Part of his Troops.

Dissen, July 7. We have made no Change in our Position this Day. The Hanoverian Chasseurs this Morning surprized a Post of the Enemy at Nevenkuchen, killed a Captain and about 15 Men, wounded several others, and brought into Camp a Captain, a Lieutenant, and 46 private Men Prisoners, all of the Voivontaires de Clermont.

Hague, July 13. Letters of the 10th Instant from the Allied Army inform us, That Prince Ferdinand's Head Quarters were then at Osnabrug. It is not said, whether the French have yet quitted Bielefeld. The Light Troops of the Allied Army have of late distinguished themselves greatly: Besides the Success they have had against the Voivontaires de Clermont, and the Hussars of Berchini and Turpin, Lieutenant Colonel Freytagg has, in an Expedition upon the Right Bank of the Weser, fallen upon the Regiment of the Voivontaires d'Alsace near Munden, and has killed or taken Prisoners almost the whole Corps.

The States of Holland, who are now assembled, are, this Day, to receive the Demission of M. Steyn their Grand Pensionary, his Term of Years for holding that Office being expired; and he will of Course be requested, with a Compliment of Approbation and Thanks, to continue in his Employment.
