PRESENT,

The KING's most Excellent Majesty in Council.

IS Majesty, with the Advice of His Privy-Council, doth hereby Declare and Order, That all fuch of His Faithful Subjects, who shall Inlist themselves as Soldiers in His Majesty's Land Service, from this 11th Day of July, shall not be fent out of Great Britain, and shall be en-titled to their Discharge in Three Years, or at the End of the War if they choose it-And His Majesty doth hereby further Order, That all Soldiers, who may have Deferted before the First of June last, shall be pardoned for the fame, on Condition they join the Corps they last served in by the 20th of August next-And in Case the Regiment they last ferved in should be out of the Kingdom, that they may then furrender themselves to any other, in which they may serve, and be entitled to His Majesty's most gracious Pardon.

HEREAS the Time limited by His Majesty's Proclamation of the Fifteenth of May last, "For giving Encouragement to "Seamen, and Able bodied Landmen, to enter 66 themselves on Board His Majesty's Ships of 66 War; for granting Rewards for discovering " fuch Seamen as shall conceal themselves; for 66 pardoning fuch Seamen as have deferted, and " shall return into the Service; and also for " taking up all straggling Seamen", will expire

AT the Court at Kenfington, the 11th Day of on the Third Day of July next.—And whereas it is judged expedient for His Majesty's Service, that the several Encouragements thereby given, should remain and continue in Force for some Time longer; — It is therefore hereby ordered in Council, that the Time limited by His Majefty's aforementioned Proclamation be prolonged and extended from the faid Third Day of July next, to the Eighteenth Day of August following inclusive, and that the Bounties and Rewards thereby given and granted, be continued to be paid until the faid Eighteenth Day of August.-Whereof all Persons concerned are to take Notice, and govern themselves accordingly.

HEREAS His Majesty hath received Information from His Envoy Extraordinary at the Court of Turin, that a Polacca, under Imperial Colours, from the Coast of Barbary, is reported to have the Plague on Board, and is in those Seas, and has been seen off the Coast of Provence near Marseilles; and that the Master and several Passengers and Seamen have died on Board: And His Majesty having likewife received Information from the Vice Conful at Genoa, that a Ragusa Ship is arrived at Leghorn, and a Tuscan Ship at Marfeilles, both with foul Bills of Health from Alexandretta, and that the Contagion is got amongst the faid Ships Crews. -- And whereas it is of the utmost Importance to prevent the Contagion being brought into this Kingdom, therefore hereby ordered in Council, That all Ships which are already arrived, or shall hereafter arrive in any of the Ports of this Kingdom, or of the Isles of Jersey, Guernsey, Alderney, Sark
