PRESENT,

The KING's most Excellent Majesty in Council.

TIS Majesty, with the Advice of His Privy Council, doth hereby Declare and Order, That all fuch of His Faithful Subjects, who shall Inlist themselves as Soldiers in His Majesty's Land Service, from this 11th Day of July, shall not be fent out of Great Britain, and shall be entitled to their Discharge in Three Years, or as the End of the War if they choose it-And His Majesty doth hereby surther Order, That all Soldiers, who may have Deferted before the First of June last, shall be pardoned for the fame, on Condicion they join the Corps they last served in by the 20th of August next-And in Case the Regiment they last served in should be out of the Kingdom, that they may then furrender themselves to any other, in which they may serve, and be entitled to His Majesty's most gracious Pardon.

PRESENT,

The KING's most Excellent Majesty in Council.

HEREAS His Majesty was pleased by His Order in Council of the 11th of July last, to declare and order, (amongst other Things) That all such of His faithful Subjects, who should from and after that Time inlift themselves as Soldiers in His Land Service, should not be sent out of Great Britain, and should be intitled to their Discharge in three Years, or at the End of the War, if they should chuse it; -His Majesty, with the Advice of His Privy Council, doth hereby most graciously repeat and confirm the fame, with relation to fuch as shall hereaster enlist on those Conditions; as also to such as have been inlisted in

any Corps from the 11th of July last to this Dav—But whereas Doubts have arisen with Respect to the Extent and Meaning of His Maietty's faid Order,-His Majesty in Council doth therefore hereby declare, That the Conditions therein contained are not meant or intended to extend to such who shall inlist themselves in Great Britain, to serve in Regiments Abroad, whether Ireland or elsewhere, or to such who may chuse to inlist in any of His Majesty's Corps in the usual Manner, without Limitation of Time or Place of Service.

The KING's most Excellent Majesty in Council.

THEREAS the Time limited by His Majesty's Proclamation of the Fisteenth of May last, "For giving Encouragement to Seamen, and Able bodied Landmen, to enter " themselves on Board His Majesty's Ships of " War; for granting Rewards for discovering " fuch Seamen as shall conceal themselves; for pardoning fuch Seamen as have deferted, and " fhall return into the Service; and also for " taking up all straggling Seamen", was, by Order in Council of the 26th of June last, prolonged and extended from the 3d of July, to the 18th of this Instant August — And whereas it is judged expedient for His Majesty's Service, that the same should be continued for some Time longer; —His Majesty doth therefore, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, hereby order, that the Time limited by the faid Order in Council, be prolonged and extended from the aforesaid 18th Day of this Instant August, to the 29th Day of September next, and that the Bounties and Rewards given and granted by His Majesty's aforementioned Proclamation, be continued to be paid until the faid 29th Day of September next: - Whereof all. Persons concerned are to take Notice, and govern themselves accordingly.

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Among the Papers which were taken at Detmold on the 5th Instant, by His Majesty's Light Troops, an original Letter is found from the Marshal Duc de Belleisse to Marshal Contades, Dated Versailles, July 23, 1759, in which there is the following Pessage.

Ai toujours peur que Fischer ne soit partitrop tard: Il est cependant bein important, et bien essentiel, que nous puissions tirer de grosses Contributions. Je ne vois de Ressources pour nos Depenses les plus urgentes, et pour les Reparations des Troupes, que dans l'Argent que nous pourrons avoir du Païs Ennemy; d'où il faudra egalement tirer des Subfistances de must likewise procure Subsistence of all Kinds,

I Am still afraid that Fischer set out too late: It is, however, very important, and very effential, that we should raise large Contributions. Head Quarters at Stuckenbrook, August 8. On the 4th Instant His Majesty's Army marched to Coovelt, and the 5th to Hervorden. The same Day Lieutenant General Urst, with seven Battalions and twenty Squadrons, was detached to Lemgow.

The 6th the Army marched to Bieleveld, and that Morning Advice was received that M. d'Armentieres, who had invested Lipstadt on the 31st of last Month, had raised the Seige on the 4th Instant, and had sent away all his heavy Artillery, with ten Battalions, to reinforce the Garrisons of Wesel and Dusseldorp, and with the rest of his Corps was marched towards Warborg.

Lieutenant General Urff surrounded and took Prisoners about eight Hundred of the Enemy on the 5th Instant at Detmold, together with the heavy Baggage of the French Army (among which was found Part of M. de Contades's Papers) and the Military Chest of the Saxons.

The Hereditary Prince, with 16 Battalions and about 23 Squadrons, including almost all the Light Troops of the Army, passed the Wefer at Hamelen on the 4th Instant, in Pursuit of the Enemy, who were retreating towards the Country of Hesse.

The Town of Munster was evacuated by the French; but the Regiment of the Volontaires de Clermont re-entered it, upon the Appearance of some Hessian Chasseurs before it. Some Regular Troops are now upon their March, under the Command of Colonel Boyd, to dislodge the Enemy from thence. The large Magazines, we had at Osnabrug, have been secovered; those the French had at Mun-

Hay, Straw, Oats, for the Winter, Bread-Corn, Cattle, Horses, and even Men to recruit our Foreign Troops. The War must not be prolonged, and perhaps it may be necessary, according to the Events which may happen, between this Time and the End of September, to make a down-right Defert before the Line of the Quarters, which it may be thought proper to keep during the Winter, in order that the Enemy may be under a real Impossibility of approaching us: At the same Time reserving for ourselves a bare Subsistence on the Route. which may be the most convenient for us to take in the Middle of Winter, to beat up, or seize upon the Enemy's Quarters. That this Object may be fulfilled, I cause the greatest Assiduity to be used, in preparing what is necesfary for having all your Troops, without Exception, well cloathed, well armed, well equipped, and well refitted, in every Respect, before the End of November, with new Tents, in order that, if it shall be adviseable for the King's political and military Affairs, you may be able to affemble the Whole, or Part of your Army, to act offensively, and with Vigour, from the Beginning of January; and that you may have the Satisfaction to shew our Enemies, and all Europe, that the French know how to act, and carry on War, in all Seafons, when they have such a General as you are, and a Minister of the Depa tment of War, that can foresee and concert Matters with the General.

You must be sensible, Sir, that what I say to you may become not only useful and honourable, but perneps even necessary with Respect to what you know, and of which I shall say more in my private Letter.

ster, Dulmen, and Warendorp, have been deftroyed by them. The Magazines we have taken at Minden, Bilefeld, and Paderborn, are considerable; but Part of those taken at the last mentioned Place, has been dispersed and plundered.

The Enemy, according to our Advices, acknowledge their Loss in the Action of the 1st Instant to amount to 7000 Men killed and wounded; and as great Numbers of Deserters have come over to a fince that glorious Day, besides Prisoners, their Army must certainly be extremely diminished. The whole Loss of our Army, by the best Accounts, amounts to about 2800 Men killed and wounded, and about 500 Hotses including the Artillery; several of those Men are but slightly wounded, and are already able to do Duty in their respective Corps.

Head Quarters at Dalen, five Leagues distant of Paderborn, August 11.

We arrived, on the 9th, at Paderborn, and remained there, the 10th. Prince Ferdinand sent that Day, several Detachments forward, in order to secure the Passes into the Country of Waldeck. M. d'Armentieres occupies one or two of them, particularly that of Warbourg, To-morrow we shall proceed to Stadbergen and on the 13th shall enter the Country of Waldeck. We have had no Advices from the Hereditary Prince since the 9th. His Highness was on the 8th at Eimbeck. It is thought that the French Army cannot get to Cassel before the 12th, or perhaps the 13th. We made 400 Prisoners at Paderborn.

Berlin, August 7. By the last Advices from our Army, opposed to the Russians, we are in-

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formed, that his Majesty marched, on the 3d Instant, from Beskow to Muhlrose, and next Day was joined by the Army under General Wedel, who had before retaken Crossen. During these two last Marches, we have taken several hundred more Prifoners of the Austrians. The Number of which, from the 1st to the 4th Instant, has increased to above 2000 Men. But as in the mean Time a Body of Austrians, under General Laudohn, whose Number we are not acquainted with, has found Means to join the Russians, the King has thought proper to recal the Corps of 9000 Men under General Finck, which had been detached to cover S2xo-This Corps arrived at Beskow on the 7th, and was next Day to join the King's Army, which had marched to Lebus for that Purpole. His Majesty having made these Dispositions, we every Day expect to hear of a general and decifive Action.

Treasury Chambers, August 7, 1759. THEREAS notwithstanding the several Acts of Parliament now in Force for preventing illegal Lotteries, and the feveral Con -victions of Offenders in pursuance thereof, Information has been lately given to the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, that there is now on Foot in Ireland a Scheme for raifing a Sum of Money by the Sale of Tickets or Chances to be determined by the Drawing of the present State Lottery, and that the faid Scheme is handed about this Town and other Parts of this Kingdom, and that Tickets or Chances agreeable thereunto are offered to Sale in Defiance and Contempt of the feveral Acts of Parliament for prohibiting the fame; Therefore, in order to put a Stop to fuch unlawful Proceedings, and to prevent the Ignorant and Unwary from being drawn in by fo illegal and pernicious a Practice; This is to inform the Public, that the Lords Com-missioners of His Majesty's Treasury have given Directions to their Sollicitor to profecute with the utmost Rigour and Severity of the Law all fuch as shall be anyways concerned in publishing such Schemes, or buying or felling any fuch Tickets or Chances. And whereas Mr. John M'Carrick and Mr. Henry Lunn, late of the City of London, were on the 8th of March 1757, convicted of the like Offence, and have ever fince absconded in order to avoid the Penalties thereby incurred: Therefore the Lords Commissioners of the Treasury are hereby pleased to offer a Reward of Fifty Pounds, to be paid to any Person or Persons that shall apprehend either of them, on immediate Notice thereof being given to Philip Carteret Webb, Esq; their Solicitor.
