The humble Address of the Mayor, Aldermen, and Citizens of the City of Chichester.

**W**E, your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects, the Mayor, Aldermen, and Citizens of the City of Chichester, humbly beg Leave to congratulate your Majesty on the many great and signal Successes with which it hath pleased the Almighty to bless your Majesty's Arms in all Parts of the World.

Your Majesty's faithful Citizens will not attempt to enumerate the several great and glorious Victories, which have so peculiarly distinguished this ever memorable Campaign: Victories sufficient in their Number to have signalized even a long continued War, and which in their Consequences have made it impossible for your Enemies to disguise their Weakness, and shewn to all the World, that no Force of theirs is able to obstruct the Progress of your Majesty's Arms, no Difficulties insuperable to the Valour of your victorious Troops. But we should think ourselves inexcusably wanting in our Duty and Gratitude to your Majesty, if we should neglect this Opportunity of approaching your Sacred Person, to join our humble Voice with that of an united Nation, in the warmest and most sincere Acknowledgements of your Majesty's constant and unwearied Endeavours for the Safety, Honour, and true Interest of your People, and of the Wisdom, Vigilance, and Vigour of your Majesty's Councils and Measures, to all which (under God) these great Successes are owing.

*King of Prussia's Head Quarters at Wildstruff, Dec. 6.* General Diercke, who had been detached by his Majesty to the right Bank of the Elbe, occupied a strong Post opposite to Meissen, with seven Battalions of Infantry and One Thousand Horse. This Post was so advantageous, that he thought his Retreat to Meissen absolutely secure, especially as he had been assured by the Pontoneers, that they could lay a Bridge over the Elbe in a few Hours, (for they had been obliged, during the hard Frost, to withdraw the Bridge of Boats they had over that River, and the wooden Bridge at Meissen had been broke down by the Austrians) but when they attempted to lay a Bridge of pontoons; it was found impracticable, because of the Quantity of Ice floating in the River. General Diercke was therefore reduced to the Necessity of making Use of the Boats to carry over his Cavalry and Part of his Infantry, on the 3d Instant, which took up a great deal of Time, whilst he himself with three Battalions formed the Rear Guard; and during the Night of the 3d and 4th, all his Cavalry, with four Battalions of Infantry, were transported to Meissen. But towards the Morning of the 4th, he was attacked, and, after a very brave Defence, the three Battalions, that formed the Rear Guard, being overpowered with Numbers, were either killed or made Prisoners, except some Part of the three Battalions which found Means to get over the Elbe. General Diercke is wounded, and a Prisoner.

The Troops that were saved, as well Cavalry as Infantry, marched directly to Torgau to strengthen the Garrison of that Place.

This Morning at Seven o'Clock, the King of Prussia, who had returned hither from Freyberg on the 3d, fet out for the same Place. His Royal Highness Prince Henry commands, in the King's Absence, our Grand Army, which remains in its former Position.

*Hague, Dec. 18.* By Advices of the 11th Instant from Prince Ferdinand, his Serene Highness remained still at Krossdorff; and the Hereditary Prince had been reinforced, and was marched towards Trefsurth on the Worra: The Duke of Broglie continued to canton about Friedberg, not caring to disperse his Army into their Winter Quarters whilst Prince Ferdinand kept the Field. The Town of Giessen is blockaded; whether any Thing more has been attempted against it, is not yet known, tho' the Frost is so hard, that one Part of their Defence, which is the Water, must be rendered useless.
