Copy of a Letter from James De Lancey, Esq; Lieutenant Governor of New York, to Mr. Secretary Pitt. New York, August 5, 1759.

Sir,

AS I would not slip an Opportunity of conveying agreeable News, I take this, by a Merchant Ship, ready to sail for Bristol, with Pleasure to congratulate you on the Success of His Majesty's Arms, in defeating the French Army, coming to the Relief of Niagara, which brought on the early Surrender of the Fort, whereby the most important Pass in all the Indian Countries is brought under His Majesty's Subjection.

The Army defeated was made up by Troops drawn from Venango, Beeve River, and Presq' Isle, so that those Parts must in a Manner lye open to Brigadier General Stanwix, and therefore, I cannot doubt of his Success.

I received the Account Yesterday Afternoon by Express: For the Particulars I refer to the inclosed Relation sent me by Lieut. Coventry, Assistant Deputy Quarter Master General at Albany, which contains the Substance of the Intelligence I have received.

Copy of Lieutenant Coventry's Letter to Lieutenant Governor De Lancey.

Albany, August 2, 1759.

Sir,

I have this Moment received the agreeable News of Niagara's surrendering to our Army on the 25th ult. 607 Prisoners are on their Way from Niagara for this Place. Lieutenant Moncrieff brought the Dispatches, and sets out To-morrow Morning for Ticonderoga. If Colonel Amherst be not failed, let him have the Inclosed.

Copy of the Account of the Defeat of the French near Niagara, and Reduction of the Fort, inclosed in Lieutenant Coventry's Letter.

This Day Lieutenant Moncrieff, Aid de Camp to the late General Prideaux, arrived here from Niagara, which he left the 26th Instant, in his Way to General Amherst. From the said Gentleman, we have the following Particulars, viz. That, after the melancholy Accident of the 20th, [Brigadier General Prideaux being killed by the bursting of a Cohorn] the Command of the Army devolving on Sir William Johnson, he continued to pursue the late General's vigorous Measures, and erected his third Battery within 100 Yards of the Flag Bastion. Having Intelligence from his Indians of a large Party on their March from the Falls, to relieve the Fort, Sir William made a Disposition to prevent them. The 23d, in the Evening, he ordered the Light Infantry, and Picquets of the Line, to lye near the Road on our Left, leading from the Falls to the Fort. These he reinforced, in the Morning of the 24th, with the Grenadiers, and Part of the 46th Regiment, all under the Command of Lieutenant Colonel Maffey. Lieutenant Colonel Farquhar, with

the 44th Battalion, was ordered to the Tail of the Trenches, to support the Guard of the Trenches commanded by Major Beckwith. About Eight in the Morning, our Indians advanced to speak to the French Indians, which the Enemy declined. The Action began soon after, with the Scream, as usual, from the Enemy; but our Troops were so well disposed to receive them in Front, and our Indians on their Flanks, that, in less than an Hour's Time, the whole Army was ruined. The Number of the Slain was not ascertained, as the Pursuit continued for five Miles. 17 Officers were made Prisoners, among whom are M. D'Aubry, Chief in Command, wounded; M. De Lignery, second in Command, and wounded; also M. Marin, Leader of the Indians; M. de Villie, Repentini, Martini, Bafone, all Captains; and several others. After this Defeat, which was in Sight of the Garrison, Sir William sent Major Harvey into the Fort, with a List of the Officers taken, recommending it to the Commanding Officer to surrender, before more Blood was shed; and while he had it in his Power to refrain the Indians. The Commanding Officer, to be certain of such a Defeat, sent an Officer of his to see the Prisoners: They were shewn to him; and, in short, the Capitulation was finished about Ten at Night of the 24th, by which the Garrison surrendered with the Honours of War; which Lieutenant Moncrieff saw embarked the Morning he came away, to the Number of 607 private Men, exclusive of Officers and their Ladies, and those taken in the Action. We expect them here To-morrow on their Way to New York.

Whitehall, September 8.

This Morning Lieutenant Colonel Amherst arrived here with Letters from Major General Amherst to the Right Honourable Mr. Secretary Pitt, dated at the Camp at Ticonderoga the 27th of July, giving an Account of his having taken Possession of the Lines of that Place on the 24th, the Garrison having abandoned and set Fire to the Fort. The preceding Night, at Ten o'Clock, some Volunteers got into the Fort, and brought the Colours away with them. The Troops extinguished the Fire as soon as possible, and saved all they could. The Letters add, that the Honourable Colonel Townshend, Deputy Adjutant General, was killed on the 25th of July, but on what Occasion is not mentioned.

Prince Ferdinand's Head Quarters at Wetter, August 20. The Army, under the Command of Prince Ferdinand, came to Franckenberg on the 22d Instant, and halted there that Day. The Hereditary Prince, with his Body of Troops, was then at Haina, and was joined there by the Prince of Holstein, and Lieut. General Wangenheim, with their respective Corps. Lieut. Colonel Freitag having, on the 23d, attacked Ziegenhayn, the commanding Officer at that Place capitulated after an Hour's Defence; and the Garrison, consisting of 3 or 400 Men, were made Prisoners of War. On the 24th, Prince Ferdinand with the Army arrived at Monighausen. The same Day, the Hereditary Prince, and the Prince of Holstein, arrived at Wohra, and marched, the next Day, to Schonstedt.

On the 27th at Night, the Hereditary Prince, with a Detachment under his Command, marched towards this Place, where Fitcher's Corps was then posted. On the 28th, in the Morning, they were attacked by our Troops, and dislodged from their Post, with the Loss of several Men killed, and 400 made Prisoners of War. His Serene Highness Prince Ferdinand has now his Head Quarters here, and the Army is encamped in the Neighbourhood. The Enemy continues about Marbourg.

Hague, Aug. 31. By Accounts of the 21st Instant from Berlin, we hear, that his Prussian Majesty had made some Alteration in his Position, by bringing his Right down to Furstenwalde upon the Sprehe, over which River he had thrown three Bridges. The Corps under General Laudohn, reinforced by General Haddick, was encamped at Muhlrose, and the Russians still kept about Frankfort upon the Oder. Marshal Daun was in Motion, and seemed to be approaching towards Berlin, and was, by the last Accounts, between Forst and Guben in Lusatia. Prince Henry of Prussia keeps close to

him, and had, it is said, taken a large Magazine of the Auftrians at Gorlitz, with the Military Chest. General Wunfch has been detached by his Prussian Majesty towards Wittenberg, and has summoned the Governor of that Town to surrender; and, by the last Accounts, they were settling the Articles of Capitulation. Lieutenant General Imhoff began to fire from three Batteries upon Munster, on the 28th.

Treasury Chambers, August 7, 1759.

WHEREAS notwithstanding the several Acts of Parliament now in Force for preventing illegal Lotteries, and the several Convictions of Offenders in pursuance thereof, Information has been lately given to the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, that there is now on Foot in Ireland a Scheme for raising a Sum of Money by the Sale of Tickets or Chances to be determined by the Drawing of the present State Lottery, and that the said Scheme is handed about this Town and other Parts of this Kingdom, and that Tickets or Chances agreeable thereunto are offered to Sale in Defiance and Contempt of the several Acts of Parliament for prohibiting the same; Therefore, in order to put a Stop to such unlawful Proceedings, and to prevent the Ignorant and Unwary from being drawn in by so illegal and pernicious a Practice; This is to inform the Public, that the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury have given Directions to their Solicitor to prosecute with the utmost Rigour and Severity of the Law all such as shall be anyways concerned in publishing such Schemes, or buying or selling any such Tickets or Chances. And whereas Mr. John McCarrick and Mr. Henry Lunn, late of the City of London, were on the 8th of March 1757, convicted of the like Offence, and have ever since absconded in order to avoid the Penalties thereby incurred: Therefore the Lords Commissioners of the Treasury are hereby pleased to offer a Reward of Fifty Pounds, to be paid to any Person or Persons that shall apprehend either of them, on immediate Notice thereof being given to Philip Carteret Webb, Esq; their Solicitor.

WHEREAS divers Foreign Neutral Ships or Vessels have, during the present War with France, been at different Times, in the Course of their respective Voyages, Piratically Robbed on the British Seas, by the Crews, or Parts of the Crews of several English Ships or Vessels, who were, or pretended to be Privateers; And whereas in order effectually to prosecute the Persons who have committed any such Robberies, it is necessary to prove the Name of each respective Ship or Vessel so robbed, and the Name of the Master or Commander thereof, and the Time when, and the Species and Quantities of Goods Piratically taken, and their Values, with as much Exactness, as the Nature and Circumstances of the Case will admit of; And as it is hardly possible to make such Proofs without the Evidence of proper Persons, who belonged to, and were on Board each particular Ship or Vessel at the Time of its being Robbed; And whereas my Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty have, pursuant to the Directions of the Statute in that Behalf, ordered and appointed a Sessions of Oyer and Terminer and Goal Delivery to be held for the Jurisdiction of the Admiralty of Great Britain, at Justice Hall in the Old Bailey, London, on Monday the 29th Day of October next, for the Trying (amongst other Things) of Persons accused of the aforesaid Offences, several of whom are now in Custody, and may then be tried, in Case such

such Proofs as are above-mentioned shall be made of Robberies committed, and it shall appear by other Evidence, that they were concerned therein; And to the End that Persons, guilty of such Offences as aforesaid, may be brought to Justice, their Lordships are pleased to give this Publick Notice, That Samuel Seddon, Esq; their Solicitor, has Directions to prosecute, on His Majesty's Behalf, all Persons against whom proper Evidence can be produced touching the said Offences; And that the Master and Mate, or others, who were belonging to, and on Board any Foreign Neutral Ship or Vessel, at the Time of its being Piratically Robbed as aforesaid, may apply to the said Samuel Seddon, at his House in Piccadilly, London, either in Person or by Letter, and inform him of such Particulars relating to the Premises aforesaid, as they can give Evidence of.
