The humble Address of the Dean and Clergy of the Island of Guernsey.

Most Gracious Sovereign,

WE, your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects, the Dean and Clergy of your Majefty's Island of Guernfey, are too fensible of the uninterrupted Happiness we enjoy under the mild and anspicious Government of the Best of Kings, not to join in the warmest and most fincere Congratulations, on the repeated and fignal Successes, which have in every Quarter of the World, by Sea and Land, attended your Majesty's Arms. From Goree to the last glorious Conquest of

Quebec, in every Enterprize, in every Action, as we can trace the fureft and unerring Direction of an over ruling Providence; fo we cannot but fee and admire your Majesty's Paternal Care of all your Kingdoms, as far as fecond Caufes can operate, in the Management and Conduct of this prefent War; a War most justly undertaken for the Prefervation of the Rights and Liberties of our Fellow-Subjects.

But as by Situation, we are foremost in the Danger of Invalion, and by Profession most exposed to the Refentment of exasperated Papists, we cannot but in an especial Manner congratulate your Majefty on the last decisive Victory over the French Fleet on their own Coaft.

We beg Leave to affure your Majefty, that we shall make it our Study to instruct and confirm the People committed to our Charge, in the most fleady Principles of Loyalty and Zeal for your Majesty's Royal Perfon and Government, and pray the Great God to crown your Majesty's Labours with a folid and lasting Peace, and make those Blessings perpetual to us and our Posterity, in your Majesty's Royal Line.

Hague; Dec. 25. We have received certain Ac-counts here, that the Hereditary Prince of Brunfwick, with a very confiderable Body of Troops under his Command, arrived at Erfurth on the 18th. It is farther faid, That his Serene Highnefs was to be at Weimar the next Day, on the 20th at Jena, and on the 21st at Gera, where he will be within two Marches of Leipfig, and as many of Hoff and Dresden.

Prince Ferdinand still occupies his Quarters at Kroffdorff, and the Blockade of Giessien continues. The Duke de Broglio is still at Friedberg:

By the laft Letters from Saxony, dated the 16th Inftant, we are informed, That the Grand Prufian Army remained quiet in their Quarters of Cantonment near Willsdruff ; That the King of Prussia was then at Freyberg, and Marshall Daun at Dresden; and that the Austrian General Beck, who had advanced on the Right Bank of the Elbe towards Torgau, was returned to Drefden, fo that there was then no Corps of Auftrians on the Right Side of that River.
