The KING's most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS His Majesty was pleased by His Order in Council of the 2d of June, 1758, to direct, that for the better preventing the Plague from being brought into this Kingdom, all Privateers, and all Persons, Goods and Merchandizes on Board the same, coming from the Mediterranean, should make their Quarantine for Forty Days, and strictly conform themselves in all Respects to the Rules and Regulations required to be observed by Ships and Vessels coming from Smyrna, and other Parts of the Levant, and the Coast of Barbary—And whereas His Majesty hath received Information that the Plague doth at this Time rage with great Violence in many Parts of the Levant, the Morea, and other adjacent Places; and it being apprehended that all Ships and Vessels in the Mediterranean, whether Traders, Cruizers, or others, may have Communication with the Ships and Vessels coming from some of the said infected Places—His Majesty doth therefore judge it necessary, that the beforementioned Quarantine, laid upon Privateers cruizing in the Mediterranean, should be extended to all Ships and Vessels whatsoever, coming from or through the Mediterranean: And to that End, His Majesty, with the Advice of His Privy Council, doth hereby order, require, and command, that all Ships and Vessels whatsoever, coming from or through the Mediterranean, and all Persons, Goods and Merchandizes on Board the same, that are already arrived, or shall hereafter arrive in any of the Ports of this Kingdom, or of the Isles of Jersey, Guernsey, Alderney, Sark or Man, do make their Quarantine for Forty Days, and do likewise strictly conform themselves in all Respects to the Rules and Regulations required to be observed by Ships and Vessels coming from Smyrna, and other Parts of the Levant, and the Coast of Barbary.—And the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, the Commissioners for Executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, the Master General of the Ordnance, His Majesty's Secretary at War, and the Governors or Commanders in Chief for the

Time being of the said respective Isles of Jersey, Guernsey, Alderney, Sark, and Man, are to give the necessary Directions herein, as to them may respectively appertain.

HIS Majesty, with the Advice of His Privy-Council, doth hereby Declare and Order, That all such of His Faithful Subjects, who shall Inlist themselves as Soldiers in His Majesty's Land Service, from this 11th Day of July, shall not be sent out of Great Britain, and shall be entitled to their Discharge in Three Years, or at the End of the War if they choose it—And His Majesty doth hereby further Order, That all Soldiers, who may have Deserted before the First of June last, shall be pardoned for the same, on Condition they join the Corps they last served in by the 20th of August next—And in Case the Regiment they last served in should be out of the Kingdom, that they may then surrender themselves to any other, in which they may serve, and be entitled to His Majesty's most gracious Pardon.

The Lords of His Majesty's most Honourable Privy Council.

WHEREAS the Time limited by His Majesty's Proclamation of the Fifteenth of May last, "For giving Encouragement to Seamen, and Able-bodied Landmen, to enter themselves on Board His Majesty's Ships of War; for granting Rewards for discovering such Seamen as shall conceal themselves; for pardoning such Seamen as have deserted, and shall return into the Service; and also for taking up all straggling Seamen", will expire on the Third Day of July next.—And whereas it is judged expedient for His Majesty's Service, that the several Encouragements thereby given, should

should remain and continue in Force for some Time longer; — It is therefore hereby ordered in Council, that the Time limited by His Majesty's aforementioned Proclamation be prolonged and extended from the said Third Day of July next, to the Eighteenth Day of August following inclusive, and that the Bounties and Rewards thereby given and granted, be continued to be paid until the said Eighteenth Day of August. — Whereof all Persons concerned are to take Notice, and govern themselves accordingly.

Head Quarters at Petershagen, July 24.

The Allied Army continues still incamped in this Neighbourhood, and the Enemy's principal Army keep their Position at Minden. The Corps of M. Broglie is likewise incamped close to Minden on the other Side the Weser, with their Left to the River, and their Right extending towards Vautauru.

Whitehall, August 7.

Extract of a Letter from Andrew Mitchell, Esq; His Majesty's Minister to the King of Prussia, to the Right Honourable the Earl of Holderness, dated from his Prussian Majesty's Camp at Schmotseiffen, July 24, 1759.

This Night, after Nine o'Clock, M. Eichel acquainted me, by the King of Prussia's Order, that a few Hours ago an Aid de Camp was arrived from General Wedel, who now commands the Prussian Army against the Russians, with the following Account of an Action, that happened Yesterday Morning between the two Armies.

The Russians, which were incamped in Sight of the Prussians near Zullichau, began to march towards Crossen; and General Wedel thought proper to attack them upon their March, which he did with great Success, having, it is reckoned, killed Seven Thousand upon the Spot, with very little Loss on his Side, (it is said Three Hundred killed, and Five Hundred wounded.) Lieutenant General Schurlemer, at the Head of the Prussian Cavalry, distinguished himself very much, and made great Slaughter of the Enemy. I do not hear of the Loss of any General Officer on the Side of the Prussians, except Major General Woperfnow, who was killed in the Action.

These are all the Particulars that are yet known of this Affair.

On Saturday last the Honourable Major General Barrington, Commander in Chief of His Majesty's Forces in the Island of Guadalupe, arrived from that Place at Portsmouth, on Board His Majesty's Ship the Roebuck, and immediately dispatched Lieutenant Colonel Skeen, his Aid de Camp, to the Right Honourable Mr. Secretary Pitt, with the Capitulations of the Island of Marigalante, which surrendered on the 26th of May to His Majesty's Arms, upon the same Terms which had been granted to the Islands of Guadalupe and Grande Terre.
