An Act for repairing and widening the Roads from Haleworthy, in the Parish of Davidstow in the County of Cornwall, to the East End of Wadebridge in the said County, and from the West End of Wadebridge aforesaid, into and through the Borough of Mitchell in the said County.

An Act for repairing, and widening the High Roads from Hinckley to Woelfull Bridge; and also from Hoos Lane through Old Lane, and from Swanington to Lee Gutter, and from thence to Melbourn Common, and from Istock to Measham in the Counties of Leicester and Derby.

An Act for enlarging the Term and Powers contained in two several Acts of Parliament made in the Twelfth and Sixteenth Years of the Reign of His present Majesty, for repairing the Road from the Dun Cow in the Town of Dunchurch, to the Town of Hillnorton in the County of Warwick, and from thence to St. James's End, in the Parish of Duston in the County of Northampton, and for making the same Acts more effectual.

An Act for enlarging the Term and Powers granted by several Acts of Parliament of the Eighth Year of Her late Majesty Queen Anne, the Ninth Year of His late Majesty King George the First, and the Fifteenth Year of His present Majesty's Reign, for repairing the Highways between the House commonly called the Horse-shoe House, in the Parish of Stoke Goldington, in the County of Bucks, and the Town of Northampton, and the Road from the North Bridge of Newport Pagnel, in the County of Bucks, to the Horse-shoe House.

An Act for extending the Powers granted by an Act passed in the Twenty fifth Year of the Reign of His present Majesty, for repairing the Road leading from the Royal Oak on Wrotham Heath to the Town of Wrotham in the County of Kent, and from thence to the Village of Foots-Cray, in the said County, to the Road leading from the Royal Oak on Wrotham Heath to the Town of Maidstone.

An Act for amending, widening and keeping in Repair the High Road from the Borough of Tamworth to Ashby de la Zouch, in the County of Leicester, and from Sarveley Ferry in the said County, to a Turnpike Gate at or near the End of Swardcliff Lane, leading to Ashby de la Zouch aforesaid.

WHEREAS the Time limited by His Majesty's Proclamation of the 15th of May last, "For giving Encouragement to Seamen and able bodied Landmen to enter themselves on board His Majesty's Ships of War; for granting Rewards for discovering such Seamen as shall conceal themselves; for pardoning such Seamen as have deserted and shall return into the Service; and also for taking up all straggling Seamen," hath been prolonged and extended to the 24th of this Instant March; — And whereas it is judged expedient for His Majesty's Service, that the same should be continued for some Time longer—It is therefore hereby ordered in Council, that the said Time be prolonged and extended from the aforesaid 24th Day of this Instant March, to the 10th Day of May next; and that the Bounties and Rewards given and granted by His Majesty's aforementioned Proclamation, be continued to be paid until the said 10th Day of May next. — Whereof all Persons con-

cerned are to take Notice, and govern themselves accordingly.
