Brabant, to join with the Prince of Orange. The Garifons that were in Huy and Dinant, are arrived at Bon, the first being 150 Men, and the latter 300. This day the Common-Council of this City is affembled, to refolve upon the Propofal that hath been made by the Governor of Bon, to put an Imperial Garifon into this places for its greater fecurity against all accidents. We do not yet hear that the Forces of the Bishop of Munster begin to march. From Francfort they write, That General Monrecuculi marches towards Monfieur de Turenne, who has, to the great furprize of all People, posted himfelf at Wilftadt, with refolution to offer him Barrel.

Liegg, June 14. Yesterday Morning, before break of day, 7 or 8000 Fiench, commanded out of the French Army, pafied the Maefe, and marched towards Limburg, to affill at that Siege, whom the Prince of Conde fome hours after followed. The French have not as yet made use of their Cannon against the place, for that their heavy Cannon arrived not till yesterday in the Camp ; and, it is faid, that the French had railed a Battery, which was of no ufe to them, for that the ground was not good. Yesterday arrived here a great many "Wagons from the Camp before Limburg, to fetch Provifions, and this Morning they are parted again thither. The Molt Chilfian King continues his quarters about a League from Maestricht, between the Maese and the fmall River Feker; but it is faid, that his Majeffy intends to remove higher up. The Prince of Orange is come with his Army to Lecuwe, on the Frontiers of Provisions begin to grow very scarce Brabint. here.

From the Frerth Camp at Willadt, June 15. The two Armies are at present not far from each other, that of the Enemies, under the Command of General Monticuculi, marches towards Offenburg, about two Leagues from our Camp, fo that we must now in a day or two expect to come to action. Monsieur de Turenne is gone our with some Troops to observe the Enemies countenance, who in their march keep fo near the Woods, that nothing can be attempted upon them. We are affured, that the Imperial Army had great difficulty to fubfift where it was near Spire, and that General Montecucali found himfelf obliged to march to Offenburg, as well to fecure that place, as to draw Provisions out of Sua. Bia; it is to be thought likewife, that he will endeavor to hinder our Communication with Suabia and Bavaria.

Ust 12. Hague, 7 une 18. This day is come abroad a Declaration of War of the Star s General against the King of Sueders, dated the 19 instant, in which is at large deduced the Reasons that have moved them therecunto; fo that it is now expected the King of Denmark, who, it feems, defired to fee this State make the first Rep, will like wife declare: Notwithstanding this Rupture, the Navigation and Commerce between the Subjects and Inhabitants of oneden, and this State, is left free, and in its former fate. Our Poringet Fleet is now arrived in the Maes and Texel, with the two Men of War that Convoyed them, by whom we receive the confirmation of what we mentioned in out laft, viz. That three French Men of War, mounted with 40 to 50 Guns each, àtrended with a Firefhip, had attacked them in the Chan-nel, had taken two Merchantmen belonging to Medeublich, the one whereof they carried off, but fet fire to the other, and that a third was run alhore, and there firanded. The 15 inftant, the Prince of Nafam, together with the Heer Van Deefen, and the Treafurer General Van Burgh, patted hence for O. derland, in quality of Deputies of the Council of State, to regulate cerfrom His Majefty of Great Britain, having obtained His Majetrom tris Majerty of Great Britain, having obtained His Maje-Ries leave to make a flep into England, for fome private Con-cerns of his own, during this time of vacancy here of all pub-lick bulinefs, by reafon of his Highneffes abfence; his Excel-lency purpoles to embatk this Evening or to morrow Morning, on a Yacht, that at prefent attends him in the Maes. Our laft advices from Meffina informed us, That the Magisfrates and Inhabitants of that City, had decla-red themfelves Subjects to the Crown of France and had accordingly taken an Oath of Fidelity to his Magefty, and to the Duke de Vivonne his Vicero; ; That Provisions are very plen-ty, and cheap, excepting onely Wine, which they procure from the Coasts of Nuples. The great Fleet of Gallies, Men of War, fre, was not as yet arrived, but daily expected.
