That your Majesty's precious Life may be long preserved; That your Arms may be blessed with Success; That your Officers and Soldiers may be infpired with Prudence, Conduct, and Courage; and that one of your Illustrious Race may, while Son and Moon endureth, Iway the Scepter over these Nations, is and shall be the constant Prayer of your Majesty's most humble, most dutiful, and most loyal Subjects, the Magistrates and Town-Council of your Bargh of Lanark. King of Prussia's Head Quarters at Wildruff, c. 6. General Diercke, who had been detached by his Majesty to the right Bank of the Elbe, occupied a strong Post opposite to Meissen, with seven Battalions of Infantry and One Thousand Horse. This Post was so advantageous, that he thought his Retreat to Meissen absolutely secure, especially as he had been affored by the Pontoneers, that they could lay a Bridge over the Elbe in a few Hours, (for they had been obliged, during the hard Frost, to withdraw the Bridge of Boats they had over that River, and the wooden Bridge at Meissen had been broke down by the Austrians) but when they attempted to lay a Bridge of Pontoons, it was found impracticable, because of the Quantity of Ice floating in the River. General Diercke was therefore reduced to the Necessity of making Use of the Boats to carry over his Cavalry and Part of his Infantry, on the 3d Instant, which took up a great deal of Time, whilst he himself with three Battalions formed the Rear Guard; and during the Night of the 3d and 4th, all his Cavalry, with four Battalions of Infantry, were transported to Meissen. But towards the Morning of the 4th, he was attacked, and, after a very brave Defence, the three Batta-lions, that formed the Rear Guard, being overpowered with Numbers, were either killed or made Prisoners, except some Part of the three Battalions which found Means to get over the Elbe. General Diercke is wounded, and a Prisoner.

The Troops that were faved, as well Cavalry as Infantry, marched directly to Torgan to Arengthen

the Garrison of that Place

This Morning at Seven o'Clock, the King of Pruffia, who had returned hither from Freyberg on the 3d, fet out for the fame Place. His Royal Highness Prince Henry commands, in the King's Abfence, our Grand Army, which remains in its former Polition.

Hague, Dec. 18. By Advices of the 11th Inflant from Prince Ferdinand, his Serene Highness remained still at Krossdorss; and the Hereditary Prince had been reinforced, and was marched towards Treffurth on the Worra: The Duke of Broglio continued to canton about Friedberg, not caring to disperse his Army into their Winter Quarters whilst Prince Ferdinand kept the Field. The Town of Giessen is blockaded; whether any Thing more has been attempted against it, is not yet known, tho' the Frost is so hard, that one Part of their Defence, which is the Water, must be rendered useless.
