THEREAS His Majesty was pleased by His Order in Council of the 11th of July last, to declare and order, (amongst other Things) That all fuch of His faithful Subjects, who should from and after that Time inlift themselves as Soldiers in His Land Service, should not be sent out of Great Britain, and should be intitled to their Discharge in three Years, or at the End of the War, if they should chuse it; -His Majesty, with the Advice of His Privy Council, doth hereby most graciously repeat and confirm the fame, with relation to fuch as shall hereaster enlist on those Conditions; as also to such as have been inlifted in any Corps from the 11th of July last to this Day—But whereas Doubts have arisen with Respect to the Extent and Meaning of His Majesty's said Order,-His Majesty in Council doth therefore hereby declare, That the Conditions therein contained are not meant or intended to extend to such who shall inlift themselves in Great Britain, to serve in Regiments Abroad, whether Ireland or elsewhere, or to such who may chuse to inlist in any of His Majesty's Corps in the usual Manner, without Limitation of Time or Place of Service.

Hoyerswerda, Sept. 27. Prince Henry's Head Quarters. His Royal Highness lest the Camp of Hermsdorff near Gorlitz on the 23d, at Seven in the Evening, and after an almost incredible March from thence by Rothenburg to this Place, (which is at the full Diffance of Eleven German Miles) on the 25th, about Five o'Clock in the Afternoon, had the good Fortune to furprize the whole Corps of General Vela, encamped behind this Town. The Attack was very brisk, and lasted about three Quarters of an Hour, when the Austrians gave Way, and sled into the Woods in the Neighbourhood; but our Hussars pursuing, and partly surrounding, them.

them, killed near Six Hundred on the Field and in the Woods, made near Fifteen Hundred Prisoners, among whom is General Vela himfelf, and upwards of Twenty Officers (according to the List delivered to his Royal Highness) and took Three Pieces of Cannon. This Corps, it is faid, confifted of Four Thousand Men, chiefly Croats and Hungarian Infantry, with some Husfars, who are entirely dispersed; and about Three Hundred of the Prisoners are desperately wounded. On our Side there were only fix Squadrons of Geridorff's Huffars, and one Hundred Dragoons, actually engaged; and our Loss does not amount to one Hundred in killed and wounded. The Army has halted here Yesterday and this Day, but will march To-morrow Morning.

We hear Marshal Daun took Possession of Gorlitz on the 24th in the Morning; but, as soon as he discovered that his Royal Highness was marching towards Saxony, returned for Budissen, where it is supposed he arrived last

Night or this Day.

His Prussian Majesty was advanced on the 24th as far as Neustadt in Silesia, in order to cover Glogau, and is in good Health and Spirits. The Russians that were at Guben, it is said, will be obliged, for Want of Subsistance,

Hague, October 9. The last Letters received here from Prince Ferdinand's Army, which are of the 3d Instant, mention, that nothing material had passed lately between his Serene Highmes's Army, and that of M. de Contades, and that no Alteration had been made in the Positions thereof. The Detachments of Colonel Luckner and Colonel Freytag continued to beat up the French Quarters with Success. M. d'Armentieres, it is said, has with his Corps returned back to Wesel.
