Head Quarters at Freyberg, April 21. On the 17th, very early in the Morning, about 2000 Aufrian Cavalry, supported by some Insantry, advanced from Bobritzsch towards Weissenborn, a Prussian Out Post on the Right of the Mulda. This occasioned an Alarm for some Hours, and his Prussian Majesty went in Person to reconnoitre; but the Austrians retired, and the Prussians have occupied the Post of Weissenborn.

Upon his Prussian Majesty's leaving this Place, unexpectedly, last Friday Morning, a Report was immediately spread, that the Army was to march from hence: However, it was afterwards known, from hence: However, it was afterwards known, that he was only gone to Meissen to confer with his Royal Highness Prince Henry. His Majesty returned from thence, on the 19th at Night, to this Place, as Prince Henry did to Wittemberg. And during the King of Prussia's Absence, and since his Return, every Thing has been quiet here.

The Army against the Russians, which will be commanded by Prince Henry, is actually assembling near Francsort upon the Oder.

Hague, April 29. We continue without any interesting News from the Armies. Priace Ferdinand had not yet begun to move when the last Letters came from Paderborn; and the French upon the Main, and the Rhine, did not feem to be in a Likelihood of taking the Field foon.

We hear from Hamburgh, That his Royal Highness Prince Henry of Prussia arrived on the 21st at Berlin, in his Way to Stargard, where the Army, he is to command, assembles: And that the Russians were as yet at Korlin, upon the Frontiers of Prussian Pomerania.
