AT the Court at *Kensington*, the 24th Day of July, 1759,

P R E S E N T,

The KING's most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS His Majesty was pleased by His Order in Council of the 2d of June, 1758, to direct, that for the better preventing the Plague from being brought into this Kingdom, all Privateers, and all Persons, Goods and Merchandizes on Board the same, coming from the Mediterranean, should make their Quarantine for Forty Days, and strictly conform themselves in all Respects to the Rules and Regulations required to be observed by Ships and Vessels coming from Smyrna, and other Parts of the Levant, and the Coast of Barbary—And whereas His Majesty hath received Information that the Plague doth at this Time rage with great Violence in many Parts of the Levant, the Morea, and other adjacent Places; and it being apprehended that all Ships and Vessels in the Mediterranean, whether Traders, Cruizers, or others, may have Communication with the Ships and Vessels coming from some of the said infected Places—His Majesty doth therefore judge it necessary, that the beforementioned Quarantine, laid upon Privateers cruising in the Mediterranean, should be extended to all Ships and Vessels whatsoever, coming from or through the Mediterranean: And to that End, His Majesty, with the Advice of His Privy Council, doth hereby order, require, and command, that all Ships and Vessels whatsoever, coming from or through the Mediterranean, and all Persons, Goods and Merchandizes on Board the same, that are already arrived, or shall hereafter arrive in any of the Ports of this Kingdom, or of the Isles of Jersey, Guernsey, Alderney, Sark or Man, do make their Quarantine for Forty Days, and do likewise strictly conform themselves in all Respects to the Rules and Regulations required

to be observed by Ships and Vessels coming from Smyrna, and other Parts of the Levant, and the Coast of Barbary.—And the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, the Commissioners for Executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, the Master General of the Ordnance, His Majesty's Secretary at War, and the Governors or Commanders in Chief for the Time being of the said respective Isles of Jersey, Guernsey, Alderney, Sark, and Man, are to give the necessary Directions herein, as to them may respectively appertain.

The KING's most Excellent Majesty in Council.

HIS Majesty, with the Advice of His Privy-Council, doth hereby Declare and Order, That all such of His Faithful Subjects, who shall Inlist themselves as Soldiers in His Majesty's Land Service, from this 11th Day of July, shall not be sent out of Great Britain, and shall be entitled to their Discharge in Three Years, or at the End of the War if they choose it—And His Majesty doth hereby further Order, That all Soldiers, who may have Deserted before the First of June last, shall be pardoned for the same, on Condition they join the Corps they last served in by the 20th of August next—And in Case the Regiment they last served in should be out of the Kingdom, that they may then surrender themselves to any other, in which they may serve, and be entitled to His Majesty's most gracious Pardon.

WHEREAS the Time limited by His Majesty's Proclamation of the Fifteenth of May last, "For giving Encouragement to Seamen, and Able-bodied Landmen, to enter themselves on Board His Majesty's Ships of War; for granting Rewards for discovering such Seamen as shall conceal themselves; for pardoning such Seamen as have deserted, and shall return into the Service; and also for taking up all straggling Seamen", will expire on the Third Day of July next—And whereas it is judged expedient for His Majesty's Service, that the several Encouragements thereby given, should remain and continue in Force for some Time longer;—It is therefore hereby ordered in Council, that the Time limited by His Majesty's aforementioned Proclamation be prolonged and extended from the said Third Day of July next, to the Eighteenth Day of August following inclusive, and that the Bounties and Rewards thereby given and granted, be continued to be paid until the said Eighteenth Day of August.—Whereof all Persons concerned are to take Notice, and govern themselves accordingly.

The following Address of the Mayor, Bailiffs, and Burgeses of the Borough of Berwick upon Tweed, has been presented to His Majesty by Thomas Watson, Esq; one of their Representatives in Parliament, being introduced by the Right Honourable the Earl of Ashburnham, one of the Lords of His Majesty's Bed Chamber in Waiting: Which Address His Majesty was pleased to receive very graciously.

To the KING's most Excellent Majesty,  
The humble Address of the Mayor, Bailiffs,  
and Burgeses of the Borough of Berwick  
upon Tweed.

*Most Gracious Sovereign,*

WE your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects, the Mayor, Bailiffs, and Burgeses of the Borough of Berwick upon Tweed, in Guild assembled, being highly sensible of the many invaluable Blessings which this Nation has enjoyed under the Government of your Majesty's illustrious House, humbly beg Leave to testify the Joy we feel upon the late happy and wished for Event of his Royal Highness the Prince of Wales's having compleated his One and Twentieth Year; an Event which further secures to us, and our Posterity, the Continuance of those Blessings under a Prince formed by your Royal Hand, and educated in the same mild Principles of Government, which have distinguished your Majesty as the Father of your

Subjects, and made your Subjects the Envy of Europe.

The Success, which by the Blessing of Providence has so signally attended your Majesty's Arms in the Conquest of the Island of Guadeloupe, administers an additional Occasion of Joy and Congratulation.

No Wonder if the Enemy, stung with Repentment at their repeated Losses, and the Ruin of their Commerce, meditate a fatal Blow to your Majesty's Government, by an Invasion of these Kingdoms. But, we trust, the Protection of the Almighty, the Wisdom and Vigour of your Majesty's Councils, and the Courage and Fidelity of your Subjects, will, as they have hitherto done, confound their Devices, and disappoint their Hopes.

As your Majesty's loyal Subjects of Berwick have upon former Occasions distinguished their Zeal and Attachment to your Majesty's Person and Government, so they are determined upon this interesting Occasion to risk their Lives and Fortunes in Support of your Majesty's just Rights, and the British Constitution.

May Success still wait upon your Majesty's Arms, and crown your Endeavours to render your People happy, under a Race of Kings of your illustrious House, zealous to defend the Liberties and Religion of these Kingdoms from the Encroachments of Superstition and Arbitrary Power.

In Testimony whereof, we have hereunto affixed the Common Seal of this Borough, the Twentieth Day of July, One Thousand Seven Hundred and Fifty Nine.

*Schmotziefen, July 13.* The Corps led by the King of Prussia having joined the main Body of the Army, which had advanced from Hirschberg under the Command of the Margrave Charles, on the 10th Instant at Geppersdorff, his Prussian Majesty chose a strong Camp on the Heights before the Village of Schmotziefen; and the Head Quarters are at a Farm House called Durren-Voerwercks. The Situation of this Camp is a very advantageous one, and both the Flanks are well covered; on the Left is the small Town of Liebenthal, and behind the Right, at about the Distance of one German Mile, is the Town of Loewenberg. Marshal Daun's Head Quarters are at Gorkitz-Heim in Lusatia, and the Army under his Command is placed on the Heights behind the Queils, the Right extending towards Greiffenberg, and the Left towards Lauban. Nothing Material has yet passed between the two Armies.

*Head Quarters at Petershagen, July 13.* On the 16th the Allied Army marched and encamped at Petershagen; and the same Day Advice having been received, that the Enemy's principal Army was arrived in the Neighbourhood of Minden, and that a large Body of them had incamped on this Side the Morafs, Prince Ferdinand gave Orders for the Allied Army to hold themselves in Readiness to march that Night at Twelve o'Clock. About One in the Morning his Serene Highness repaired to the

the Camp, and taking with him all the Piquets of the Army under the Command of Lieutenant General Imhoff, advanced himself towards Minden, and about Four o'Clock ordered the Army to follow him in nine Columns, leaving their Tents standing, and Baggage behind them. These Measures, it was thought, were taken with Design to attack the French, if a proper Opportunity could be found. But in the Night between the 16th and 17th, the Enemy had struck their Tents, and altered their Position, having withdrawn all the Troops they had on this Side the Morafs, placing their Right to Minden, their Left towards the Mountains, the Weser in their Rear, and the Morafs in their Front. Under these Circumstances, Orders were given about Noon to the Allied Army to return to their former Camp.

*Hague, July 27.* The Letters of the freshest Date from the Allied Army in Westphalia, which are of the 21st Instant, bring no farther Accounts from thence, than that Prince Ferdinand's Head Quarters were still at Petershagen; and that M. de Contades's Army remained in its former Position near Minden. Some Skirmishes only have happened since the 17th, in which, as we hear, the Advantage has been on the Side of the Allied Army.
