WHEREAS the Time limited by His Majesty's
Proclamation of the 15th of May laft, "For
giving Encouragement to Seamen and able bodied
Landmen to enter themselves on board His Ma-
jesty's Ships of War; for granting Rewards for
difcovering fuch Seamen as shall conceal them-
felves; for pardoning fuch Seamen as have defert-
ed and shall return into the Service; and also for
taking up all fragling Seamen," hath been pro-
longed and extended to the 10th of this Instant
May; — And whereas it is judged expedient for
His Majesty's Service, that the same should be con-
tinued for some Time longer; — His Majesty doth
therefore, by and with the Advice of His Privy
Council, hereby order, that the said Time be pro-
longed and extended from the aforesaid 10th Day
of this Instant May, to the 21st Day of June
next; and that the Bounties and Rewards given and
granted by His Majesty's aforementioned Procla-
mation, be continued to be paid until the said 21st
Day of June next. — Whereof all Persons con-
cerned are to take Notice, and govern themselves
accordingly.

The KING's most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS the Time limited by His Majesty's
Order in Council of the 23d of October laft,
for prohibiting the Exporting out of this Kingdom,
or carrying Coastwife, Gunpowder, Salt Petre, or any
Sort of Arms or Ammunition, will expire upon the
29th Day of this Instant April—And whereas it is
judged expedient for His Majesty's Service, and the
Safety of this Kingdom, that the said Prohibition
should be continued for some longer Time—His Ma-
jesty doth therefore, by and with the Advice of His
Privy Council, hereby Order, Require, Prohibit and
Command, That no Person or Persons whatsoever
(except the Master General, Lieutenant General, or
Principal Officers of the Ordnance for His Majesty's
Service) do, at any Time during the Space of Six

Months, to commence from the said 29th Day of this
Instant April, presume to transport into any Parts out
of this Kingdom, or carry Coastwife, any Gunpow-
der, Salt Petre, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition,
or ship or lade any Gunpowder, Salt Petre, or any
Sort of Arms or Ammunition, on Board any Ship or
Vessel, in order to transporting the same into any
Parts beyond the Seas, or carrying the same Coast-
wife, without Leave or Permission in that Behalf first
obtained from His Majesty, or His Privy Council,
upon Pain of incurring and suffering the respective
Forfeitures and Penalties inflicted by an Act passed
in the Twenty Ninth Year of His Majesty's Reign,
entituled, "An Act to empower His Majesty to pro-
hibit the Exportation of Salt Petre, and to enforce
the Law for empowering His Majesty to prohibit
the Exportation of Gunpowder, or any Sort of
Arms and Ammunition; and also to empower His
Majesty to restrain the carrying Coastwife of Salt
Petre, Gunpowder, or any Sort of Arms or Ammu-
nition."—And the Lords Commissioners of His Ma-
jesty's Treasury, the Commissioners for Executing the
Office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, the
Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, the Master Gen-
eral of the Ordnance, and His Majesty's Secretary at
War; are to give the necessary Directions herein, as
to them may respectively appertain.

Head Quarters at Freyberg, April 21. On the
17th, very early in the Morning, about 2000 Au-
strian Cavalry, supported by some Infantry, advanced
from Bobritzsch towards Weiffenborn, a Prussian
Out Post on the Right of the Mulda. This occa-
sioned an Alarm for some Hours, and his Prussian
Majesty went in Person to reconnoitre; but the Au-
strians retired, and the Prussians have occupied the
Post of Weiffenborn.

Upon his Prussian Majesty's leaving this Place, un-
expectedly, last Friday Morning, a Report was
immediately spread, that the Army was to march
from hence: However, it was afterwards known,
that he was only gone to Meiffen to confer with his
Royal Highness Prince Henry. His Majesty return-
ed from thence, on the 19th at Night, to this Place,
as Prince Henry did to Wittemberg. And during
the King of Prussia's Absence, and since his Return,
every Thing has been quiet here.

The Army against the Russians, which will be
commanded by Prince Henry, is actually assembling
near Francfort upon the Oder.

Hague, April 29. We continue without any in-
teresting News from the Armies. Prince Ferdinand
had not yet begun to move when the last Letters
came from Paderborn; and the French upon the
Main, and the Rhine, did not seem to be in a Like-
lihood of taking the Field soon.

We hear from Hamburg, That his Royal High-
ness Prince Henry of Prussia arrived on the 21st
at Berlin, in his Way to Stargard, where the Army,
he is to command, assembles: And that the Russians
were as yet at Korlin, upon the Frontiers of Pruf-
sian Pomerania.
