Brussels, June 7. Yesterday the Prince of Orange decamped from Duffel, marched with his Army through Malines, and had his Head-quarter last dight between Makings and Louvein at a place called Hacht; and this right his Highress intends to incamp his Army between Asifetos and Louvain, about Vleerbeck-Abby. The three Duich Regiments that, were longed in our Counterlearns, are this day marched to join, the Ariness Army; and our Governor the Duke de Killa Hermofa intends to follow in a day or two with a Body of 6 or Zoo Hoyle, which are now drawing together from feveral parts. The Most Christian King is at present encamped with his Army at Eallais, his Majesty being himself lodged in the Castle of the Count of Nozelies not far from Hay, which place fill holds out, though the French haye dive Batteries against it, and we expect in a day of two to hear of its surrender. On Tuesday lasta commanded party of 40 Horse, sent out from hence, hapned to meat with a ffronger party of the Enemy near Wavre, by whom, after a brisk resistance, they were otterpowied, 13 killed upou the place, several wounded and taken Prisoners, and the rest escaped hither. But another party of 80 Horse, sent out from Cambray had better fortune, for encountring with a French Party of 30 Horse, defeated them, killed several upon the place, took the Baggage of one of the French Lieutenant-Generals, fix led Horfes, with very rich furpitune, a great fervice of Plate, with a confiderable fum of Money. We are told, that his Excellency hath by express received advice, that the first instant General Montecueus passed the Rhine near Spire, with the whole Imperial Army; consisting in 24,000 Men effective, besides the Regiments of Gallas, Harrant and Traumandorf, who were not yet come up with the Army, that his Train of Artillery was composed of 30 Pieces of Cannon; that his Excellency did not feem to intend the Siege of Philipsburg, as had been purposely given out, but to march directly towards Monsieur de Turenne, to endeavor to oblige him to quit Alfaria, his Army being at present much stronger, as is said, than that of Monsseur de Tu-renne. Our Letters farther add, as if Prince Pio was to remain with 5 or 6000 Men to block up Philips, bury, till fuch time as the Marquis of Baden Dourlach, can get the Troops of the Circles together, with which he will as is reported, lay a formal Siege to Philipphare. Monsieur Fario is arrived here this day, and Don Emanuel de Lyra is returned for the Hague, Hague, June 7. We are told. That the Bishop of

That the Bishop of Munster seems very much concerned at the reports that have been raised, of his having entered into an engagement with the French, and that he assures the Allies on the contrary, and of his stedsastings to make good the Treaty he has with the Emperor. Paris, Jane 8. Our last Letters from the Army, tell us, That the 30 past, at three a Clock in the Morning, the King decamped from Gemblours in Brabant, marched four Leagues, and lodged that night at the Abby of Bonneff. kheshistant his Majetty commanded the Marquis of Rochefort to go and beliege Huy of the Manje, and ordered the Sieur Magatostisthe Sieur dechalenom and the Sieur de la Trouffe, Marefchals de Camp, reassed him at that Siege. The fecond, being Whitfunday the Army did not thir, The third, his Majesty decants ped again; continued his march towards Liege, and lodgi ed that night near a Village called Tanne on the small River Mehiaigne, from whence his Majesty went out the next day with the Prince of Conde, and several Squat drons of Horse, to visit the Camp before Huy. From Bouillon they write, That the Marefchal de Crequi attef the taking of Dinant and the Castle of Thierry, having received orders from the King to march with a Body of 6000 Horse towards Alfaita, came and lodged with the faid Troops the first instant at Hall not far from Boutti ton, the next day encamped at Sachy near Carignan; where he remained the ahird instant, and the fourth, continued his march towards Merz. The fixth instant, dyed Henry Count of Glermont, Spin to the Duke of d'Enguyen, aged about three years, to the great affliaction of that Family. The last Letters we received from Monfieur de Turenne's Camp, are dated the first instant as Akenheim about a League from Struiburg, and fly, That Monsieur de Turenne, having advice, that the Imperialifis were going to befiege Philipsburg, he into mediately commanded 300 Dragoons, under the conduct of a Lieutenant Collonel, to go and put themselves into the place, and went himself with a Body of Horse as far as Haguenaw; but understanding upon his arrival there, and from the parties he fent out, that the Enemy had not any defign upon Philipsburg; and that the blocking it up, was only a device of General Monteenculi to draw the French Forces that way, that fo he might have an opportunity to return to strasburg, and pass the Rhine there with his Army, Monsieur de Turenne returned to Akenheim, and retoyned his Army. which he had left under the Command of the Marquis de That the 30 past, Monsieur de Turennes commanded out a Brigade of Horse, and 400 Foot, with fix pieces of Cannon, under the conduct of the Marquis de Vaubrun, and the Marquis of Donglas, with orders to march to Benfeld, to favour the Workmen that were making a Bridge of Boars over the Rhine, over against The 31, Monsieur de Turenne caused all that place. his Troops, both Horse and Foot to be drawn up in two Lines, and took a review of them; which done, the commanded the Forces that composed the second Line to follow the Marquisde Vaubrun towards Benfeld.

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
