THEREAS His Majesty was pleased by His Order in Council of the 11th of July last, to declare and order, (amongst other Things) That all such of His faithful Subjects, who should from and after that Time inlift themselves as Soldiers in His Land Service, should not be sent out of Great Britain, and should be intitled to their Discharge in three Years, or at the End of the War, if they should chuse it; -His Majesty, with the Advice of His Privy Council, doth hereby most graciously repeat and confirm the same, with relation to fuch as shall hereafter enlist on those Conditions; as also to such as have been inlisted in any Corps from the 11th of July last to this Day—But whereas Doubts have arisen with Respect to the Extent and Meaning of His Majesty's faid Order,-His Majesty in Council doth therefore hereby declare, That the Conditions therein contained are not meant or intended to extend to fuch who shall inlist themselves in Great Britain, to ferve in Regiments Abroad, whether Ireland or elsewhere, or to such who may chuse to inlist in any of His Majesty's Corps in the usual Manner, without Limitation of Time or Place of Service.
