From Goree to the last glorious Conquest of Quebec, in every Enterprize, in every Action, as we can trace the surest and unerring Direction of an over-ruling Providence; so we cannot but see and admire your Majesty's Paternal Care of all your Kingdoms, as far as second Causes can operate, in the Management and Conduct of this present War; a War most justly undertaken for the Preservation of the Rights and Liberties of our Fellow-Subjects.

But as by Situation, we are foremost in the Danger of Invasion, and by Profession most exposed to the Resentment of exasperated Papists, we cannot but in an especial Manner congratulate your Majesty on the last decisive Victory over the French Fleet on their own Coast.

We beg Leave to affure your Majesty, that we shall make it our Study to instruct and confirm the People committed to our Charge, in the most steady Principles of Loyalty and Zeal for your Majesty's Royal Person and Government, and pray the Great God to crown your Majesty's Labours with a solid and lasting Peace, and make those Blessings perpetual to us and our Posterity, in your Majesty's Royal Line.

Hague; Dec. 25. We have received certain Accounts here, that the Hereditary Prince of Brunfwick, with a very confiderable Body of Troops under his Command, arrived at Erfurth on the 18th. It is farther faid, That his Serene Highness was to be at Weimar the next Day, on the 20th at Jena, and on the 21st at Gera, where he will be within two Marches of Leipsig, and as many of Hoff and Dresden.

Prince Ferdinand still occupies his Quarters at Krossdorss, and the Blockade of Giessen continues. The Duke de Broglio is still at Friedberg:

By the last Letters from Saxony, dated the 16th Instant, we are informed, That the Grand Prussian Army remained quiet in their Quarters of Cantonment near Willsdruff; That the King of Prussia was then at Freyberg, and Marshall Daun at Dresden; and that the Austrian General Beck, who had advanced on the Right Bank of the Elbe towards Torgau, was returned to Dresden, so that there was then no Corps of Austrians on the Right Side of that River.
