Translation of the Declaration, which His Serene Highness Duke Lewis of Brunswick, has de-livered to the Ministers of the Belligerant Powers, residing at the Hague, in the Name of His Majesty, and of the King of Prussia.

HEIR Britannick and Pruffian Ma-jeffies, moved with Compaffion at the Mischiefs which the War, that has been kindled for fome Years, has already occasioned, and must necessarily still produce; should think themselves wanting to the Duties of Humanity, and particularly to their tender Concern for the Prefervation and Well-being of their respective Kingdoms and Subjects, if they neglected the proper Means to put a Stop to the Progress of so fevere a Calamity, and to contribute to the Re-eftablishment of Public Tranquility. In this View, and in order to manifest the Purity of their Intentions, in this Respect, their faid Majesties have determined to make the following Declaration; viz

That they are ready to fend Plenipotentiaries to the Place, which shall be thought most proper, in order there to treat, conjointly, of a folid and general Peace, with those whom the Belligerant Parties shall think fit to authorife, on their Part, for the attaining fo falutary an End.

St. James's, December 4.

The three following Addresses having been transmitted to the Right Honourable the Earl of Holderneffe, one of His Majefty's Principal Secretaries of State, have by him been prefented to His Majefty : Which Addresses His Majelty was pleased to receive very gracioully.

May it pleafe your Majefty, W E your Majefty's most loyal and faithful Sub-jects, the Ministers and Elders of the Commillion of the General Affembly of the Church of Scotland, beg leave to congratulate your Majefty upon the late fignal Success of the British Arms. We adore the great Ruler of the World, for the diftinguished Favour he hath shown to your Majesty and your Kingdoms, in the Profecution of a most just and necessary War. To that Spirit of Wildom and Might, which proceeds from the Lord of Hofts, we afcribe those happy Efforts which have maintained our Rights in America, reftrained hoftile Encroachments, and extended the Territory and Commerce of the British Empire. We acknowledge the merciful Hand of God, in giving a Check to those barba-rous and unprovoked Oppressions, which lately af-flicted our Fellow Protestants, your Majefly's Subjects in Germany, and in preventing the Return of like Calamities, by a Victory equally fplendid and important. Nor can we, without a fenfible Tri-umph, anticipate the Reflection of future Ages, that Great Britain, under your Majcfty's aufpicious Reign, after vindicating and fecuring her own effential In-terefts, extended her Protection to injured Nations, and disappointed the most powerful Confederacy that ever was formed against the Rights of Mankind.

While your Majefty's Fleets and Armics are victorious in all Parts of the World, your Enemies feel the double Diffress of Diffappointment Abroad, and Em-barrafiment at Home. They are forced to fly to the laft Refource, in the intended Invation of thefe Kingdoms. On this Occasion, Moft Gracious So-vereign, our Duty requires, and our particular Si-vereign, our Duty requires, and our particular Situation enables us to give your Majefty the most Authentic Assurance, that the People of North Britain behold with Indignation this audacious Attempt; and, to prevent the Vexation of continual Alarms, or the Miferies of actual Invation; they humbly and dutifully with to be put into a Condition of contributing to the Quiet and Security of their native Coun-

try. We obferve, with the most fincere Joy, that the Tenour of your Majefty's mild and paternal Reign, the many great Events of Providence which diffinguish and adorn it, the wife and generous Policy, which hath been purfued, with regard to the Nor-thern Part of this Ifland, have produced the most vi-fible and happy Fruits: They have broke the Force of Ancient Prejudice, ftruck at the Root of Difaffection, united your Subjects in warm Attachment to your Majefty's Perfon and Government, and infpired them with Confidence in that virtuous Administration, and with Admiration of those wife and magnanimous Counfels to which, under God, we owe the most valuable Bleffings.

We receive it as a Proof of your pious Concern for the true Interests of your People, that your Majefly hath called us, by your Royal Authority, to offer public Thanksgivings to the God of Heaven for his various and unparalelled Mercies.-Duty and Inclination prompt us to cherish in the Minds of your Subjects Sentiments of Piety and Gratitude to God, Loyalty to the beft of Sovereigns, and Zeal for the Honour and Prosperity of the British Nation.

We offer up our conftant and fervent Prayers to Almighty God, that your Sacred Perfon and Royal Family may ever be happy under His Bleffing and Protection, that He may continue to go forth with your Majefty's Fleets and Armies, that the Progress of your Arms may lay the Foundation of lasting Tranquillity and real Advantage to every Part of your Do-minions, may prove the Means of civilizing uncultivated Nations, and reconciling. them to British Interests ; and may favour the Introduction of our Holy and Humane Religion into the Regions of Ignorance and Cruelty.
