THEREAS His Majesty was pleased by His Order in Council of the 2d of June, 1758, to direct, that for the better preventing the Plague from being brought into this Kingdom, all Privateers, and all Perfons, Goods and Merchandizes on Board the fame, coming from the Mediterranean, fhould make their Quarantine for Forty Days, and flrictly conform themfelves in all Respects to the Rules and Regulations required to be observed by Ships and Veffels coming from Smyrna, and other Parts of the Levant, and the Coaft of Barbary-And whereas His Majesty hath received Information that the Plague doth at this Time rage with great Violence in many Parts of the Levant, the Morea, and other adjacent Places; and it being apprehended that all Ships and Veffels in the Mediterranean, whether Traders, Cruizers, or others, may haveCommunication with the Ships and Veffels coming from fome of the faid infected Places-His Majesty doth therefore judge it neceffary, that the beforementioned Quarantine, laid upon Privateers cruizing in the Mediterranean, fhould be extended to all Ships and Veffels whatloever, coming from or through the Mediterranean: And to that End, His Majefty, with the Advice of His Privy Council, doth hereby order, require, and command, that all Ships and Veffels whatfoever, coming from or through the Mediterranean, and all Perfons, Goods and Merchandizes on Board the fame, that are already arrived, or fhall hereafter arrive in any of the Ports of this Kingdom, or of the Isles of Jersey, Guernsey, Alderney, Sark or Man, do make their Quarantine for Forty Days, and do likewife ftrictly conform themfelves in all Refpects to the Rules and Regulations required to be observed by Ships and Vessels coming from Smyrna, and other Parts of the Levant, and the Coaft of Barbary.-And the Lords Commiffioners of His Majefty's Treasury, the Commiffioners for Executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Geat Britain, the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, the Master General of the Ordnance, His Majesty's Secretary at War, and the Governors or Commanders in Chief for the

Extract of a Letter from Andrew Mitchell, Efq; His Majesty's Minister to the King of Prussia, to the Pight Honourable the Earl of Holdernesse, dated from his Prussian Majesty's Camp at Schmotseissen, July 24, 1759. This Night, after Nine o'Clock, M. Eichel

This Night, after Nine o'Clock, M. Eichel acquainted me, by the King of Pruffia's Order, that a few Hours ago an Aid de Camp was arrived from General Wedel, who now commands the Pruffian Army againft the Ruffians, with the following Account of an Action, that happened Yesterday Morning between the two Armies.

The Ruffians, which were incamped in Sight of the Pruffians near Zullichau, began to march towards Croffen ; and General Wedel thought proper to attack them upon their March, which he did with great Succefs, having, it is reckoned, killed Seven Thoufand upon the Spot, with very little Lofs on his Side, (it is faid Three Hundred killed, and Five Hundred wounded.) Lieutenant General Schurlemer, at the Head of the Pruffian Cavalry, diftinguifhed himfelf very much, and made great Slaughter of the Enemy. I do not hear of the Lofs of any General Officer on the Side of the Pruffians, except Major General Woperfnow, who was killed in the Action.

These are all the Particulars that are yet known of this Affair.
