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Falmouth, May 31.

THe 28 inst. came in here the *Trial of London*, and the *Gift of Pool from Virginia*, bound for *London*; the same day past by here the *Baltimore*, and another Vessel, likewise from *Virginia*. Yesterday arrived here the *Amist* of this place from *Libon*, the Master says, that by contrary Winds he was forced to put into *Kinsale*, from whence he came on Tuesday last, leaving in Port there four great *Virginia Men*, homeward bound, who stay there to take fresh Provisions.

Warsaw, May 14. The 23 past, the King of *Poland* arrived at *Zlokow*, where he was met by his Queen and several Senators of the Kingdom, who congratulated his happy return out of the *Ukrain*, after having for so many Months been exposed in his person to so much danger and hardships. Two or three days after his arrival there, his Majesty gave Audience to an Ambassador from the *Cham of Tartary*, whose chief Errand, was to acquaint his Majesty with the great desire the *Grand Signior* hath to renew the Peace and Friendship with this Crown; and that in order thereunto his Majesty would send Ambassadors to the *Cham of Tartary* for the concluding to good a work. We are told of an Envoy that was likewise arrived at *Zlokow* from *Dorofensko*, to exhort his Majesty to a Peace, without making any mention of the submission of the said *Dorofensko* to this Crown, which has been so long and often promised on his part. The *Palatine of Russia*, whom his Majesty left to Command his Forces in the *Ukraine*, being fallen very sick, his Majesty has sent the Ensign of the Crown to take the care of things in those parts, till he shall be recovered. In the mean time his Majesty omits nothing on his part for the recruiting his Forces, and the putting them in a condition to take the Field again, which however will its feared require some time. The *Moscovites* seem still to act with little sincerity, so much to the dissatisfaction of the King and the great Ministers of this Republick, that Men are apt to believe, that in case we were at Peace with our other Neighbors, we should not continue so long with them, for that among other things they still detain *Kiovia*, a place of great strength, and importance, which ought according to Treaty to be restored to this Crown.

Naples May 21. Here are lately arrived three *Major-kine Men of War* from *Melazzo* to *Carena*, as the other *spanish Men of War* that are here in Port have already done. We begin now to believe that *Don Juan of Austria* will not come into these parts, as hath been said. This day we have news, That the *French Fleet* of Gallies, Men of War, &c. is past by for *Misina*.

Madrid, May 22. Their Majesties are returned with the whole Court from *Aranjuez*, where they have passed some part of this season; and the King is now lodged in his own Apartment. From *Barcelona* we have advice, That the Duke of *St. Germain* had taken the Field, with what Forces he could draw together, to oppose the *French*, under the Command of the Duke of *Schomberg*: who seemed to have a design to besiege *Bellegarde*, *Don Juan of Austria* is not as yet, on his journey to-

wards *Italy*, and after all that has been said concerning it, we do not know when he will begin. It is said, that great Levies are making in this Kingdom, for the Reinforcing the Army in *Catalonia*.

Hamburg, June 8. The *Sueds* have since our last, taken *Orangienburg*, a place of much importance, not far from *Berlin*, as likewise *Cremmin*, and *Fehr Berlin*, but still leave us in the dark, as to the main of their design; the same Letters add, that the *Elector of Brandenburg* is very suddenly expected at *Berlin*. On the other side we are assured that the Forces of *Denmark* are likewise on their march; and that the King will be about the 20 of this Month at *Rensburg* in person, about four *German Miles* from *Gluckstadt*, having appointed a general Rendezvous of his Forces to be held there about that time.

Strasburg, June 3. The *French* have brought down great numbers of Boats from *Brisac* to *Rheinaw*, with which they have made a Bridge over the *Rhine*, and set 1000 Men to guard it on this side; it is said that *Monsieur de Turonne* will pass the *Rhine* there with his whole Army, and to give the *Confederates* the greater diversion, that the *Marquis de Vaubrun* shall with 5 or 6000 Men, pass the same River at *Brisac*, and make an Incur-sion into *Brisgovia*. The *Marquis of Baden Dourlach* is bringing the Forces of the *Circles* together, and we have advice of a Rencontre that has hapned between a party of the said Troops, and 200 *French*, who endeavoured to pass the *Rhine*, but were forced back, several having been killed, and as many drowned.

Spire, June 4. This morning by break of day the *Imperial Army* unexpectedly repassed the *Rhine* again, with what design we cannot learn; the general report is, that that resolution was taken upon the news *General Montecuculi* had of *Monsieur de Turonne* having passed the *Rhine* between *Strasburg* and *Brisac*, with intention, as some imagine, to join with the Forces of the *Elector of Bavaria*. We know not as yet what to make of these marches and Countermarches of the *Imperialists*, but must leave it to time to inform us of their designs, which hitherto are kept most secret. The *Elector Palatine* is still here, and many people still speak of the Siege of *Philipsburg*.

Francfort, June 6. This day the Duke of *Lunenburg Zel*, who these three days past hath been encamped with his Forces, consisting in between 10 and 12000 Men, about three Leagues from this City, is on his march, with intentions to pass the *Laen* at *Wetzlar*, and from thence to continue his march through *Westermarck* towards *Bon*. From *Spire* we have advice, That the first instant, the *Imperial Army* under the Command of *General Montecuculi* passed the *Rhine* at *Losheim*, and encamped on this side of *Dudenhoven* near *Spire*, where it continued two days. That the third, the Regiments of *Gallas*, *Hatrant*, and *Traumandorf* arrived at *Losheim*; that the fourth instant, when all things seemed disposed in order to a march towards *Newstadt* in *Alsacia*, *General Montecuculi* had on the sudden changed his resolution, and caused his Army to repass the *Rhine*, upon advice that *Monsieur de Turonne* had passed the *Rhine* with his Army at *Rheinaw* not far from *Strasburg*.

Cologne, June 7. Our Letters dated yesterday at *Lipstadt* give us an account, That the Troops of *Osna-brug* consisting in 5000 Men, had passed the River *Lippe* near that City, and took their march towards *Bon*, to join with the Troops of the Duke of *Lorraine*, which have still their quarters between this City and *Bon*, expecting the *Lunenbourg* Troops and those of *Osna-brug* aforesaid. From *Muyence* they write, That the third instant at night dyed there the Elector of that name.

Liege, June 7. The beleiged in *Huy* after having very well defended themselves, and beaten off the *French*, who made the fifth instant at night a general Attack upon the place; have this morning surrendred the place upon condition to march out with their Armes and Baggage, which having been at first refused them by the *French*, they declared they would submit themselves to the last extremities before they would yield upon any other Terms. The *French* Army is now on its march towards *Limburg*, with intention as is thought to besiege that place; and now we expect to see what the Prince of *Orange* will do for the relieving of it.

Brussels, June 11. On Sunday last, our Governor the Duke de *Villa Hermosa*, parted from hence, accompanied with all the General Officers and many persons of Quality, and attended with a noble Equippage, besides his Troops of Guards all new clothed, the Forces which followed his Excellency made about 7000 Horse and Dragoons, Commanded by the Duke de *Montalio* General of the Cavalry, and disposed into three Brigades, the first composed of nine Regiments of Foreign Cavalry Commanded by the Count d' *Egmont*, the other two by the Lieutenant Generals *Agurto* and *Falasco*. The same day in the evening his Excellency joined his Highness at *Louvain*, his Highness's Army being encamped on the other side of that City towards *Aerschot*, his Highness himself quartered at the Abby of *Bethlem*, and our Troops encamping on this side the River *Dyle*. Yesterday morning four Dutch Regiments, which came lately from *Holland*, embarked at *Malines* in order to their passing to *Louvain*, and joining the Princes Army there to morrow; a general Rendezvous being appointed to be then held there, as well of his Highness, as the *Spanish* Forces; which done, his Highness and his Excellency will advance with the whole Army towards the Enemy, who, according to our last advices, having passed the *Meuse*, advance towards *Limburg*. The sixth instant, the Garrison of the Castle of *Huy* capitulated, and the next day they marched out towards *Bon*, surrendring the place to the *French*. We have just now Letters dated the nine instant at noon at *Limburg*, which say, That the *French* Army was marching in several Bodies towards that City, and that a great Body of Horse and Foot with a great many Carriages was already arrived within sight of that place; this news its thought will put his Highness and Excellency upon some suddain Action, either to relieve *Limburg*, if besieged, or else to give the *French* a diversion by setting down before some considerable place belonging to them. The Marquis d' *Ostera* General of the Artillery Commands here in his Excellencies absence.

Hague, May 11. We have at present very little news here; the Prince of *Orange* according to our last advices lay encamped with his Army near *Louvain*, the Duke de *Villa Hermosa* Governor of the *Spanish* Netherlands, having joined his Highness there with 7000 Horse and Dragoons. It is reported, That the *Spanish* Ministers have finally agreed with the Admiralty of *Amsterdam* about the fitting out of several Men of War to be employed against the *Messineses*; that a considerable sum Money has been already paid on that account,

and that the said Ships will be ready to set Sail very suddenly.

Paris, June 12. From *Clermont* in *Picardy* We have advice, That the seventh instant at night dyed there Sir *William Lockhart* Ambassador Extraordinary from his Majesty of Great Britain, greatly lamented by all that knew him. Our Letters from the Army tell us, That the Castle of *Huy* was surrendred the seventh instant, and that his Majesty according to the general opinion, was gone to besiege *Limburg*. From *Alsacia* they write, That Monsieur de *Turenne* had passed the *Rhine* between *Brisac* and *Strasbourg*, and that upon advice thereof General *Montecuculi* had with his Army repassed the *Rhine* near *Spire*.

Oxon, June 3. On Tuesday last, late at night, arrived here very unexpected, his Highness the Prince of *Newburg*, whom Mr. Vicechancellor Dr. *Burwell*, the Dean of *Christchurch* Doctor *Fell*, and Doctor *Marshall* Rector of *Lincoln* Colledge, immediately attended, to bid his Highness welcome to the place, and tender him the respects of the University. Yesterday morning the Vicechancellor being hindered by the necessity of beginning the Term, Mr. Dean and Dr. *Marshall* waited upon his Highness, and having provided four Coaches for his Highness, and his Attendants, conducted him first to *Christchurch*, where the young Students entertained his Highness with several pieces of Poetry, the Canons, Noblemen, Gentlemen, and Students, of all conditions, making a solemn appearance; his Highness having visited the publick Buildings there, and whatever else was worthy his Curiosity, past to *St. Johns*, from thence went through the Grove, and visited *Wadham*, then *New Colledge*, the new Buildings at *Queens Colledge*, *Magdalen Colledge*, the *Physick Garden*, and *Merton Colledge*, by which time it was noon, and his Highness ascended to his Lodgings. After Dinner his Highness was conducted to visit the University, and it having been signified that they were met in Convocation to receive his Highness, and present him, and such of his Train as he thought fit, to a degree, his Highness accepted the offer as to his own Person, but declined it as to any of his Attendants: And having, while the Convocation was gathered together and settled, been shewed the Fabrick of the Schools, the Library, and Curiosities there, his Highness was solemnly conducted into the Convocation House, where Dr. *Bourchier* the *Regius Professor* of Civil Law, in a short and elegant Speech, presented his Highness to the Degree of *Doctor of Laws*, his Highness being placed on a Seat raised on purpose, and handsomely adorned; which done, Mr. Vicechancellor in a very elegant Oration, created him Doctor accordingly, and then the Pro-Oration, Mr. *Wyatt* of *Christchurch*, made his Highness a Compliment in the name of the whole University. From thence, the whole University attended his Highness to the Theater, where his Highness, a peculiar Seat being likewise there prepared for him, was treated with Musick, and having afterwards seen the Printing-Offices, and other Particularities, was Re-conducted to his Lodgings, visiting in his way *All-Souls Colledge*; the whole performance having been with great Order, Solemnity and Respect to his Highness. This mornin: Mr. Vicechancellor, Mr. Dean, and others, were to take their leaves of his Highness, to whom they made a present of the History and Cuts of this University, in two Volumes, very fairly bound.
