

Pot, 2 Salts, 2 Showels, 1 Pair of Tongues, 1 Candlestick, 1 Tea Kettle, 1 Stand with 3 Castors, 1 Pair of large Candlesticks, and several other Things unknown.

Second, That the Dwelling House of Joshua Sugden, at the King's Arms, in New Broad Street Passage, leading to Bishopsgate, Publican, was, early on Friday Morning, the 15th Instant, broke into, and a Scrutore broke open, and the following Sums of Money stolen thereout, 90 Guineas, in a Harden Bag, 9 $\frac{1}{2}$ lay loose, 4 Guineas in half Guineas, 6 Crown Pieces, viz. 2 King William's, 2 King James's, and 2 Queen Anne's, and about 6 Pounds in Silver loose, the Property of the said Joshua Sugden.

And the Third, That sundry wicked and evil disposed Persons did, on Monday last, the 18th Instant, find Means to get into the House of Samuel Lloyd, of Devonshire Square, Merchant, and a little after Three o'Clock in the Morning, one of them, with a Vizard Mask on, did enter the Chamber of the said Samuel Lloyd, habited like a Sailor, with a Pistol tuck'd in the Waistband of his Trouzers; a Dark Lanthorn in his Right Hand, and a broad Blade Butcher's Knife in his Left, came to his Bed Side, and, in a menacing low Tone, demanded the said Samuel Lloyd to give him All his Money, ordering him, at the same Time not to speak loud, or make a Noise, or else would cut his Throat; and when he was told where the Cash was, demanded the Key of the Compting House, and also whether the Cash was in a Drawer, Bag, or Purse,—and after receiving said Keys gave them, (as the said Samuel Lloyd supposes,) to some of his Accomplices, while he stood Centinel at said Chamber-Door, and who, thro' either not knowing how to use said Keys, or being in Hast, broke open the Door of the Compting-House, and also wrench'd open two Desks therein, and took out from thence to the Value of about 150 l. in Specie; among which were about fifty Shillings in Crown and Half-Crown Pieces, and the rest chiefly in Guineas, except some few Portugal Pieces.

His Majesty, for the better discovering and bringing to Justice the Persons concerned in all, or either of the said Robberies, is pleas'd to promise His most gracious Pardon to any one concerned in all, or either of the said Robberies, who shall discover his or her Accomplice or Accomplices therein, so that they, or any of them, may be apprehended and convicted thereof.

Whereas an Act hath passed in this present Session of Parliament to enable the Lord Lieutenant of those Counties, where the Militia Forces have not been raised, to summon a Meeting of all such Persons as are qualified and willing to serve as Officers in the Militia, notwithstanding the Suspension made in Pursuance of the Directions of the former Acts: And whereas at the Meeting of his Majesty's Lieutenant and Deputy Lieutenants of the County of Salop, this Day held at the Talbot Inn in this Town, a sufficient Number of Gentlemen, qualified to serve as Officers in the Militia of the said County, did not appear, or give in their Names, in Writing for that Purpose; In order therefore that the Militia Acts may the more effectually be carried into Execution, his Majesty's said Lieutenant doth hereby give Notice, That another Meeting will be held at the Place aforesaid, on Tuesday the 11th Day of March next; and likewise desires, that all Persons qualified to serve as Officers, and willing to accept Commissions, will attend the said Meeting, or deliver, or cause to be delivered, their Names in Writing to His Majesty's said Lieutenant, or such Person as he shall appoint to receive the same, specifying the Rank in which they are willing to serve.

General Post Office, February 9, 1760.

Whereas the Post Boy carrying the Portsmouth Mail from this Office, was, this Morning, between Two and Three of the Clock, near Kensington Gravel Pits, attacked and robbed by a single Highwayman, who took out of the said Mail and carried off the Portsmouth Bag of Letters.

The Person who committed this Robbery is said to be about 5 Feet 8 or 9 Inches high, a slender middle aged Man, had on a blue Surtout Coat, and was mounted upon a large strong Brown Gelding, upwards of 15 Hands high.

This is therefore to give Notice, That whoever shall apprehend and convict, or cause to be apprehended, and convicted,
