The Lords of His Majesty's most Honourable Privy Council.

WHEREAS the Time limited by His Majesty's Proclamation of the 15th of May last, "For giving Encouragement to Seamen and able bodied Landmen to enter themselves on board His Majesty's Ships of War; for granting Rewards for discovering such Seamen as shall conceal themfelves; for pardoning such Seamen as have deserted and shall return into the Service; and also for taking up all stragling Seamen," hath been prolonged and extended to the 24th of this Instant March; - And whereas it is judged expedient for His Majesty's Service, that the same should be continued for some Time longer—It is therefore hereby ordered in Council, that the said Time be prolonged and extended from the aforesaid 24th Day of this Instant March, to the 10th Day of May next; and that the Bounties and Rewards given and granted by His Majesty's aforementioned Proclamation, be continued to be paid until the faid 10th Day of May next. — Whereof all Persons concerned are to take Notice, and govern themselves accordingly.

THEREAS on Friday the 14th of this Instant March, at Night, a large Gang of Smuglers

AT the Council Chamber, Whitehall, the 20th were affembled at East Dean in the County of Suffex, Landing and Carrying away a large Quantity of Uncustomed Goods out of a Smugling Cutter then lying near the Shore: And whereas Henry Bean, one of the Officers of the Customs at East Dean aforefaid, and several other Officers of the Customs, did attempt to go on Board the faid Cutter, in order to examine and fearch the same, but were forcibly and violently obstructed and hindered in the Execution of their Duty, by several Persons belonging to the said Cutter, who stood upon the Deck with Lighted Matches in their Hands, swearing they would sink the Boat, in Case the Officers attempted to come on Board, by which Means the Officers were prevented from doing their Duty, and a large Quantity of Prohibited and Uncustomed Goods, were afterwards run out of the faid Cutter: The Commissioners of His Majesty's Customs, in order to bring the Offenders to Justice, do hereby promise a Reward of TWENTY POUNDS, for the apprehending and taking each of the faid Offenders, to be paid by the Receiver General of His Majesty's Customs on Conviction.
